

Those newspapers whose habit it is to comment upon the foreign affairs, condemn the action in strong terms. The others follow the communiqué with a few sarcastic observations.

BRITAIN MUST TAKE UP CHALLENGE
Hungary or her 'Impotence Will be Naked Before the World.'

London, March 26.—Commenting on the situation in Hungary, the Daily Chronicle says:

The position is that one of the defeated enemy states has broken the armistice and declared war on us. If we take up the challenge and reinforce our control, the world will know that, despite war weariness, demobilization, strikes, and disagreements, we are still masters of Europe and are determined to remain so until we establish the foundations of a new and better system for which we fought. But if we do not take action, our impotence will be naked before all, and many people beside the magyars will hasten to take advantage of it.

COUNTRY STILL FAR FROM CERTAIN PEACE

London, March 26.—In the House of Lords last night Viscount Milner, the Secretary for the Colonies, said that in his opinion the country was still far from a certain and well established peace. Therefore, he declared, the army and navy estimates could not be reduced.

THE VALUE OF IRRIGATION

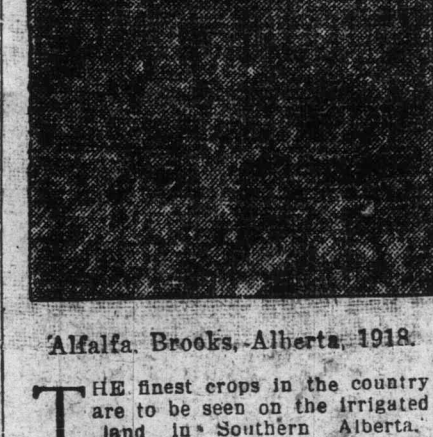
Irrigated Wheat, 1918, Brooks, Alberta.

The finest crops in the country are to be seen on the irrigated land in Southern Alberta.

This is a remark invariably made by those who have travelled through Western Canada. And there is no doubt that this remark is true if all the crops on irrigated land in Alberta are as good as those near Brooks. This is a small town on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, about a hundred miles from the city of Calgary, and the centre of one of the most fertile pieces of country on the continent. Though sparsely settled, it is estimated that a quarter of a million bushels of grain will be harvested from irrigated lands in this district this year. Many bushels will yield from thirty to forty bushels to the acre. While there is nothing extraordinary about yields of this kind, such being obtainable every year, the yields upon

make this part of Alberta one of the most prosperous districts on the continent.

These irrigated lands have immense possibilities in the raising of live stock, and their importance in this respect cannot be too greatly emphasized. The enormous crops of alfalfa and other fodder crops that can be grown, combined with the healthy climate, make the country an ideal one for the raising and fattening of cattle, sheep and hogs. Already there have been some great successes that indicate what can be done in this branch of farming. Unquestionably there is a great opportunity for the development of this industry here, conditions being ideal, less capital being required than on higher priced land in other parts of the continent, while results are satisfactory as anywhere may be looked for.

CANADIAN RAILWAYS WILL MOVE TIME ON

Toronto, March 26.—It was announced today at the head office of the Canadian National Railways that no matter what action was taken by the Canadian Government regarding daylight saving all lines of the Canadian Government system would change their time simultaneously with the United States in order to avoid confusion and loss of connection with United States Roads. Montreal despatches say that the C. P. R. and G. T. R. have arranged their schedules with the expectation of putting the clocks ahead next week and they will stick to it. Major Cooper of Vancouver, B. C. will bring the matter up in the Commons this afternoon and the Government will make an announcement.

TROOPS FROM OLYMPIC LANDED BY TENDER

Halifax, March 26.—The Olympic did not attempt to dock this morning owing to the continued high wind sweeping the troopship pier, and the work of disembarking her soldiers passengers by tender was begun in earnest. It is hoped to complete the work today. The port liner then will dock at the new south end terminals where she will coal.

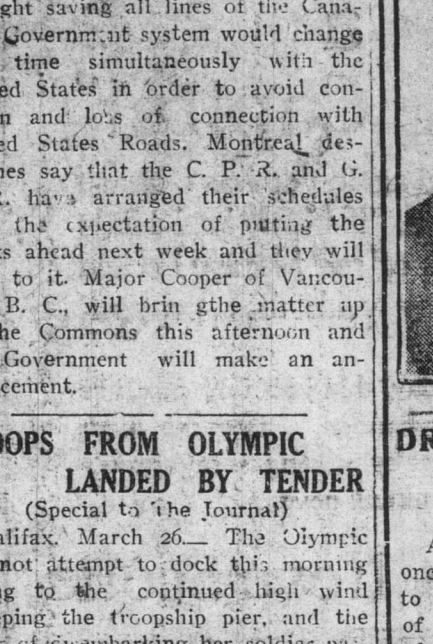
