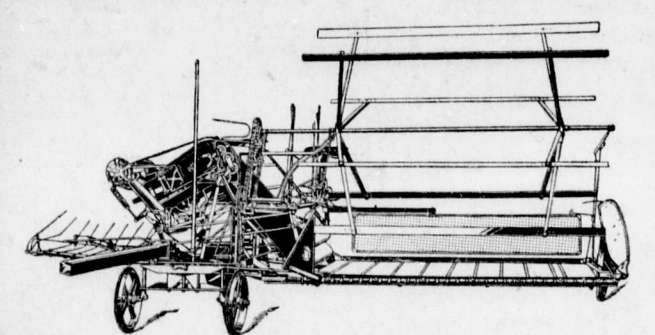

**THE CARE OF CANADA'S
WOUNDED.**

Red Cross Assistance to Army
Medical Service.

The official Canadian casualty list
now contains over 25,000 names. This
constitutes a large army of wounded
whose treatment devolves upon the
Canadian medical service, assisted by
the Red Cross.

Canadian medical units are to be
found in every part of the war zone—
France, Britain, Belgium, and the
Mediterranean. In the latter district
Canada has supplied 4,320 beds and
1,264 medical officers, nurses, and
orderlies. The total personnel in all
the fields is 6,935.

At the beginning of the war an at-
tempt was made to place our wound-
ed in Canadian hospitals, but this
was found impossible, and a wounded
Canadian may be found in any one of
the 1,500 active treatment hospitals
throughout Great Britain.

Each unit in the field, however, is
served by the Canadian Red Cross
when called upon by the Canadian
Medical Corps, and the Canadian sol-
dier in the first stages of his wound,
in his passage from the advanced
dressing station to the field hospital
and casualty clearing station is in
Canadian hands. Again, after dis-
charge from active treatment hospi-
tals, every Canadian must be sent to
a Canadian Convalescent Hospital,
such as Bearwood Park, at Bucking-
ham, Berks, the Canadian Convales-
cent Hospital at Bromley, and the
King's Canadian Red Cross Hospital
at Bushby Park.

Two of the best known active
treatment hospitals are the Duchess
of Connaught Red Cross Hospital at
Taplow, one of the best equipped and
most efficient hospitals in Europe,
and the Queen Alexandra Hospital at
Beachborough. In addition to these
hospitals, there are special Canadian
Hospitals for the treatment of spe-
cial conditions. These are the West
Cliffe Canadian Eye and Ear Hospi-
tal at Folkestone and the Grenville
Special Hospital, which attends to
cases of shell shock and injury to
nerves. Blinded soldiers are sent to
St. Dunstan's College for the Blind
in Regent Park, London. Fortunately
cases of this nature have been rare
amongst Canadian troops.

WIVES AS PARTNERS.

An editorial in the July Woman's
Home Companion says:

"Many men seem to take a cer-
tain pride in the fact that their wives
have all the 'freshness and lack of
experience of a little girl.' They think
because they have shut their wives
off from any contact with real life,
that they are better, more indulgent
husbands than those who go to their
wives at night with their troubles,
and who never make an important
business move without first planning
it out at home. They are wrong. In
the first place, they deprive them-
selves of a valuable asset in business
—the clear, penetrating power of a
woman's intuition. In the second
place, it is no compliment to a wo-
man to keep her for ever a little girl.
Life is not made rich by evading re-
sponsibilities; the man who shuts his
wife off from his business because he
wants to save her worry, and from
child-bearing because he cannot
think of her enduring pain, generally
succeeds in giving her a sense of
utter uselessness that makes her
miserable. And, in the event of his
death, he leaves her problems with
which she is utterly unprepared to
cope.

"Many of the moral breakdowns
occur, not in youth, but in the middle-
life period, when habits are supposed
to have been formed and character
fixed. Youth is usually free from
covetousness and greed. Middle age
is less likely to be. Almost every
week the newspapers report 'the
financial difficulties, if not the down-
right dishonesty, of some respected
man in middle life, who has sacrificed
everything in trying to get too much
of this world's goods.

"And we have noted that such
catastrophes take place less often in
families where the wife is fully ac-
quainted with her husband's affairs."

The increase of railway mileage in
Canada for the year ended 30th June,
1915, reached was 4,787 miles, bring-
ing the total railway mileage of the
Dominion up to 35,582 miles. The
increase during the last twelve years
has been 87 per cent. In addition to
the lines completed there were, on
30th June, 1915, 1,161 miles of rail-
way contracted for, and 432 miles
completed, but not yet classified as
under operation.

received the following letter from
Harry Blashall, of this place, who is
with the 91st Battalion in England:
12th July, 1916.

Friend Ben,

Just a few lines to let you know
that we arrived safely and well. We
are having a good time here, but it is
a lot different from Canada. The
crops all look fine in the country, but
everything is very dear, and the wo-
men do a lot of the work. We can
hear the big guns pretty plainly once
in a while, especially about daybreak.

I have been taking a course in
bomb-throwing, but don't know how
I will make out yet. We laid a mine
yesterday, and when we set it off,
it blew a hole nearly big enough to
put a house into.

There certainly are lots of aero-
planes around here. You see them
going from daylight until dark, and
they certainly travel some. I suppose
the bunch of brave young men we
left in Aylmer are having a good time
while we fellows—like Will and my-
self—are out here doing our bit, and
theirs, too. I would like to see them
in this country; they would soon
come up to time.

Well, I guess this is all for the pre-
sent. Hoping this finds you and all
the rest well, and trusting to hear
from you soon.—From your friend,
