#### Canadian Apples Abroad

London, Oct. 8.—(C. A. P.)—The Liverpool Daily Post on Liverpool as a fruit distributive centre says as a fruit distribute centre says this season's first arrivals of Nova Scotia apples have brought phenomenal prices, realizing 24 shillings the barrel for best grades. The first steamer brought 54,000 bushels, the second 51,000 and in the height of the season weekly imports may range from 200,000 to 250,000 bushels. The increased popularity of these apples proves they are taking the precedence of English. Canadian and American apples must be sold cheaply, if they are to compete with English fruit this season.
