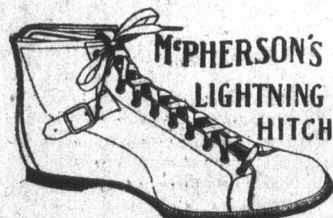

T. R. MERRITT IS DEAD.

Founder and President of Imperial Bank Passes to Rest.

St. Catharines, Ont., Jan. 12.—Thomas R. Merritt died at 2.15 yesterday afternoon.

Thomas R. Merritt was born November 17, 1824, in Mayville, New York. He was the fourth son of the late Hon. William Hamilton Merritt, builder of the Welland Canal.

Deceased was reputed to be worth about two million dollars. He was president and founder of the Imperial Bank. The Imperial Bank grew out of the Niagara District Bank, of which he was 21 years president and director.

He was also president of the Welland Canal Loan Co.; president of the Security Loan & Savings Co.; president of the Niagara Falls Suspension Bridge Co.; and for many years president of the St. Catharines Gas Co.

He was educated in the St. Catharines Collegiate Institute, and Upper Canada College. In 1853 he married Mary, daughter of the late Thomas Benson, who survives her husband. There were no children. In 1868 Mr. Merritt was elected member of Parliament for Lincoln county, when Hon. William Hamilton Merritt, builder of the Welland Canal.

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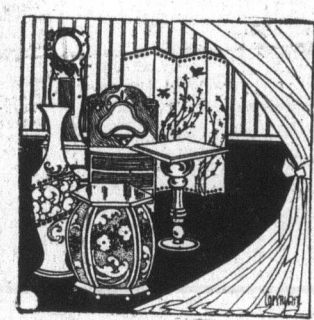
