—Mr. James C. O'Neill, chief attendant at the London Asylum, has resigned his position after 26 years' service in the institution. The resignation takes effect at the end of this month. Mr. O'Neill has been a faithful and efficient officer, and enjoyed the respect and confidence of all.

—Richard Logan, of Nissouri, was yesterday committed for trial by Squire J. B. Smyth, upon a charge of assaulting Richard Scott, brother of Rebecca Scott, the young lady who secured \$1,000 from Logan in settlement of an action for \$6,000 for breach of promise of marriage.

—Fireman Geo. Taylor was removed from the city hospital to his home yesterday. He had lain in one position in a hospital cot for nine weeks, and has undergone a severe mental strain.

—At a meeting of No. 2 committee of the board of education held last night, it was decided to divide \$148,000 of insurance on school property equally between the seventeen agents applying. Messrs. Martyn and Burdick were authorized to arrange for connecting Victoria school closets with the new sewer.

—Donald Wood has charged Daniel Smith, of Belmont, with the theft of a set of single harness. Donald Campbell has laid another charge against him of stealing a bail of barbed-wire. Smith has been convicted of two charges of larceny, and at the time was remanded for sentence until Friday next. Squire Smyth will hear the above two cases on Thursday, at 2 o'clock.

—Eddie Stabler, the 7-year-old son of Mr. Leonard Stabler, of the Pipe Line road, is dangerously ill with acute inflammation of the bowels. The boy was handling some boxes that had contained patent paints, and is said to have licked the colored labels on some of them. This may have caused poisoning. Whether or not he will recover depends upon the cause of the trouble.

—The board of education, at a special meeting held last night, accepted the invitation of the Sons of England to join in the jubilee Sunday services on the 20th inst. The following members were named to play the city council a game of baseball at Springbank on June 23: Messrs. Burdick (captain), Strong, McCormick, Macpherson, Bayly, Gillean, Teasdale, Johnston and Martyn.

—The funeral of the late John R. McGarry took place from his mother's residence, Thames Street, yesterday afternoon, and was largely attended by his numerous friends. The pallbearers were from the C. M. T. U., No. 278, of this city, as follows: Messrs. Galpin, F. O'Neill, J. Brown, Cheyne, Kelly and J. Harper. Deceased was a member of the union. The cause of death was heart failure.

—Mr. Wm. Copp, superintendent of the Askin Street Methodist Sunday school, who recently joined the ranks of the benedictines, was last night surprised the very pleasant manner by representatives of the Sunday school and Epworth League, to the number of twelve or fifteen, at his residence, Craig Street. Mr. Copp was made the recipient of a very beautiful onyx table as a token of esteem and good wishes. The presentation was made by Miss Jessie Boake, and Miss Abbott read a very kindly-worded address. Mr. Copp made a feeling reply.

—At a meeting of Canadian Pacific Railway men, held in the station at Toronto Junction on Monday night, it was decided to hold the employees' annual games at Shelburne on July 17, providing the consent of the divisional superintendent can be obtained. It is said that Superintendent Leonard will exercise his influence and authority to force an amalgamation of the London and Toronto divisions, making the meeting-place at Guelph. This the Toronto and Toronto Junction men are intensely opposed to doing, and declare that sooner than join hands with London they will call off the outing or run a private excursion on some of the steamers.—[Toronto Star.]

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Amongst the visitors in attendance were W. Bros. J. McNeel, Thamesville; Wallace, of Nilestown; Harris, Bratt and Hammond, of Delaware; Callard, of St. George's, 42, and brethren from other city lodges.

—The young men ordained to the Anglican clergy at Christ Church last Sunday have received appointments, as follows: Rev. G. J. Ahey will go to Brussels; Rev. P. Dobson, to Merlin and Tilbury; Rev. E. W. Crawford, to Teeswater; Rev. H. H. Tancock, to the curacy of St. James' Church, Stratford; Rev. James Ferrier, of Dundalk, has been appointed to Bismarck and Rodney; and Rev. H. Conell, to the Dundalk mission. The competition for election prizes took place yesterday morning at Cronyn Hall, and the first prize for reading and speaking was awarded to Rev. H. H. Tancock. It was a gold medal, provided by Matthew Wilson, Q.C., of Chatham. The second prize, consisting of \$20 worth of books, was awarded to Rev. G. J. Ahey.

—Herbert Hockin, the London man arrested last winter at Detroit on suspicion of assaulting Mrs. Hitzel, and who was subsequently discharged from custody, has been rearrested on the charge of living with a woman who is not his wife, and also with being concerned in the old charge of assaulting Mrs. Hitzel. The Detroit News asserts "that the police of that city are prepared to show that the woman with whom he is now living, and who is now locked up, is not his wife. He made the acquaintance of Maude Moxie in London, Ont., and deserted his wife to come here with her. Mrs. Hockin at present lives with her two children, one of whom is blind; the other is at Port Dover, Ont. On the other hand Hockin will probably point to the fact that he never made an attempt to flee the city after his first arrest, and that the police allowed many months to elapse before they decided to serve the warrant and then only after he had sued them for damages for the first arrest. He will claim that he is a victim of police persecution; his arrest is a subterfuge of the officials to get out of the damage suit. And thus are the chances of the prisoner weighed pro and contra."

PORT STANLEY.
The residents of Port Stanley propose to change the name of Kettle Creek to Tondt River.

Mr. E. Cathcart has returned from a visit to Ireland, where he spent a pleasant time among friends and relatives. He has resumed his old position at the Loney House.

In the Presbyterian Sunday school there is a society organized by Mr. R. Miller, of St. Thomas, against cruelty to animals, including the killing of birds, robbing nests, etc. Some 25 scholars have signed the society's pledge.

JUBILEE SOUVENIR.
The Grand Trunk Railway system will shortly have ready for distribution a handsome diamond jubilee souvenir.

The design is one of the finest productions of the lithographer's art, and is emblematic of the glory of the British empire. Canada, the premier colony, and Canada's great railway. It contains pictures of the Queen, the Prince of Wales, the Duke of York and Prince Albert Edward. At the top of the design is a radiant star, in the center of which are the letters "L.K." and on either side of this is a Union Jack suitably draped. Beneath it the coat of arms of Canada, and miniature views of the new Victoria Jubilee bridge, Montreal, and the new single arch steel bridge, Niagara Falls. Between the two bridges is a small trademark of the system. The demand for the souvenirs will undoubtedly be greater than the supply, and it has been decided to distribute them to the company's patrons in the order in which applications are received.

RAILWAY MATTERS.

The G. T. R. Will Build a New Roundhouse at Sarnia on Certain Conditions.

The Sarnia Observer last night contained the following telegram from Mayor Johnston: "Montreal, June 15.—The Sarnia committee's interview with Mr. Hays here today was very satisfactory. The rumor of the roundhouse removal to Port Huron was positively denied by the general manager. Under conditions which we consider fair, if endorsed by the citizens, the company will build a 30-stall roundhouse in Sarnia, at a probable cost of \$65,000. The work on the new roundhouse commences within 20 days."
