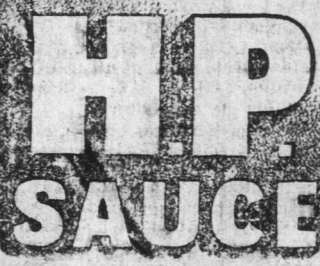

Cable News.

LONDON, Nov. 22. A cabinet crisis is threatened by the demand of the Minister of Finance for wholesale cuts in the Budget. It will probably be averted. Although the ministerial council has reached no decision, and ministers refused to comply with Yamamoto's demands, it became known to-day that some progress had been made, and that the disputed points in the Budget were now reducible to a matter of a few million yen. It is hoped that a decision will be reached at the next meeting of the Council on Friday.

LONDON, Nov. 22. Much talk has been aroused in society circles by an official announcement in the London Gazette that the appointment of the Rev. F. H. Farrar as domestic Chaplain to the King has been cancelled. It is also reported by the Daily Express that the Rev. Mr. Farrar has resigned the living of Sandringham.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 22. Nell Nelson, a member of the Australian Parliament, empowered by his Government to negotiate the principles of a Reciprocity Treaty with the United States, arrived here yesterday and proceeded to Washington.

LONDON, Nov. 22. The Insurance Bill, introduced by Chancellor Lloyd George, has passed the Committee Stage of the House of Commons in an amended form and with some of its details modified.

PEKIN, Nov. 22. The killing of foreigners at Shan Fu is further confirmed by Chinese students who have arrived here from that city. The mob attacked the China Inland Mission and murdered Mrs. Beckman, an American missionary, and five of the mission children.

PEKIN, Nov. 22. The Imperialist troops are concentrating on Shikia Ching, in Shan Hi Province, with the intention of attacking the revolutionists of that Province. Eon Chang is in command of the Imperialists.

PEKIN, Nov. 22. A news despatch from Tien Tsin says that the situation at Nanking is desperate. The Imperialist forces are outnumbered, surrounded, short of provisions and with retreat cut off. The fate of being cut off by the revolutionists appears imminent. The Manchus in Peking are fostering an anti-foreign propaganda.

LONDON, Nov. 22. The hitherto consistently radical stronghold of South Somerset has gone over to the Unionists. Hon. A. Herbert has been elected to the peerage caused by raising to the peerage Sir Edward Strachey. Herbert's majority is 148. This is the second Unionist gain since Bonar Law became leader.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22. Determined to avoid giving any pretext for foreign intervention, for financial reasons, China's Government has ordered all receipts from the Maritime Customs, including the 1901 boxers' rebellion indemnity, to be deposited with the foreign banks to the credit of China's foreign debtors.

LONDON, Nov. 22. The Persian Government this afternoon officially notified the British Government that, acting under the latter's advice, they would comply with the demands of Russia's ultimatum.

DIPHTHERIA AT TRAPESAY.—Yesterday the Health Authorities were advised of an outbreak of diphtheria at Trapesay, in one house where several of those residing are ill. Dr. Giovanniotti is looking after the patients.

Farmer is Curious About that Cattle Jobbing.

Dear Mr. Editor,—Many of us farmers are delighted with the persistency with which you ask for an explanation of the Government cattle jobbing, as you aptly term it, and there are a lot more concerned over the silence of the Government. Curiosity makes us rack our brains for a solution of these problems, and then these questions come to us: Was it a business venture on the part of the Board? This we doubt, on account of the way the cattle were sold. Was it another huge "con," for which they say the Premier is famous? Whatever way you look at it, it seems queer. The owners of those cattle at Burn did not give them as a present. The only conclusion we can arrive at is that they were sold at a loss, price, freight and keep considered. There must be something mysterious about these transactions, as there was a lot of local cattle sold here a day or two ago not one whit better, and they all brought fair prices. Some of these butchers were there and bought them, but no cattle went for eight and ten dollars each.

See here, Mr. Editor, a great thought strikes me. Oh, why did nobody think of it before? You are asking how the Government was going to pay for the building of the branch railways. Sure, did not the Government save an auctioneer's and his clerk's expenses at this sale? Did not the Secretary sell them, and didn't the Commissioner mark the prices down? (I never knew Mr. Downey's life before.) Won't that go a long way towards building those railway branches?

I wonder, Mr. Editor, whether the Government will continue its venture in cattle-jobbing after your exposure of this affair, and thus enable some butcher to continue making a good thing out of it. Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. Many women this morning were sentenced to imprisonment summarily or committed for trial at the London Sessions. Some are prominent in society as well as leaders of the Suffrage movement. A number of them had suffered imprisonment previously on account of their unlawful activities in certain demonstrations. Lady Lytton has been in jail on several occasions since 1909, and caused a sensation because she refused to get prison food. Mrs. Howfield and Mrs. Lawrence have been arrested in several suffragette demonstrations.

OTTAWA, To-day. If British firms cannot manufacture wholly in Britain the swords furnished to the Canadian Militia, they will have to be made in Canada, according to the order issued by the Minister of Militia. At the recent military conference, Col. Gwynne, of Regina, stated that he had directed to be sent back swords, bought for his cavalry corps in England, but made in Germany. Since then there have been further intimations to the Department, that these articles are still furnished to the Department for use by Canadians, which are manufactured either wholly in Germany or in other countries, and that the swords are only nominally made in England. The chief points stated were that the parts are made in foreign lands and only put together in England.

Cconciliation Boards.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Mr. Editor.—I wish to bring under the notice of all parties interested in maintaining harmonious relations between employers and employees the necessity of establishing by law some form of Arbitration or Conciliation Boards to deal with labor disputes. I have in mind a labor dispute that occurred in this city last summer as a result of a difference of opinion between a merchant and a man employed at stevedocking. Now I do not intend to express any opinion on the merits of the case, but I know that this strike was likely to be a serious affair, and would in time affect the freight handlers and truckmen. A few years ago we had the moulders' strike. There were about thirty men in this Union, and in consequence of that strike all the building trades of St. John's were affected. Hundreds of carpenters, masons and joiners were walking the streets idle, because orders for plaster, stokers and other iron work could not be filled. We can see by this result that under modern conditions you cannot have a strike in one trade without injuring others. In view of the fact that all our large industries are now organized, I submit that it is wise for our legislators and those who are responsible for the working out of labor problems to get together and form Conciliation and Arbitration Boards. As matters are at present, the manager of a large mercantile firm and the President of a Labor Union may have a sharp difference of opinion on some trivial matter, both may be hot-headed men and in a temper declare either a lock-out or a strike that would affect thousands and may possibly end after weeks of suffering and bitterness even in bloodshed. Now it is obvious that if we had a law that compelled both parties to submit their little differences to a small board of cool-headed men, this dispute would likely be settled promptly to the satisfaction of all without any misery or suffering resulting. It is a terrible power to place in the hands of a merchant or delegate, that without previous reference to any third party they can on their own judgment declare a lock-out or a strike. I commend these few thoughts to the Board of Trade and also the Trade and Labor Council of St. John's, believing that after consideration a measure will be passed by the Legislature that will make it unlawful to declare a strike or lock-out without submitting the question to the Conciliation and Arbitration Board of the colony. I think that this Board ought to be presided over by a Judge of the Supreme Court with two men, one representing Capital, the other Labor. Yours truly, A TRADESMAN.

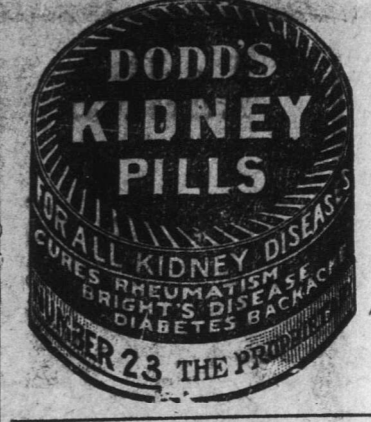
