SPEEDY ARREST.—A short time since the house of Thomas Kieve, of the Township of Ops, about four miles from Lindsay, was entered, and a suit of clothes and a pocket-book containing about five dollars stolen therefrom. Since Finigan's release from jail lately, and previous to his arrest, the neighborhood where he lives was in a state of alarm, watching their property. The prisoners were brought up before Judge Smith on Monday last, when he sent Finigan three years to the penitentiary, and Moloney three months in jail at hard labor, it being his first offence.—*Lindsay Post*.

SHAMEFUL OUTRAGE.—At the police court, St. Catharines, last week, Jas. C. Wall, a young man of good education and abilities, son of a wealthy and respectable citizen of Oshawa, was placed in the dock on a charge of having committed a felonious assault upon the person of Jessie Leavenworth, a little girl only 8 years old. The Police Magistrate remarked that it was one of the clearest cases for conviction that ever came before him, and committed the prisoner for trial at the fall assizes on the 14th of October next.

WRECKING DOWN A SCHOONER.—An old incident occurred on the Welland canal last Wednesday afternoon. The schooner *Green Bay City* attempted to pass through lock 4 when it was discovered that she was a little too long to permit the closing of the gates. It was found necessary to cut away about three inches from her stern before she could pass the lock, and Mr. Malpass, the lock-tender, says that the occurrence gave him "a world of trouble."
