THE THUNDERER'S OPINION.

LONDON, Aug. 9.
(Reuter's Ottawa Agency) — The Times, in an editorial, states: "The election of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, as the successor of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, is an event of great importance to the Dominion, and is also of great imperial interest. Canadian politics are no longer a matter of indifference in this country. That is part of our heritage in Europe, from their showing on the battle fields. An abundant political harvest already begins to appear, and Premier Borden prepared the way for the reaping by his eminent representation of Canada in the Council Chamber of the Allied nations. So secure is his position in the English mind, as representative of Canada, that it is not always easy to remember here that at home he is the leader of a political party, against which established opposition may be gathering strength. We shall not speculate on the probable duration of the combination under his leadership, but certainly it will be influenced by the election of a successor to Laurier. It will be influenced, for instance, by the personality of the new liberal leader and by his political record, consequently, interest in these points here is not only legitimate, but the obligation of intelligent citizenship." The Times then sketches the career of the new leader and concludes: "With the Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King at the Liberal helm, there can be little risk that the position of Canada in the Empire and before the world should be treated as a pawn in the contest of local politics. We may be sure that his insight and lofty political ideals will keep before his eyes, and before the eyes of his party, the immense present influence, and the even greater future of Canada, as a Dominion of the Empire."

MADE WITHIN THE EMPIRE.

LONDON, Aug. 9.
(Reuter's Ottawa Agency) — The Board of Trade has issued regulations determining what articles benefit by the Imperial Preference Provisions of the 1919 Act, as being of genuine Empire origin, and fixing proportions of the consignments so benefiting. They state that goods shall not be deemed to be the manufacturers of the British Empire, if not the result of Labor within the Empire.

"GOEBEN" AGAIN IN TROUBLE.
ATHENS, Aug. 10.
Constantinople newspapers received here, report that Turkish officers recently made an attempt to sink the former German cruiser Goeben, and a British ship, but were frustrated by British officers.

PREMIER'S DENIAL.
BUDAPEST, Aug. 10.
Stephen Friedrich, the new Premier, in an interview to-day, denied that the change in Government meant a return to the Monarchist system in Hungary.

A BUSY DAY.
LUCERNE, Aug. 10.
The Socialist conference, to-day, adopted resolutions against intervention in Russia, against maintenance of blockade against Russia, and proposed a million prisoners in a "form of slavery." Resolutions favoring taking of measures by Allies against massacres in Armenia, withdrawal of German troops from Lithuania and Latvia, and recognition of the republic of Latvia as an independent state were adopted. The conference also protested against the attitude of Rumanians in Bessarabia and recommended the formation of a Balkan League for the purpose of protecting its members and protesting against the policy now being followed in Asia Minor and the occupation of Smyrna by Greek troops. It supported Korea's demand for recognition as an independent state and demanded freedom of speech for India.

2. Between the hours of 3.30 and 4.30 p.m., no horses or vehicles of any description will be permitted on Bannerman Road or on Military Road, between the West side of Cochrane Street and the East side of King's Road.
