SERIOUSLY HURT AT CAYUGA FAIR.

MATTHEW HALL, OF NELLES' COR-NERS, RUN OVER YESTERDAY.

Was Watching Highland Dancing When a Horseman Drove on Track and He Did Not Hear Warning.

A serious accident occurred yesterday afternoon in Cayuga, at the Haldimand County fair, when Matthew Hall, of Nelles Corners, was knock down by horse and rig that were being driven on the race track by Mr. John Farrell. The accident happened while Master

Gordon Flett, the Highland dancer of this city, was performing before the thousands in the grand stand.

Mr. Hall had gone out on the race track between the grand stand and where Master Flett was dancing, so that he might see the dancing at closer range. There were hundreds on the track at the time, and the sight of the horse empreoching at a high rate of speed approaching at a high rate of speed toward the throng, caused consternation. Those on the outside of the crowd, shouttoward the throng, caused consternation. Those on the outside of the crowd, shouted to the rest to get out of the way, as Farrell was coming very quickly, and did not show any signs of stopping. The crowd quickly scattered, but Mr. Hall, who evidently did not hear the cry of Warning. Mr. Farrell, by this time was so close to Mr. Hall that he did not have time to pull up his horse. The front wheel of the carriage knocked Mr. Hall down and the rear wheel on the same side passed over him. He lay stunned on the track for a moment, and then the crowd tushed to his assistance. A doctor was present and at the time, said there were no bones broken. The injured man was lifted to a nearby carriage and taken into town. Half an hour after the accident, Mr. Hall was unconscious.
