FATAL ACCIDENT AT GRAND FALLS

Aged Man Instantly Killed When Thrown From Sleigh

A very sad accident occurred here on Saturday evening about six o'clock by which Octave Gagne, an aged resident of our town, lost his life. Mr. Gagne, who was about 70 years of age, had been driving with a friend and stopped at the post office to get the mail. His friend, Mr. Theriault, went in to get the mail and Mr. Gagne sat in the sleigh. A dog ran at the horse, which was but a colt, biting its heels, and of course the colt becoming frightened ran away throwing Mr. Gagne out. His head struck the town building killing him instantly. A number of persons on the sidewalk had very narrow escapes from death or serious injury and for a minute it looked as though the animal would go through Wade's plate glass window; but he changed his course just in time to avoid that, and crossing the street got into deep snow where he was caught. Much sympathy is felt for those so suddenly and sadly bereaved. Miss Alma Gagne, who keeps a general store here, is a daughter of the deceased. There are four sons and six daughters, all grown up.

William McCluskey died at his home about four miles below town on Tuesday after a little over a week's illness with throat and heart trouble. Mr. McCluskey was about 64 years of age and leaves a widow and eight children to mourn the loss of a kind husband and father. Mr. McCluskey had a large circle of relatives in this, his home town who all have the sympathy of the community in their sorrow. The funeral took place Thursday morning at nine o'clock.

Gunner Harley P. Burpee is a despatch rider in No. 6 Canadian Siege Battery. He enlisted in December, 1915 in No. 7 Battery at St. John, and sailed for England in June, 1916, and to France in September of the same year. He has ever since been on the fighting line except for 10 days leave in Paris and two weeks in England. Although many times in danger he has never been injured or sick. Last fall he was recommended for a commission as lieutenant in the Royal Flying Corps, but being in the excess of the required weight he was prevented from enlisting in that division of army life. Gunner Burpee is the son of Frank Burpee of Jacksonville, where his wife, who was a daughter of Stephen Orser, jr., of Windsor, lives.

Fatal Accident on the B. & A.

One fellow is dead and two suffering from burns as the result of an accident to a freight train on the Bangor and Aroostook railroad near Van Buren. The crown sheet of the locomotive of a north bound train blew out and Engineer Bishop and Fireman J. H. Corey were burned.

Brakeman Harry T. Tidd, who was riding on the engine, jumped when the explosion occurred. He struck a hard snowbank beside the track and rolled under the train, the wheel passed over him. He was instantly killed.

Tidd belonged in Island Falls and was unmarried.

DEATH SADDENS A CENTREVILLE HOME

Wife of Postmaster Clark is Called Away—Panic at East Florenceville

The Centreville correspondent says:

Mrs. Marion Clark, wife of L. B. Clark, postmaster here, died Wednesday morning after a lingering illness of diabetes. While Mrs. Clark's condition was critical, she was not expected to quickly and her death was very sudden. The funeral was held at the Baptist church on Friday afternoon. The services were conducted by her pastor, Rev. S. Johnston, assisted by Rev. W. J. Hurlow and J. B. Champion and the attendance was large. The late Mrs. Clark was 67 years of age and was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alonzo Taylor of East Florenceville. For several years she and her husband have taken care of the latter's parents, James and Lucy Clark. James Clark died about four years ago at the age of 93 and Aunt Lucy is still living at the age of 87 and still retains her faculties and is comparatively smart physically until the past week. A husband, daughter, Miss Winnie at home, and two sons, Burton and Randolph, both living here, are left to mourn, besides a large number of relatives and friends. The sympathy of the community is extended to the bereaved family.
