

COLLEGE EXTENSION PLAN IS ENDORSED BY BOARD OF TRADE

Citizens of Brandon to Be Asked to Subscribe \$100,000 of the \$400,000 Needed for New Buildings and Endowment Fund—New Buildings Urgently Needed Include Science Building, Memorial Hall and Girls' Dormitory—College Plans for Extensions During Next Ten Years, Costing Over a Million Dollars

Plans for the extension of Brandon College in the immediate future costing in the neighborhood of \$400,000, were laid before the Brandon Board of Trade at a well attended meeting in the City Hall on Friday evening. Although the plans submitted only call for the immediate extension work, the vision of the College authorities calls for the spending of over a million dollars in College buildings and work within the next ten years. The project was enthusiastically received by the members of the Board present and a resolution endorsing the campaign to be put on, was passed. A small advisory committee is to be appointed by President P. A. Kennedy, and this committee will act in conjunction with the College officials.

It was stated at the meeting that a drive in the city of Brandon would be put on before the end of the month and that Brandon citizens would be asked to raise \$100,000 of the total \$400,000. This \$100,000 is needed immediately for the erection of a Science Building, and Dr. Sparks, who was one of the speakers present, pointed out that it would be a matter of civic pride if the citizens could erect this building themselves. The remaining \$300,000 will be raised outside of the city and already there are promises of donations that will give the campaign a big boost towards its objective. Dr. H. P. Whidden, M.P., had a rough sketch of the plans present and explained that it was necessary that a Science Building, a Library, a Memorial Hall and a Dormitory for the accommodation of girls be erected within the very near future. The accommodation at Brandon College is now taxed to its limit, and immediate expansion is necessary.

President Kennedy endorsed the project, cost about \$150,000, and Dr. Sparks outlined the object of the meeting and set forth some of the facts which made it apparent that the Brandon College today is Brandon's best asset. At present there are 400 students attending the College and the estimated expenditure by these students approximately amounts to \$175,000 per year. President Kennedy declared that the new plans would mean accommodation for 1,200 students and that about \$500,000 would be spent in Brandon annually. He said the project deserved the hearty support of every citizen, and that the program as it would be outlined, would be the largest proposition Brandon ever tackled.

"My reason in taking up this problem," said Dr. Whidden, "is that I believe in Western Canada." Particularly did he believe in the Western people. There is no doubt, he said, but that this city is the logical centre for the College, and it is now hoped to make the College worthy of the entire territory tributary to Brandon.

Giving a short sketch of the College, Dr. Whidden said that Brandon College really began in Rapid City. Dr. McKee started an academy there, but when Rapid City did not get in on the main line, he moved the academy to Brandon, and in 1899 a charter was granted to the institution. Since that time the school has grown and made for itself a great reputation. The College has grown in the inside but not on the outside.

The First Appeal

The speaker declared that the first appeal for funds for extension work would have to be for more than \$300,000. Of this amount a great portion would be used for new buildings while the remainder would be devoted to endowment purposes. About \$100,000 would be asked for from Brandon citizens and the remainder would be collected from outsiders.

Mentioning some facts in connection with the work of the College, Dr. Whidden said every nationality was in attendance at the institution. As far as money is concerned, the speaker estimated that at least \$150,000 was spent in the city each year by the students attending the College. Over \$32,000 had been kept in this city by reason of the fact that many local students who would have to go out of the city if there had not been a College here, and remained in Brandon and received their education in this city.

Dr. Whidden then showed the prospective plans for the College extension, which called for a new Science Building, a Library, a Memorial Hall and new dormitory accommodation.

Dr. Sparks Gives Impression
Dr. Sparks, who has had previous experience in College extension work, gave some of his impressions since coming to Brandon. After relating the mistake by a stranger in Brandon in taking the Hospital for the Insane for the College, Dr. Sparks said the Brandon College should be as much larger than the Hospital for the Insane, as the Hospital is larger than the College at the present time. He believed that Brandon has the power to put the big scheme over, and he urged the co-operation of public spirit. "We want this College to be not only worthy of Brandon, but of Western Canada," declared Dr. Sparks.

The real need of the College is a Science Building, a Girls' Dormitory and a Gymnasium, and these should be really erected within a year's time. The Science Building is urgently needed, however, and would

cost about \$150,000, and Dr. Sparks intimated that it would be a matter of pride to this city if the citizens could put over this amount themselves. He appealed to the citizens to put their efforts behind this larger program of the institution.

A Practical Reason

Mr. J. S. Wilmott supported the project and said that the good of the College could not be over-estimated in a community. He declared the College should be supported also because of the very practical reason that so much money would be spent in the city. The scheme depends more on Brandon citizens than the mere intrinsic value of giving, because if Brandon citizens do not respond, then the canvassers cannot go before outsiders for support. He thought that the project should be taken hold of very enthusiastically.

A Big Proposition

"This is the biggest and boldest thing the city has ever attempted," said Mr. J. F. Kilgour. It is a matter of vision and for the people of Brandon. "Surely the city can rise to the occasion," said the speaker. The strength of a city lies in the strength and courage of the citizens. We must have this strength to make our city a success. It is a part of our duty to make our city grow and we must develop the institutions that thrive here. If Brandon does not put it over, some other city probably would, for the growth of the College cannot be stopped now.

A Worthy Cause

"No subject of such vital importance has ever been before the city before," declared Mr. A. E. McKenzie in supporting the project. "A bird in the hand is worth two in the bush"—Brandon College is here and he believed that this city would enable the institution to carry out its entire scheme by a very generous support to the extension program. There is no cause so worthy as this one, said Mr. McKenzie, and let us make it our civic boast.

Further support of the project was given by Mr. F. W. Hobson. The time is here for the expansion of the College and now is the logical time to get behind it. He therefore moved that the Brandon Board of Trade endorse this proposition and get behind the project enthusiastically. Mr. J. S. Wilmott seconded the resolution, and said that Brandon people should not be at all timid about putting this scheme over. The resolution was passed unanimously. It was explained by Dr. Sparks that it is the intention of the College officials to put on the drive before the end of the month. It was then moved that a small advisory committee be appointed by President Kennedy to act in conjunction with the College officials in the furtherance of their plans.
