GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC TO BE COMPLETED AND OPEN FOR TRAFF IC BEFORE END OF 1914

ANCOUVER, July 23-Collingwood Schrieber, of Ottawa, general consulting engineer of the Dominion government and chief government engineer of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway, reached here today. He has just completed an inspection of the line as far as a point on the south fork of the Fraser, forty miles west of railhead at Tete Jaune Cache, which is fiftysix miles beyond the summit of the Yellowhead Pass.

"I have every confidence that the main line of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway to Prince Rupert will be finished and in operation before the end of 1914. I think it will be ready before that period but it will take some time to get the roadbed in shape for traffic," said Mr. Schrieber to the W.A.P.

Mr. Schrieber will be joined here tomorrow by B. B. Kelliher, chief engineer of the Grand Trunk Pacific, who left him at Tete Jaune Cache to proceed westward over the line to Fort George. Mr. Kelliher is coming out via Ashcroft. They will leave here Thursday for Prince Rupert, and will go inland to inspect the G.T.P. line as far as Alberni in the Bulkley Valley.
