

NEW FOUR STORY ADDITION IS BEING BUILT FOR MATERNITY WORK IN HOLY CROSS HOSPITAL

Work started yesterday for a four story addition to the Holy Cross hospital and it is expected that the new wing which will give 58 new beds will be completed before the end of the summer. The foundations have been cleared for some time and the building is now started with this wing forming part of the maternity section of the hospital and there will be a number of private rooms while the others will be semi-private.
