## "Greenwich Follies."

Talented Newfoundland Adds to Previous Laurels.

In the production of the "Greenwich Village Follies" at the Shubert Theatre last night John Murray Anderson not only surpassed his own previous achievements in design and staging, but revealed himself as a talent among the minnows of musical revue producers.

Mr. Anderson's stage pictures were never crowded and whatever the attainments of individual performers they were subordinated to the requirements of a harmonious ensemble of color, line, costume and music.

For sickness, loss of money or sudden death there is now a sovereign remedy. "The Greenwich Village Follies." Instead of dispatching troops to cure hardness of heart in West Virginia, the President might well transport the untamed forces of the mines to the Shubert Theatre, where soothing and composition would inevitably await it. The Follies might even be mentioned to Lloyd George as an effective intervention in Ireland.

These recommendations have special reference to Mr. Anderson's stagecraft. Where other hands have labored the effect is not invariably happy, particularly in the brackish waters of humor. But there is good fun enough to neutralize the undesirable spots. After all perhaps the strongest count for gratitude is the absence of the treacle that syrups up most of the musical shows of this type.

So far as the taste of the first night's audience could be discerned, the biggest individual hit appeared to be the dancing of Gretchen Eastman, who did an Apache dance with Donald Kerr.

Among the particularly luminous spots were the burlesques on "Lilian," "Enter Madame" and "Bluebird's Eighth Wife," the last being done with Benda masks of extraordinary quality. The Beardsley Figures in silver and black with Ada Forman as the Silver Peacock, contributed the most striking finale seen in many a season.

Rosalind Fuller, Bird Millman, Lillian Owens with her marionettes, Irene Franklin, Evelyn Darylle, and in fact the whole catalogue of principles were effective in their individual ways, and in particular Ted Lewis with his fin de siècle band; Al Herman, blackface comedian, and James Watts in burlesque ballet.

Arthur Swannstrom's lyrics are intelligent and Carey Morgans music decidedly catchy.—N. Y. Times, Sept. 1st.

## You Can't Cool Your Blood.

Wherever you live, and whatever you do, your blood remains almost at the same heat, though the temperature of the surface of the body will vary considerably.

Experiments were made with a man who remained in a hot-air oven at a temperature of 270 degrees without any difference being apparent in the heat of his blood.

Then his arm was put in ice-cold water for half an hour. This, of course, cooled his skin, but the flesh was just as warm as when he was in the oven.

As a final test, his arm was immersed for a quarter of an hour in water as hot as he could bear it; but still no change in his temperature could be detected.

The warmest part of the surface of the body is that beneath the armpit, where the doctor sometimes takes your temperature, instead of putting the thermometer under your tongue.

The coldest parts are the tips of the nose and ears, which are sixteen degrees colder than the rest of the face.

Strangely enough, the skin on the left side of the head is warmer than that on the right side.
