The Inspector, Robt. Park, presented an excellent and full report of the attendance in the city schools for the month of May. The following was the total attendance, the first number indicating the number enrolled, the second the average attendance, and the third the percentage.

McKeough School—383, 348, 91.

Central School—806, 716, 89.

Kindergarten—230, 168, 73.

Total—1419, 1232, 87.

May, 1905—1483, 1312, 89.

The enrollment, 1419, is 10 less than for April, and the average, 1232, is eight less than for April. The enrollment is 64 less and the average 80 less than for May, 1905. There is an increase of 15 in enrollment at the kindergartens and an increase of three in average over the month of May, 1905—one at the Central and two at McKeough School.

POLICE AFTER HIM

Detroit Authorities Would Like to Get Dykes in their Custody.

The Detroit police would very much like to get hold of a man now living in Wardsville, Ont., but find themselves unable to secure the co-operation of the Canadian police.

Some time ago Wm. Tilley, an Essex farmer, was robbed of \$1,700 in Detroit. The money was the proceeds from the sale of Tilley's farm and C. M. Dykes was suspected of obtaining the wad. He escaped to Wardsville where his father, the champion checker player of Canada, resides.

The constable at Wardsville was notified and is said to have wired this reply: "Dykes here. Hands tied. Cannot arrest him." Failing to get their man by this means, the Detroit police department tried to get the local provincial detectives to hunt him up, but they refused.

"Unless we get orders from the Attorney General to proceed in the case," said Charlie Mahoney, "we would have to pay our own expenses."

The Detroit police have about decided to give the case up.

THE COUNCILLORS GET SOAKED

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

When the County Council resumed their deliberations at 10.15 this morning; a beautiful flower graced the Warden's desk. It was presented to Mr. Sturgis by Mr. Haggart, and throughout the morning County Clerk Gosnell was continually casting envious glances over his shoulder to where the bright red peony reared its head above the tumbler of water which contained it.

A communication from A. H. White, Secretary of Raleigh Agricultural Society, asking for a grant of \$150 for the advancement of agricultural matters in Raleigh, was referred to the committee on Agriculture.

Moved by Somers and Stewart, that the Council grant \$300 for the repairing of the Wallaceburg bridges. The Warden referred this motion to the committee on Bridges.

It was moved by Mr. French, seconded by Mr. Haggart, that the County request the County Treasurer to furnish a statement of the county's debenture debt and when it expires, and that this statement be printed in the June minutes.—Carried.

Moved by Vester and Haggart, that a grant of \$500 be given to Harwich Township to assist in building a bridge over the McGregor Creek.—Bridge committee.

It was moved by Mr. Haggart, seconded by Mr. Grant, that a grant of \$15 be made to the Public General Hospital at Chatham to apply on the expenses connected with the treatment of Wm. Ansley, the unfortunate who attempted suicide. This motion was referred to the Finance committee.

A by-law authorizing the Council to raise \$25,000 for county expenses of 1907 was read a first time, on the motion of Vester and Haggart.

At eleven o'clock the Council adjourned until 3.30 p. m. to enable them to inspect the House of Refuge.
