He collected over 1,000 head of these bipeds in the vicinity of Mount Brydges, Newbury, Appin, and Glencoe, and had them driven to yards adjoining these stations, until the quantity he had desired had been filled. While in these yards the birds were fed twice a day on barley. The residents of the vicinity where the feathered tribe were gathered represent the cackle and din cocasioned by them, during both day and night, as of the most hideous description. Thurs-day last the owner shipped them to New York, which will heave a margin of over \$400 on the transaction.—London Free Press.
