

Town Council.
The usual fortnightly meeting of the Council was held on Monday evening, the Mayor in the chair. Present also Messrs. Richard Mitchell, Heffernan, Davidson, Kennedy, Elliott, Crowe, Massie, Coffey, Robt. Mitchell, Hogg, Howard, McLagan, Chadwick.

THE BILLIARD BY-LAW.
Mr. Davidson moved, seconded by Mr. Robert Mitchell, that a by-law be introduced for the regulation of billiard rooms.

The Mayor explained that this motion preceded the reception of petitions, &c., because it was business that had been left over from the last meeting, & was adjourned for the want of a quorum. The motion was lost, only two or three members voting for it.

COMMUNICATIONS, PETITIONS, &c.
A petition was presented by Mr. Elliott, from Denis Coffey, asking to be released from payment on lot 71, Wyndham street, which he had rented to one McDonald, who had absconded without carrying out his agreement to pay rent and taxes, leaving the petitioner liable for the latter.

By Mr. Robt. Mitchell, from John Roat, asking for a transfer to him of the license of the Wellington Hotel from Mr. Deady. Granted, on motion of the presenter and Mr. Davidson.

By Mr. Heffernan, from Jacob Furry and 27 other ratepayers asking for a crossing to be laid down on Macdonnell street, opposite Sandilands street.
By Mr. Howard, from James Hough, agent for the estate of John Orton, in reference to lots 78, 79, 80, 81, and 82 on Bedford street, complaining that since 1869 these lots had been assessed as the lands of a non-resident, notwithstanding that the memorialist, the agent, has resided in the corporation; that in consequence Mr. Hough could not appeal, and 10 per cent. per annum, with fees and cost of advertisement had been added to the cost of assessment, and he has been obliged to pay the Corporation \$84 in order to prevent the sale of the lots. He therefore asks for a remission of a just proportion of this sum.

By Mr. Davidson, from Jacob Cantwell, asking for remission of taxes through inability to pay, he being an old man.
By Mr. Richard Mitchell, from Margaret Hoban, asking for the transfer to her of the shop license held by her late husband. Granted on motion of the presenter and Mr. Davidson.

By Mr. Heffernan, from Mrs. Dawson and ten others, asking that Surrey street be put in a better state of repair. Also, from Mary O'Connor, asking for remission of taxes.
By Mr. Kennedy, from Wm. Shaw, asking for remission of taxes, he being disabled through an accident.
The foregoing were referred to the proper committees, with the exceptions named.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.
Mr. Massie presented and read the 5th report of the Finance Committee. It recommended the granting of the petitions of Geo. Morris, for remission of taxes; of Jas. Ferguson, for remission of dog tax; of Frank Kay, and of John Kinnon, for remission of statute labor tax. That the petition of the members of the Council for the North Ward, and of J. M. Shaw be not granted. That the Treasurer be instructed to refund to John Richards the sum of \$11.42, collected from him for interest on arrears, through mistake. That the account of Bookless & Boulter, not being certified, cannot be reported on by the Committee.

Mr. Massie moved, seconded by Mr. Howard, that the report be adopted.
In answer to Mr. Chadwick, Mr. Massie said the Committee did not recommend the granting of Mr. J. M. Shaw's petition, because no proof had been furnished them that Mr. Shaw had paid his statute labor tax in Elora.
The Mayor said that Mr. Shaw should have furnished a certificate.
The report was then adopted.

FIVE LIMITS BY-LAW.
Mr. Richard Mitchell moved, seconded by Mr. Chadwick, that the new five limits by-law be read a third time and passed.
The by-law was amended by inserting the following:—That the words "within the said area" after the word "mentioned" in the 3rd line of the 4th clause, and that the words "without the consent of the Town Council first had and obtained" in said clause, and all words in said clause after the word "Lumber Yard" be struck out, and also that the whole of the 5th clause of said by-law be struck out, and that number 219 be inserted in the first line of the 5th clause of said by-law.

APPROACHES TO THE G. W. R. STATION.
Mr. Massie called attention to the bad state of Paisley street and the Waterloo road, and suggested that the Road and Bridge Committee should enquire into the cost of putting them in a fit state of repair at once, instead of waiting until spring, when the work would cost more.
Mr. Elliott moved a resolution to this effect, which was carried.

THE YORK ROAD BOUNDARY DISPUTE.
Some conversation took place in reference to the disputed boundary on Queen street, commenced by Mr. Davidson, who called attention to the fact that a fence was again being erected so as to enclose part of the street.
Mr. Davidson moved, seconded by Mr. Coffey, that the Solicitor be instructed to notify the Merchants' Bank at King-street, that they have sold to Messrs. Hall, Birmingham, Martin, and Smith, part of lot 27, in the 17th Concession of Preston, County of Grey, consisting of 99 acres; over 40 acres cleared. The lot is within three miles of the proposed route of the Northern Extension of the Toronto, Grey & Bruce Railway, now being constructed from Orangeville, and the farm is one of the best in the Township and has a good dwelling-house and is situated on a fine title indisputable. MISCELLANEOUS.
Mr. Massie stated that the Engineer of the G. W. R. had been instructed to visit Guelph and report to their manager on the cost of putting a siding on the south side of the track, near the market place.
Mr. Davidson called attention to the dangerous state of the culvert near his residence.
Mr. Chadwick called attention to the dangerous obstruction on Duke street, which had not been removed, although petitioned against.
The Council then adjourned until Wednesday to receive the report in reference to Paisley street and the Waterloo Road.
