MILITIA APPOINTMENT.

There appear to be prospects of a pretty row between Lord Dundonald and the Minister of Agriculture, Hon. Sidney Fisher. In the course of a recent banquet speech Lord Dundonald stated that a list of officers of the Scottish Light Dragoons, the new cavalry regiment of the eastern townships, was sent by him (the G. O. C.) to council for approval. Among the names was that of Dr. Pickell, mayor of Sweetsburg and warden of Missisquoi county. When the list was re-turned, Dr. Pickell's name was struck out, and initialed by the Minister of Agriculture. Lord Dundonald add-ed that "his (Dr. Pickell's) political color was not, however, that of the Minister of Agriculture, and consequently he was not considered fit to serve his King in the military force of Canada. If the Hon. Sydney Fisher had been as well versed in soldiering as in agriculture, he would have, better understood the responsibilities of officers, and this would not have happened." Mr. Fisher has declined to discuss the matter, so that the omly light so far is that which has come from the G. O. C. If his charge be well founded, and a competent officer was really rejected simply because of his politics, it is a matter worthy of some serious attention, There may be room for differences of opinion on broad grounds of policy with reference to militia matters; but surely there is no excuse for the introduction of the narrowest and most mischievous features of party politics. Besides, under our system the Minister of Agriculture was scarcely the man to interfere. He might more properly have confined himself to the affairs of his own department.

A real live bull-fight was announced to take place at the St. Louis fair on Sunday. Over 7,000 people put up a good dollar apiece to see the fun, and when the authorities stepped in and prevented the show there was disappointment. The mob showed its resentment by organizing a riot and burning the building in which the fight was to have taken phace. It seems only the other day that the Americans were hurling indignant denunciations at the harbarisms of Spain's effete and antiquated civlization, as indicated by her national sport; but it is evident that there are a good many enjoying the higher civilization of the republic who lack only the opportunity to appreciate a bull-fight as much as any Spaniard.

MILITARY SPIRIT IN CANADA. Corespondence in New York Sun. Here are some of the things I have observed as an American citizen temporarily staying in Montreal, Canada:

"First, I have just witnessed the 'church parade' of the military of the single city of Montreal. For twenty minutes by my watch companies of soldiers in lines that reached from solders in lines that reached from curb to curb, in close column, have swept by from the magnificent and shakeed Royal Scots to timy little cadets. They were all a finely set up, business-like looking set. I cannot op, business-like looking set. I cannot even except the pocket editions. "Secondly, I am staying near the 'Champ de Mars' of Montreal. On the evening of every week-day, without exception. I see or hear some one of these midistary organizations drilling. And it is no half-hearted drill. They do things with a snap until they are dismissed. "Again, the organization of military bodies extends throughout the schools. This is no uncommon thing in the

bodies extends throughout the schools. This is no uncommon thing in the 'States' but I have never seen it carried quite so far. For instance last Saturday I had the discomfort of witnessing an 'inspection' drill of one of these cadet bodies. In marching, company, battalion and regimental movements, they were very good; no better probably than cadet regiments in the States, but they did not stop there, They had a splendid physical set-up drill, with rifles as well as without.
