THE JOGGINS RAILWAY CASE.—Mr.
W. H. Fry, stenographer, who had
been appointed by Judge Tuck, sitting
in equity, to take the evidence of John
C. Brown in the case of the Joggins
Railway vs. the Merchants Bank of
Halifax, did not conclude taking the
evidence, when the commission adjourned
on Saturday until the latter part of
October, when certain additional papers
and books, not available at the last ex-
amination, will be produced. Hon. A.
G. Blair, Q. C., J. D. Phinney, Q. C.,
and H. A. Powell, M. P. P. are pre-
sent as counsel on behalf of the bank,
and Hon. Wm. Pugsley, Q. C., W. W.
Wells, Q. C. and Mr. C. Tread appeared
on behalf of the railway.

A REASONABLE REQUEST.—"Will

The above request on the part of read-
ing room authorities seems reasonable
enough and it is a pity that any person
should render such a request necessary.
It is a very poor return for the kind-
ness of the ladies in maintaining such
a pleasant and in every way creditable
reading room to carry away the books
and keep them without the knowledge
or consent of the person in charge.
Probably the books were taken in
ignorance of the rules governing the
reading room and kept through care-
lessness and it is to be hoped that they
will be returned at once.

MR. ALLISON.—Acting on the principle
that recreation is a change of occupa-
tion rather than a cessation of labor
Mr. Allison's new conservatory director
devotes an hour or two daily to literary
work on some of the leading musical
magazines of the States. He is also
working on a book on the work of
teachers and pupils. His Read Organ
Method is taking a leading position,
selling by thousands. The new Piano-
forte Method by Mr. Landon, known as
Landon's Pianoforte Method, is being
printed in Barilli Point Type for the
blind, by the Perkins Institute for the
Blind, of Boston, Mass. A new book
by Mr. Landon for music teachers and
pupils, "Music Writing Book," was
published this week. This work teaches
the latest methods of notation, and
shows the time values of notes, and in
fact, everything that is writeable in
music.

A new feature at the Conservatory
of Music is a musical lecture on Wednes-
day of each week at 9 o'clock p. m. The
subject for this week was "The Imagination
in Piano Playing," illustrated by
general pieces played on the piano by
the director. The next lecture will be
first of an extended course. Each lec-
ture is to be illustrated at the piano and
Prof. Landon will be assisted in the il-
lustrations by teachers and advanced
pupils. Prof. Landon extends to those
in Sackville who are interested in music
a hearty invitation to be present. The
lectures in every case begin promptly at 9.

In conversation the new director
remarked: "Recent methods teach
young people the science of harmony in
an interesting way. The old time dry-
adust methods were more discouraging
than helpful."

Mr. Landon brings a large and well
selected musical library with him to
Mr. Allison, books from which will be
loaned free to the Conservatory pupils.

A normal class is being formed for
the many music teachers now taking
classes. A regular three years course
is given to perfect teachers for their pro-
fession and special attention paid to
this department.

The attendance at the Academy
and Commercial College is in advance
even of last year and every thing seems
to indicate a most successful year. The
gymnasium class especially is in a very
flourishing condition.

for this year's students, who began to
arrive yesterday. Work on the new
building is progressing very favorably.
