## Cable News.

**MANILA, July 9.**  
Six were killed and thirty injured when a Fletcher crowded with members of the coast artillery was wrecked between here and Corregidor, 30 miles west of the city.

**LONDON, July 9.**  
A motion to reject the Welsh Disestablishment Bill was defeated last night in the House of Commons by a vote of 347 to 244. The bill then passed the third reading.

**CONSTANTINOPLE, July 9.**  
Bulgaria has replied to the request of the sublime Porte, agreeing to evacuate the Maritima coast. Bulgaria, however, stipulates she must have the assurance that Turkish troops will not attack Bulgaria.

**BELGRADE, July 9.**  
The Servians have recaptured Istip after routing the Bulgarians, says an official despatch. A desperate battle was fought with heavy losses, but the Servian guns previously lost were retaken.

**AVILA, Spain, July 9.**  
Six people dead, eighteen others dying and many more seriously ill in a village near here as the result of eating the flesh of lambs infected with anthrax.

**ELGIN, Ill., July 9.**  
Three men have been killed and property damage estimated at \$50,000 has been done by an electric storm. Four stores were unroofed by the wind, the steeple of the First Baptist Church blown down and much damage done to telephone and telegraph wires.

**LONDON, July 9.**  
Reports of the evacuation of Kotchena by General Kovatchev's army have been confirmed by a Sofia despatch which relates the losses of both sides scarcely less than 30,000 killed and wounded. The Bulgarians faced most desperate fighting and performed heroic feats of heroism before they were routed, suffering great losses.

**BELGRADE, July 9.**  
According to authoritative private messages received here, the Bulgarian forces, nine battalions strong, which invaded Serbia at Kninsevat, were entirely annihilated in a desperate battle with the Serbian forces. The town of Seres, about 45 miles northeast of Saloniki, was captured to-day from the Bulgarians by the Greek Army, according to official despatches received here.

**VIENNA, July 9.**  
The Bulgarian Government is reported to have sent a circular to the European Powers, expressing their readiness to negotiate for peace. The Bulgarian and Serbian Commanders in chief, it is stated, are already negotiating for an armistice, as the losses of both armies in killed are so great, and it is feared that an epidemic of cholera, which has broken out among the troops, may get beyond control.

## The Tent.

The tent consists of one upright leg completely surrounded by invisible punctures. These punctures do not show in the catalogue and are never noticed until it rains, when they begin to perspire downward with a vivacity and surety of aim of a garden hose. A new tent will go on for days at a time without leaking in any direction, and then the moment a thunder shower passes by it will reach out and collect a few barrels of rain water and deposit it on the recumbent forms of the inmates. This never happens until all the bedding in the house has been dragged into the tent and placed where it can be saturated in the shortest space of time.

Some tents are provided with a safety appliance known as a flap, which allows the water to run off and form a fourteen-inch puddle at the main entrance. If the wind is high the flap is liable to toe in and form a dam, which backs the water down the neck of somebody who is crooning softly in his sleep.

On account of their limited capacity tents are inhabited solely by the cross-legged spring cot and the nasal-voiced mosquito. Great cars are taken to construct these cots so that they are about two feet short at both top and bottom, and they also have two yawning side vents through which a man can thrust an unoccupied arm with perfect ease. After a camper out put in four hours trying to fix 6 feet of his physique to a four-foot cot and powdered the pillow with deceased mosquitoes, he will be sorry that he ever spoke disrespectfully of a hair mattress.

Tents are usually erected in the front yard, which permits the entire family to trawl into the house in the flowing robes of night just as the ice man drives in. This is a harrowing experience and causes a great many people to sigh for a subway.

## Cable News.

The Balkan war having now been regularized by formal declarations, it is understood the Powers will make no attempt to mediate. The official Gazette, Belgrade, has published a formal declaration of war against Bulgaria. Military news is lacking. Servian despatches admit that a strong Bulgarian column has invaded Serbia and occupied the town of Kongservats after setting fire to the adjacent villages. Cholera has been brought to Belgrade by wounded soldiers. Official Greek despatches claim great victory at Dolran, where the Bulgarians were recently reinforced and were superior in strength to the Greeks. The latter assert that a whole division of Bulgarians was completely destroyed and that the Bulgarians fled in a precipitate manner, even leaving loaded guns behind. This victory is considered of great importance because Dolran was a vitalizing centre and all the provisions fell into the hands of the Greeks. It is reported from Sofia that the tenth Bulgarian division which reinforced General Ivanov was brought from Tehtaldja district. This seems to indicate a compliance with Turkey's demand that the Bulgarians evacuate Turkish territory. The Bulgarians are taking the offensive against Nish according to the announcement from Sofia.

**LONDON, July 9.**  
The Johannesburg correspondent of the Chronicle, in a review of the situation from the miners' standpoint, declares that the strike in the Rand district is a symptom of a deep-seated widespread discontent with the capitalists regime, in which the Botha Government and mining houses are regarded as co-operating against the workers. The entire press is controlled by the mining magnates, and the correspondent adds that all attempts to obtain redress by constitutional means have failed. The principal grievances of the men were, the terrible mortality among troops and police, who he says attacked the crowds, which with very few exceptions, were absolutely orderly and standing up unarmed to be shot.

**PRETORIA, July 9.**  
The Provincial Council has adopted a resolution introduced by Councillor Ware, the Labor Leader, sympathizing with the relatives of the men, women and children shot at Johannesburg. Ware gave notice that he would introduce to-morrow a resolution condemning the action of the Government in depriving the people of Johannesburg the right of free speech and to hold public meetings, demanding the recall of Viscount Gladstone, the Governor-General of the Union of South Africa, for the part he took in causing the imperial troops to shoot and kill innocent, unoffending and defenceless men, women and children, and also demanding the immediate recall of the imperial troops from South Africa, because they were used only to oppress the working classes and protect the privileges of the favored few.

**NEWCASTLE, July 9.**  
That Capt. Stannard believed his ship would never again be heard of, was shown in a letter to his wife which was read during the Board of Trade enquiry into the loss of the S.S. Mount Oswald, which left Baltimore, February 18th, 1912, for Hamburg, with a crew of 24. When the pilot left the ship in Sheepshead Bay, Capt. Stannard sent ashore by him the letter to be forwarded to his wife, which says: "We have twelve feet of water in the forepeak and are not yet out of the harbor. God knows whether we shall ever reach home. The sailors are now working at the pumps. I wanted the ship docked at New York, but the owners would not allow it." The ship was owned by Lunn and McCoy, of Newcastle.

**WASHINGTON, July 9.**  
The United States won three out of the first four cases to be decided by the American-British Claims Tribunal, which recently completed its initial sessions at Washington. These cases involved four of the numerous cases against the two governments which their respective legislative bodies were unable to adjust. Some of the claims date back many years and to finally settle them the arbitration court was established by treaty. The next session will be held in Ottawa, in March, 1914.

**LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 9.**  
A saloonless United States in 1920 is sought by the Christian Endeavour Society which will meet here in annual convention to-day. This is the keynote of the campaign to be launched at the convention. The Society would have the States dry by 1920 as a fitting observance of the 300th anniversary of the landing of the Pilgrim Fathers. It is predicted that at least 13,000 persons from all the civilized centres of the world will take an active part in the convention.

**LONDON, July 9.**  
The recent announcement that the establishment of a passenger airship service was in contemplation, is now followed by the statement that a company is being formed with a capital of \$1,250,000 for the purpose of running airships on commercial lines from London to Brighton, Manchester, Birmingham, and other places, as well as to Paris. The ships are to be so constructed that they can be armed for war service if so desired.

**MANCHESTER, July 9.**  
An attempt to cut off the water supply of this city from Lake Thirlmere by destroying the aqueduct with a bomb, was discovered last night by the water inspector, who found a candle lamp which was connected with the fuse of a twelve-inch bomb. The candle was burning, but was half fallen, and had missed the fuse. It is supposed that the perpetrators are responsible for the outrage.
