He left his home a stonemason and returned an eminent statesman and one of her Majesty's most trusted Privy Councilors of the Dominion of Canada, and her first minister for that part of her empire. No wonder his that part of her empire. No wonder his fellow-countrymen in England and Scotland gave him the grand reception they did. On arriving in London he met the leaders of both sides of the Imperial House of Commons, who were deeply impressed with his clear grasp of not only Dominion but Imperial politics. His official business finished, he was invited to Windsor Castle as the guest of her Majesty. He subsequently, with Measrs. Blake and Laurier and Cartwright, it is said, was offered the Order of the Knighthood of St. Michael and St. George, but only the latter accepted, Mr. Mackenzie and the others respectfully declining the great honor, giving as a reason that titles were out of place in a democratic dependency like Canada. After leaving England he turned his steps to his Domie Scotland, to the scenes of his youth. A hearty Highland welcome met him on the threshold of Pertheliw-Highlanders and school-fellows in Domkeld and Logienait were only a part of many banquets, etc., given in his honor.
