AIRSHIPS IN POLITICS.

They May Prove To Be The Greatest Peacemakers In The World.

"Anticipationists." If we may coin the word, expect great things of the airship, and the greatest not the most obvious, writes The Dundee Advertiser.

Two or three years ago an American novelist, who dislikes protection, wrote a story to show how triumphantly the air traveler would burst up all their tariffs and tariff-made monopolist trusts.

At the Royal United States Institution the other day, Lieut.-Col. Capper, R. E., from another point of view suggested that the aeronaut would prove the world's greatest peacemaker.

Without saying anything about the probabilities, we confess to a liking for the gallant gentleman's manner of thinking. Most wars are made by people who have not the slightest intention of taking part in the fighting.

The Jingo is very brave in the music hall and at the public house bar, but deep in his heart he feels assured that no enemy will ever get home to his own door.

"The Jingo, he is brave, boys," is one of the silliest lies. The Jingo's bravado is all vicious; it is other people he is willing to sacrifice.

A perfected airship will bring him a new sense of responsibility. "When," says Col. Capper, "as in course of time, development, war would be immediately brought to the very door of the citizen, just as it was now brought to coast dwellers by the navies of the world, that it would become amongst civilized nations a calamity far more real and far more dreaded than even at present, so that in the end it was probable that the aeronaut might prove to be the great peacemaker of the world." Let us hope that the thing which we require to be experimentally demonstrated.

The Real Malay.

The real Malay is a short, thickset, well-built man, with straight black hair, a dark brown complexion, thick nose and lips and bright, intelligent eyes.

His disposition is generally kindly, his manners polite and easy. Never cringing, he is reserved with strangers and suspicious, though he does not show it. He is courageous and trustworthy in the discharge of an undertaking, but he is extravagant, fond of borrowing money and very slow in repaying it.

He is a good talker, speaks in parables, quotes proverbs and wine saws, has a strong sense of humor and is very fond of a good joke. He takes an interest in the affairs of his neighbors, and is consequently a gossip.

He never drinks intoxicants; he is rarely a gambler, but he is fond of gambling, cock-fighting and kindred sports. He is by nature a sportsman, catches and tames elephants, is a skillful fisherman and thoroughly at home in a boat. Above all things he is conservative to a degree, is proud and fond of his country and his people, venerates his ancient customs and traditions, fears his rajahs and has a proper respect for constituted authority, while he looks askance on all innovations and will resist their sudden introduction. — Sweetenham's "Malay Sketches."

A Political Surprise.

Capt. Sinclair, Secretary for Scotland, is one of the surprises of the Campbell-Bannerman Government, and has attained Cabinet rank after an unusually short official experience. He is a grandson of late Sir John Sinclair, and was born at Dunbreath 45 years ago. He went to Sandhurst, and as a Scotsman naturally joined the Royal Irish Lancers. His military service included the 1895 Sudan expedition. Subsequently he served as A. D. C. to Lord Aberdeen during his brief reign as Viceroy of Ireland in 1886, and retired from the army the following year. When Lord Aberdeen came to this country as Governor-General, Capt. Sinclair went with him as secretary, but returned in 1897 to contest Forfarshire, which he has since represented. He previously sat for Dumfriesshire in the 1892 Parliament. Recently he has acted as Liberal Whip and private secretary to the Prime Minister. Last year Capt. Sinclair still further cemented his long friendship with Lord Aberdeen by marrying his eldest daughter, Lady Marjorie Gordon.

Noah's Ark at Sea.

The Kildonan Castle, which arrived at Southampton recently, had on board one of the largest cargoes of strange beasts, birds and reptiles ever brought to Great Britain. It included six large sea lions, sixty penguins, seventy snakes, poisonous and non-poisonous, two aard-wolves, thirty Cape baboons, seventy-six South African rock rabbits, 750 small African birds of all sorts and colors, ten antelopes, including springbok, bushbuck and duiker, seventeen bee-birds, 750 tortoises and 300 large green frogs. They were brought over by Mr. John D. Hamlyn, the London naturalist, who said that parties of white and native hunters had been engaged in catching the animals and birds for many months, and that the pursuit was accompanied by many dangers and adventures.

A Powerful Drug.

Cloves are simply the dried flower buds of a beautiful evergreen tree growing naturally on the Spice Islands.

These flower buds are gathered when they have become of a bright red and are just on the point of opening. The name comes from the resemblance of the prepared spice to small nails, from the French word clou, for nail. Cloves are very heavily charged with a pungent, acrid, volatile oil, as much as 20 per cent sometimes being extracted.

This oil is valuable for flavoring and scenting purposes and has a limited field in medicine, but the habit of "eating cloves," in which young folks and too often old ones indulge, is very reprehensible, as the oil is a powerful drug, becoming in many cases an insidious poison.

SNOWSHOES.

They Differ Greatly In Shape and Make According to Locality.

In the intense cold of the far north-west where the snow is deep and frozen to a dry powder, says a writer in Outing, the dog drivers use a shoe that is two and a half feet long and fairly narrow. The meshes are coarse for the spring, but midwinter and dry, hard and necessary to use a fine mesh.

The toe hole is placed about two-thirds the length forward, and the toe of the shoe is broad and upturned. In the best made shoes the filling is cleverly put in and gives a concave surface to the snow and does not sink in deeply, but carries up and forward, so that the long body and heel always remain down, even at a fast pace.

In eastern Canada, where the snow is less open, the snowshoe is an almost exact opposite in shape. The oval is shorter and broadened until it appears very clumsy. Nevertheless it has been generally accepted for all around use. In this model the toe hole is placed farther forward for ease in hill climbing.

The "club" shoes follow this design, except that they have upturned toes, whereas the trappers and lumbermen claim that it is easier to climb hills on the old flat bed model, especially when carrying a pack or dragging a sled.

The trappers, however, designed shoe called a "hill climber" has a flaring forward of the toe hole nor back of the rear crosspiece, besides being very coarsely meshed. When the forests are very dense the trapper uses a fairly broad shoe about three feet in length, enabling him to slip smoothly about through the trees, with small danger of tangling the tails in the thick underbrush which would be sure to happen if they were made and after those used on the open plains.

There is another interesting model, formerly used in the Adirondacks and now confined to the Rocky mountains, called the "bear paw" shoe. It is a perfect oval in shape, having no heel or tail. It measures about 18 by 14 inches and is coarsely strung, the mesh being two to four inches across.

This coarse mesh is very necessary where the snow is moist, as otherwise the shoe would load up at every step and make traveling impossible. Most of the eastern shoes are closely meshed, the form and pace for service in a wooded country, lifts easily through.

THE CANADIAN.

He Is Sturdier, Slower and Less Nervous Than the American.

Writing of the differences between Canadians and Americans, a correspondent says: "The differences are mostly of degree. The superb self confidence of the average American woman as she walks abroad, the licensed obscenity of children, the perpetual degeneracy of conversation into story-telling—these characteristics are less marked in Canada than in the United States.

In fact, Canada is a country born and bred. There are few large cities, and even the dwellers in these cities keep up a most constant contact with country life. Nowhere in Canadian cities do we see the profusion of money and waste visible in New York or Chicago. Though most persons seem to live in fair comfort, there is no class of millionaires dominating society, and making the form and pace for servile imitation among the less wealthy classes.

"Hunting and fishing, with their accompaniments of camping out, play a large part in the national life, sport not having degenerated into the merely gambling and spectacular habits. Altogether, the Canadian lives a healthier life. Even busy cities like Toronto and Montreal conduct more business life more quietly than cities of corresponding calibre in the United States."—Chicago News.

Lord Dundonald's Charge.

Lord Dundonald's fine black charger, which carried him through the Sudan and Boer campaigns was chloroformed recently in the veterinary hospital of Dr. Nichols of Kingston.

The horse has had a most interesting career in modern warfare. He was through the Sudan war and also passed safely through the South African campaign. In the latter he carried the despatches from the relieving forces.

He was also in the relief of Ladysmith, and in the relief of that place was ridden into the city by Lord Dundonald. Although well up in years he was a sturdy little beast, black as jet, standing about 14 hands high and having fine proportions.

Henry Stratford, the Kingston taxidermist, has contracted for the work of skinning and mounting the body, a task which will extend over six or eight weeks. The finished product will probably be on exhibition here before being shipped to England.
