## Growing Demand for Repeal of Scott Act

Temperance People Claim Provincial Law is Most Effective Prohibition Measure

A meeting in the interests of the repeal of the Scott Act was held in the hall of the Chatham Temperance Hall, Tuesday night, 10th instant. Rev. J. H. Gray, of the choir, presided. The speakers were Rev. J. H. Gray, W. D. Wilson, secretary of the N. B. Branch of the Dominion Alliance, Rev. S. J. MacArthur and Rev. J. J. Pinkerton in favor of Repeal, and Aldermen B. P. MacLachlan and W. H. Snowball in favor of retaining the Scott Act.

Anthony Adams of Chatham, declared that there was an understanding between Chatham liquor sellers and the town council that the Scott Act should be used as a virtual license system for the collection of so many fines per year.

Under it any officer may seize liquor without warrant except in a private residence, and that ceases to be immune after first conviction. The penalty for second offence is from 3 to 9 months imprisonment; for third, from 9 to 12, and for all subsequent offences one year. No penalty may be remitted, and all fines must be collected at once. The speaker pointed out that under Scott Act the imprisonment for second and subsequent offences is not more than four months and the judge may give any less penalty he pleases. Instead of being left to local enforcement, as is the Scott Act and even the N. S. prohibition Act, the N. B. Act, said Mr. Wilson, will be enforced entirely by the Government, and no such examples of law enforcement as in Sydney and several other N. S. towns, and in many towns in Scott Act countries, will be allowed.

Rev. S. J. MacArthur declared that Newcastle was now drier than it had been before. He pointed out that the importation of liquor was now nearly stopped except by wagon and automobile from Chatham. He asserted that Chatham had not the real Scott Act in practice but a prostitution of it. He urged Chatham people to help repeal the Act.

Ald. MacLachlan said the Scott Act should be kept until it was proven in other places that prohibition was better. He contended that people could not be made temperate by a change of law without a change of heart.

Rev. Mr. Pinkerton, of Chatham, wished to place himself on record as in favor of the Prohibition Act. Ald. Snowball agreed with Ald. MacLachlan. He would stand by the Scott Act and work to keep it until

## Fair Warning to 132nd. Absentees

The Union Advocate is in receipt of the following letter which is self explanatory, and upon which no comment is required:

Sussex, N. B.

Oct. 12th, 1916

To the Editor, The Advocate, Newcastle, N. B.

Dear Mr. Editor, I have been asked to request you to please have a notice in the form of news put in your paper, calling on all men of the 132nd to return to their Battalion.

There are a few men who are at home overstaying their leave and through one cause or another have not yet returned, and there are others somewhat indifferent. You might point out to them through your columns that by their own free will every consideration will be shown them, but if they do not, they will be liable to be prosecuted, and if prosecuted a conviction is certain before any magistrate, and for even half a day's absence a man is liable to get two years imprisonment.

If there are any men without means to pay for their transportation, they can wire to the Battalion and arrangements will be made to bring them back. The Battalion is now on the eve of sailing and we wish to go overseas as strong as possible.

## NURSES WANTED FOR THE IMPERIAL SERVICE

Queen Alexandra's Imperial Military Nursing Service has called for 200 volunteers from Canada, and this Military District has been asked to supply 66. The nurses recommended from M. D. No. 4 must submit a certificate of graduation to the Lady Superintendent of the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal. They must, of course, comply with the ordinary medical requirements for the A. M. C. and be over 45 years of age. If any nurses wish to enquire further into the matter, they should correspond with the Major or with the Lady Supt. of the Royal Victoria Hospital, forwarding necessary certificates along with such letters of recommendation from their respective superintendents or physicians as they wish to enclose.

On receipt of a recommendation from the Lady Supt. of the R. V. H., their names would be submitted to the Director-General Medical Services, Ottawa, who will then communicate with the A. D. M. S. D. No. 6 for completion of M. P. R. 28 and M. P. R. 33. The assumption is that nurses from the Maritime Provinces will proceed overseas from Halifax or St. John and not be brought to Montreal. Further instructions received by Lt.-Col. Guthrie state as follows: "Nurses of service. One year, non-renewable, or for duration of war; 2. Day, Sister \$50, staff nurse \$40, per annum; 3. Board, washing, one guinea abroad, 15s. in United Kingdom; 4. uniform, 2s. abroad, 6s. at home; 5. Passage will be provided to and from Canada to destination, and return passage except engagement terminates voluntarily, by resignation or for misconduct."

Nurses are to be selected and recommended by matrons of John Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, for American Nurses in Canada, Toronto, Winnipeg, General Hospitals, Royal Victoria, Montreal.

## SCHOOL TEACHERS' INFLUENCE

Foundation for Many Needed Improvements May be Laid in Schools

To the rising generation must we look for many changes and improvements in our municipal conditions. The children of the present, under the influence of a broad-minded teacher, will absorb lessons which will later be an enormous influence for good. A recognition of this fact, and of the great dependence placed upon them, should be in the mind of everyone entrusted with the upbringing of our youth. The extent to which this power to influence children for good is recognized may be gleaned from the number of appeals made to the school teachers for assistance. Every interested working for the betterment of Canada and Canadians lays stress upon the necessity of securing the recognition and support of the children.

To this already long list has been added a call for the influence of school teachers in the keeping of streets from litter. To a large extent, the children are responsible for this. Waste paper, chewing gum and candy wrappers are thrown on streets and sidewalks regardless of the untidiness they cause. This litter is carried by the wind, and blowing about the streets, frightens horses, causing many runaways and sometimes serious accidents. Waste paper also collects in sheltered places, falls through gratings into basement window openings, or accumulates against wooden buildings or fences; a lighted match or a cigar or cigarette stub carelessly thrown aside may fall upon this accumulation of litter and cause a fire. All fires are the same size at the start, and it is the apparently small and harmless fire which sometimes causes the greatest loss, both of property and lives.

The school teachers have it in their power to inculcate in their pupils a spirit of pride in the appearance of the streets, and great benefits will accrue from this effort on their part.

## RESULTS ARE WONDERFUL FROM TEMPERANCE ACT

So Says Provincial Police Officer of Ontario

"Results are wonderful" is the verdict of Superintendent J. Rogers, of the Provincial Police, who made a trip through the unorganized districts of Northern Ontario to investigate for the department the working of the Ontario temperance act. Superintendent Rogers was through the Porcupine, Schumacher and Timmins districts.

"A drunk," said he, "really is a relic in the north now. Much progress has been made by the authorities prior to the enactment of the prohibitory legislation, but the result of the working of the new act is everywhere regarded as phenomenal. So far as our reports go and so far as I could learn there have not been more than two or three cases of drunkenness in the whole north since September 16th."

A very great advance has recently been made by Elmer A. Sperry of New York. Mr. Sperry has already made a number of very valuable inventions of particular use in the present war, mostly relating to automatic stabilizers and steering devices for aeroplanes. But his most recent improvement is in increasing the power of searchlights. He has just mounted, on the roof of his laboratory in Brooklyn, a search light which is 60% more powerful than the most powerful one now existing. The present most powerful one, at the Brooklyn navy yard, is credited with making objects plainly visible at over 35 miles. Increase the power of that by 60% and it is hard to believe how far Mr. Sperry will be able to see objects with his light. It has a candle power of 1,280,000,000.

It would be a great thing for either army to have a very few such lights. This is only one of the many valuable scientific advances which the war has forced into being, many years earlier than would otherwise be the case.

## ACHIEVEMENT OF BIRD PROTECTIONISTS

Uniform Protection for Birds Throughout Canada and the United States

Bird lovers throughout North America are deeply gratified over the recent conclusion of the treaty under which Canada and the United States will co-operate in extending adequate protection to insectivorous bird life. The treaty applies to useful birds of migratory habits, and includes practically all our Canadian songsters, most of which are invaluable destroyers of insect pests. An absolute close season throughout the year is imposed on migratory insectivorous birds, enumerated as follows: Bobolinks, catbirds, chickadees, cuckoos, flickers, flycatchers, grosbeaks, hummingbirds, kinglets, martins, meadowlarks, nighthawks or bull bats, nuthawks or bull hawks, nuthatches, orioles, robins, shrikes, swallows, swifts, tanagers, titmice, thrushes, vireos, warblers, waxwings, whippoorwills, woodpeckers and wrens, and all other perching birds which feed entirely or chiefly on insects. Except for scientific or propagating purposes, these birds, their eggs or their nests may not be taken at any time.

Bird protectionists in general, whether actuated chiefly by sentimental or economic motives, have fought a hard battle and achieved a magnificent triumph. The greatest of their cause, from a purely material standpoint, may be appreciated when it is stated on competent authority that the annual loss in the United States on farm and forest products, chargeable to insect pests, exceeds \$500,000,000. As Canada's losses are no doubt proportionately great, it is evident that no efforts should be spared to protect birds and all other insect destroyers.

Bird protection in Canada is a matter of provincial jurisdiction, and in most cases the laws have been fairly adequate. If properly carried out, however, the provisions of the treaty,
