Nothing has transpired to induce a belief that the statements contained in the appeal of the committee were at all exaggerated or overstated.—Meanwhile precious time is passing, and in a few weeks an impassable, uninhabited prairie, 300 miles in extent, will be interposed between the destitute people and the nearest point in our own State, to which supplies can be despatched—impassable for loaded vehicles, on account of the deep snows, and the absence of anything in the shape of food for draught animals."
