SYDNEY, N. S., July 29. Edward Scott, was found dead at the Quarries of the Nova Scotia Company at Point Edward this morning. Scott was a native of St. John's, Newfoundland.

LONDON, July 29. Ernest Barry, the English champion sculler, defeated Richard Arnot of Australia, in a race over the Thames course for the sculling championship of the world. This was the first time in sixteen years that the world's sculling championship has been competed for on the Thames.

BRINZ, Germany, July 29. A shocking catastrophe, causing the death of a large number of German excursionists, occurred in a Baltic bathing resort. A landing stage which was crowded during a concert, collapsed and over one hundred people were thrown into the sea. A terrible scene of excitement occurred as the people on shore and those on the ruins of the landing stage endeavoured to rescue the men, women and children struggling in the water. Twenty-six bodies have been recovered, but it is believed many more have lost their lives.

TOKIO, July 29. Mutsuhito, Emperor of Japan, died to-day at 12.45. Acute nephritis was given as the cause of his death. He has been succeeded on the throne by the Crown Prince. Great crowds, which had gathered for days outside the park surrounding the palace till the end, are hushed in silence. Even after the death was announced they remained in the vicinity, the people looking at each other without uttering a word, seeming helplessly depressed. The Crown Prince is greatly overcome by the sad event, which has cast the nation into sorrow.

PARIS, July 29. President Fallieres returned to Paris to-day from Nancy to receive Premier Borden and the other Canadian Ministers at the Elysee, notwithstanding the sudden death of M. Ramondon, Secretary to the President, and the confusion arising therefrom. The visitors have been accorded a warm welcome by the press. La Siclec says: "England cannot but have sympathy with French Canadians in this undertaking. The greater love French Canadians have for France, the more freely will they contribute to the supremacy of the British navy. When the day of battle comes and British warships given by Canada are engaged in the North Sea, the French Canadians will be protecting not only the honor and interest of England, but the glory and security of France."

LONDON, July 29. "Among the important reforms to which the Unionist party is committed," said Bonar Law at a Unionist mass meeting at Blenheim, "one is the providing of preference in overseas markets. Canada and Australia are both urging on us the adoption of this policy. Both want reciprocal treatment within the Empire in peace as well as in war." "If," he continued, "the reciprocity election had gone the other way, our share in Canadian trade would have only amounted to a share of the American trade. From that danger, however, we have been saved in spite of our Government, by the true instinct of the Canadian people. The danger has gone for the moment, but it will recur if we persist in refusing this boon which has been held out to us. Canada has much to offer, and she has many suitors. If we refuse them, her gifts will be eagerly accepted by other nations which are not so blind."

LONDON, July 29. Judgment was rendered by the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council in the test case submitted by the Dominion Government on the Marriage Question. The holding of the law lords is substantially to sustain the Supreme Court's decision in its leading points. The Lancaster Bill seeking to impose a uniform marriage law in all the provinces, is declared ultra vires. The narrow limits in which the Dominion legislators must work when approaching the marriage question, are defined by Lord Haldane, who said that "in their Lordships' opinion there was no reason why what they consider to be the natural construction of the words 'solemnization of marriage' having regard to the law existing in Canada when the British North American Act was passed, should not prevail." This conclusion disposed of the question. Their Lordships avoided answering the questions relating to the validity of marriage of two Catholics before a Protestant, holding that such a point could be decided according to the broad constitutional interpretation they had laid down when such a case came before the Courts of Canada.

Stars Defeat the C.E.I.

IN HARD GAME.

The postponed Star-C. E. I. football match was pulled off on St. George's Field last evening and attracted a large gathering of spectators. A meeting of these veteran teams was formerly looked forward to with increased interest and last evening's exhibition was no exception, as from start to finish the match was exciting and interesting. At seven o'clock the teams took their positions on the field, the Institute boys defending the western goal. The moment the referee sounded the "toot," beginning play the Stars controlled the ball with a desperate rush and for a while confined play to C. E. I. territory. The Stars were determined to score early and gave their opponents back rank a busy time of it. "Neddy" Power and "Neddy" Brophy played a rattling game in the Star forward line. The Institute boys increased their pace and worked east. Harris and Bartlett combined, the former shot within close range and a mix up followed. A corner was conceded the C. E. I. but during the scrimmage F. Harris received a kick in the lower part of the stomach and had to retire. He was sorely missed by his team as he was a fine player. F. James came on to replace him. Shortly after the Star forwards took possession of the leather and dashed west. Power, Ernest and Brophy. The latter through a well-directed shot from the wing sent the leather beyond Hayter, scoring the first goal for the evening. On resuming the Stars continued their rushes and ere long Brophy repeated the trick with the assistance of Power. No further scoring was done in this half. After changing ends the Institute boys were seen to better advantage but were not playing with the vim and determination of their opponents. However, after fifteen minutes of play Bartlett scored the one and only goal for the C. E. I. and game ended in favor of Stars. The game was by far the best for the season. Mr. W. J. Higgins refereed.

Child Drowned.

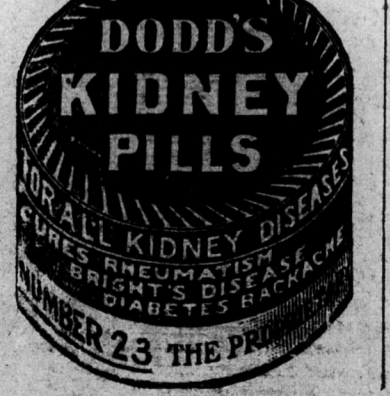
