Egg and Poultry Marketing Associations

Arrangements Being Made to Extend the Work to Western Provinces

While the activities of the Live Stock Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture with regard to the organization of Co-operative Egg and Poultry Marketing Associations have been largely confined to date to the Eastern Provinces, the Dominion Department is now extending its work to the Western Provinces. From the fact that co-operative marketing of poultry products was something entirely new, it was thought advisable to thoroughly test out the practicability of the system before extending it to a wider area. Satisfactory results having been obtained in the East, arrangements are now being made to extend the work to the Western Provinces.

The new field to be organized will receive the benefit of the experience of men who have been associated with the co-operative work since its inception. Mr. T. A. Benson, who in charge of the co-operative organization in Prince Edward Island is being transferred to the Province of Alberta to fill a position similar to that which he has held in Prince Edward Island.

Mr. J. H. Hare, who has had an extensive experience in this work, not only with the Ontario Provincial Department of Agriculture, but also during the last two years with the commercial and marketing end of the work undertaken by the Live Stock Branch, has been given the supervision of the Egg and Poultry Marketing Association in the Province of Alberta. Mr. Hare is now in the Western Provinces and will devote the greater part of his time for the next year to directing operations there. For the present he will continue his activities principally in the Province of Saskatchewan.

Mr. R. J. Allen, B. S. A. has been appointed to take immediate charge of the organization of co-operative Egg and Poultry Marketing Associations in Manitoba. Mr. Allen has had an extensive experience not only in the commercial end of the work, but also in the marketing of farm products. He enters the work in Prince Edward Island, therefore, well equipped to take up the problems that have developed in connection with the advanced nature of the work at that point.

Serbian Receiving Brutal Treatment

Aged Men, Women and Children Flee From Bulgarians

Rome, (via Harro), Oct. 22—Terrible atrocities by Bulgarian troops are described by Serbian refugees arriving in Greek territory, according to Athens advices today. Most of the fugitives are said to be very old men, women and young children. The Greeks are receiving them hospitably in London, Oct. 23—From reports that the Allies are now advancing northward from Salonika, it was believed here today that an important battle was near with the Bulgarian forces astraddle the Salonika-Nish railroad south of Uskub.

To break this Bulgarian line or throw the invaders back to the eastward, will be necessary before the Franco-British troops can get to the Serbians and against the Austro-Germans in the north.

The Teutonic front, from all accounts, is progressing southward so slowly that confidence was increasing of the Allies' ability to reinforce the Serbians adequately in time to save Nish.
