The death occurred rather suddenly about 9 o'clock yesterday morning at her home on Smythe street of Mrs. Mary Dougherty, widow of the late William Dougherty, at the age of 76 years. Mrs. Dougherty spent the month of June, July and part of August at McLaren's Beach, St. John, with her daughters and returned home about ten days ago in the enjoyment of the best of health. On Monday last she was taken ill with heart trouble and yesterday morning she ate a light breakfast and passed away shortly afterwards. Deceased was a lady of kindly habits, with a host of warm personal friends who will learn with deep regret of her passing away. She was before marriage Miss Mary Cameron and is survived by four sons, William, of Boston; Robert, of Port Arthur; George, of Calgary; and Nathaniel C., of this city; two daughters, Mrs. John Spears and Miss M. E. Dougherty, St. John, and one sister, Mrs. Robert Habberty, of Montreal, Mass. The funeral will take place from her late home, 239 Smythe street, at 2:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. A short service will be conducted at the house by Rev. A. P. Bate, assisted by Rev. Dr. Sutherland, after which the cortege will proceed to Christchurch Parish Church, where service will be held and interment at Rural cemetery.

## ANOTHER STILL CAPTURED IN WAR ON HOME BREWERS

Good Samaritan Pays Cloverdale Man's Fine Before Warrant is Issued

### RAISINS IN HOME BREW SEIZED AT OROMOCTO

\$200 Fine for Proprietor of The Farm for Operating a Still

War on the makers of "home brew" and "moonshine" liquors is still going merrily on hereabouts.

On Saturday inspectors found a mess of "home brew" in the course of manufacture at the home of Hamilton Edwards at Oromocto, Sunbury County, he was haled before Magistrate Kimball at Oromocto and fined \$50. The seizure was made by W. P. Dawes, of St. John, special enforcement officer of the Inland Revenue Department, and sub-inspector Fraser Saunders of the Prohibition staff. They found signs of raisins and other ingredients generally used in the manufacture of home brew these days but it was classified as malt liquor rather than spirituous, which is the explanation of the fine being the lightest penalty possible under the Inland Revenue Act.

While Officer Dawes was in Sunbury, however, some good Samaritan appeared at the York County Jail and paid the \$200 fine necessary to obtain the release of James Lindsay, of Cloverdale, who had commenced to serve his sentence of six months rather than pay the fine imposed for having parts of a home-made still in his possession when Prohibition inspectors visited his home recently. On Friday the Inland Revenue enforcement officer had formally preferred a charge against Lindsay under the Inland Revenue Act and had applied to Police Magistrate Limerick for the issue of a warrant. ## MOST EVERYBODY A DETECTIVE NOW

Forty Amateur Sleuths Have Told Chief Finley About Murder Suspects

Every man his own detective seems to be the slogan of the country-wide man hunt for the murderer of the little McAuley girl in St. John.

As an instance of this Chief of Police W. H. Finley has received about forty telephone messages from persons who were certain they had seen a man answering the description sent out by the St. John police. Of these calls approximately fifteen originated in the city while the remainder have come in from surrounding districts.

On Thursday last an employee of a local livery stable informed chief that he saw a man answering the description on the Newcastle road near the Penniac bridge on Tuesday.

When observed the stranger ran down over the river bank and into the river from where he is said to have told the informant to go about his own business and leave him alone.

He was chased across the river the amateur sleuth claiming to have taken the bridge route but the stranger escaped, owing to his greater strength.

Later the amateur sleuth contradicted himself and stated the occurrence as having taken place below the Marysville dam.

## EXPECT CENSUS TO SHOW INCREASE 25 PER CENT. HERE

Official Figures Likely to Be Made Public Within a Short Time

### FREDERICTON PLACED AT ABOUT 9,000

Believed York-Sunbury District Will Show Population of About 40,000

Census-taking in York-Sunbury has been completed, the office which Census Commissioner Ashford had established in the Federal Building here has been closed and all the returns and documents have been forwarded to Ottawa.

No announcement has been made as to the results of the labors of the census takers and none will be given out except through the office of the Dominion statistician at Ottawa. All commissioners and others engaged in taking the census were under instructions to make no figures public, and therefore Commissioner Ashford stands off all inquirers for information as to population.

While the popular belief has been that the census would show Fredericton with a population of not less than 10,000, these predictions are likely to be found considerably astray when the actual census figures are published. As a matter of fact the population of Fredericton will probably not be shown to be quite up to the 9,000 mark, although it would probably have shown nearer 10,000 if the time for the decennial census had fallen at a more favorable period.

Even with 9,000 as the population the increase will be material, as the figures in 1911 were 7,298, when the census was taken. In 1911 York county showed a population of 31,620, or 8.75 to the square mile, while Sunbury was linked up with Queens county in a district which showed only 6.77 to the square mile. The official figures will probably be given out soon.

## END OF WORLD IS AT HAND, DECLARES THIS PREACHER

Rev. M. C. Burt, of Chelsea, Mass., Discussed Subject at North Devon

### NEW KINGDOM WILL BE WITHOUT LIQUOR TRAFFIC

Second Coming Nigh at Hand, He Tells Congregation at Advent Christian Church

"Things that have happened since 1914 to prove that the second coming of Christ is at hand" was the subject of the sermon delivered by the Rev. M. C. Burt, of Chelsea, Mass., at the Advent Christian Church, North Devon, last evening.

The world war, the end of the last of the Roman empires, Russia, Germany and Austria-Hungary, the end of Gentile oppression of Jerusalem and the flight of the Turk from Constantinople, were the subjects discussed as indicative of the fifth world revolution, after which it has been prophesied, the preached declared, comes the "Kingdom of God."

Four world revolutions have now occurred, said Rev. Mr. Burt, the first being under Nebuchadnezzar, the second under Cyrus, the third under Alexander the Great, followed by the fourth under the Caesars. Daniel's prophecy regarding the vision of Nebuchadnezzar in which he saw an image of a man with a golden head, silver breast, brass belly and thighs and legs of iron and clay, was treated as symbolic of the four great world empires under Nebuchadnezzar, Cyrus, Alexander and the Roman empire, the last traces of which have now vanished.

"We can't have the new kingdom without the King, therefore the second coming is nigh at hand," declared the pastor, "and we shall have a kingdom free from the liquor traffic and other evils."
