Freeman and Dunham will offer a singing and talking skit entitled "A Day at Brighton" which abounds in clever humor and good singing.

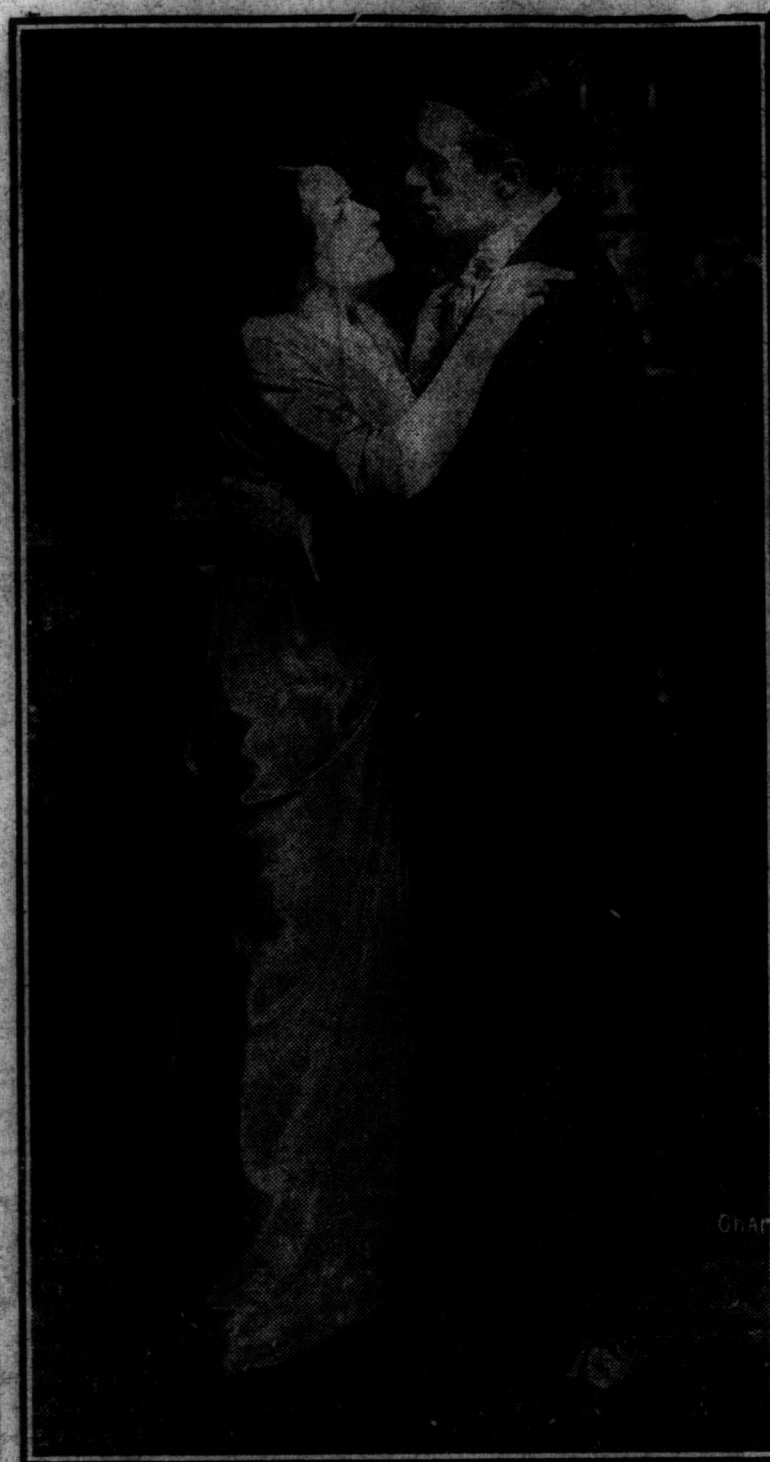
