ILLEGAL COAL COMBINE.

Conviction of the Lockport Exchange

Members Affirmed.

ALBANY, Oct. 5.—An important case was
decided here by the Court of Appeals,
the question at issue being what constitutes a
conspiracy against the rights of the people
under the laws of New York State. J.
Carson Sheehan and four others were con-
victed in Niagara county, and fined \$50
each on an indictment charging them with
conspiracy in having formed the "Lockport
Coal Exchange," which organization, it was
alleged, sought to raise and maintain the
price of coal to consumers, and that it re-
stricted trade in violation of the penal
code of the State and of chapter 710 of the
laws of 1893.This was the first prosecution under the
latter act, which is entitled "An act to
prevent monopolies in articles of general
necessity." The defendants contended that
proof of an overt act was wanting
beyond the mere forming of the exchange.The Court of Appeals, however, affirmed
the judgment of conviction rendered by the
lower courts.

& Co., New York, is in the city on busi-
ness.—Mr. Walter Armstrong, of this city,
has left for Toronto to resume his
studies at the Ontario Veterinary College.—Dr. and Mrs. Pingel leave for Chicago
to-day, whence the doctor proposes to visit
the principal lung institutes and hospitals
of that work.—They say that "Charley's Aunt," the
new comedy, is the funniest production
that has been staged since "The Private
Secretary" was first produced.—Dorchester Fair was held yesterday
and many Londoners attended. Charles
Lawrence, of the Dorchester Club, was the
winner of the first prize in the run-
ning race. Frank Sage captured first and
Fred T. Trebilcock second in the saddle
race.—Sergeant Harry Cast, of the Twenty-
eighth Battalion, left for London this
morning to take a six months' course at
the Royal School of Infantry. (Stratford
Herald.)—The London West railway is being
extended to the Dundas Street bridge. The
work of stringing the wires has been com-
pleted on Oxford Street and part of the
Vineland.—Grain thieves are gathering where
they sow not in London township. On
Wednesday night Mr. Job Cox, Oxford
Street, lost ten bags and a neighbor eight
bags. No trace.—The harvest thanksgiving services will
be held in St. John the Evangelist Church
on Sunday next. The Bishop of Huron
preaches in the morning and Rev. Principal
Millar in the evening.—A dispatch from Trenton, N. J., dated
Wednesday night says: "There is a de-
cided improvement in Calverley's condition
to-night and he is less delirious. The in-
jured limbs were examined by the doctor,
who is satisfied with the setting."—Dennis C. Dorman is a farmer in West-
minster township. He cultivates melons
and pumpkins. Last evening he was sent an
information against Wm. Ayling for tres-
passing upon the patch. The accused will
appear before Squire Smyth on Saturday
morning at 10 o'clock.—The trustees of the Protestant Orphans'

Church.—After a session of two hours last night
No. 2 committee adjourned, and during the
weary wait the attention of the members
was chiefly devoted to the passing of
accounts. When the item of Collegiate
Institute expenditure came up, there was a
lengthy discussion over the salaries of the
janitors, and a resolution was finally
adopted fixing them at \$600 for Mr. J. W.
and \$500 for Mr. Miller, the board to
supply all materials. A resolution was
also passed fixing the rate for the janitors
of night schools at 30 cents per night.
There were present Trustees D. W. Black-
well (chairman), Anderson, Turner, Jeffrey,
Dewar, Secretary McEwen, Inspector
Perry and Principal Merchant.

Accused of Theft.

Arthur Cole is a recent acquisition to
this section. A short time ago he was em-
ployed by Wm. Hies, who resides in the
township of Carleton Place. On Wednesday he
disappeared and at the same time \$51 be-
longing to his employer. The latter came
to the city yesterday afternoon and swore
out a warrant for Cole's arrest. This was
placed in the hands of Detective Mason,
who took Cole before Squire Smyth. The
prisoner was remanded for examination
until 2 o'clock. Cole did not meet at all
perplexed.

A Threatened Suit.

The business of the Board of Works last
night was attended by Ald. Thos. Jones
(chairman), Taylor, Dineeney, Garratt,
Shaw, Coe, Mayor Estey, Secretary Bell,
City Engineer Gardner, and Street Com-
missioner Owens. A St. Thomas law firm
sent a communication in behalf of E. H.
Black, stating that they were about to
issue a writ against the city for \$1,500
damages for injuries which Black alleges hesustained on account of a defective bridge
in Charlotte Street, this city. It appears
that Black was riding his bicycle on the
above street, and when about to cross the
bridge in question he was thrown violently
into the ditch, on account, as he stated,
of the road being so much lower
than the bridge. The injuries laid him up
for some time, but the communication
stated that he would be willing to come to
a settlement rather than take the matter
into court. The engineer reported that the
accident could only have happened through
the grossest negligence, as the approaches
to the bridge are in perfect condition. The
communication was filed. The treasurer
presented a report of the expenditure of the
committee so far this year. Of the appro-
priation of \$31,015, there have been spent in
repairing bridges, etc., \$45,425.64. Mr.
Orme, of East London, asked that the
drain on English Street be enlarged, as the
present one is not sufficient to carry away
the water during a freshet. Referred to
the engineers. A communication from the
City Council recommending that a drain be
laid on Oxford Street from Richmond
Street to the river without a petition from
the residents was read, but no action was
taken.

Two Superb Attractions at the Grand
Opera House—"The Queen of Sheba,"
and "The Crust of Society."

THE CHARMING RHEA.

Adrien Barbusse, the author of "Mlle.
Rhea's new play "The Queen of Sheba,"
which will be presented at the London
Opera House to-morrow evening, is 60
years of age. Like his contemporaries,
Georges Ohnet and Alphonse Daudet, he
belongs essentially to the literary set of
Paris. He has a remarkable dislike to
publicity, and is devoted to his charming
family. His duties in the department of the
Ministry of Fine Arts, where he holds an
enviable position, permit of his devot-
ing a certain amount of leisure
to the writing of plays. Since the
completion of "The Queen of Sheba" he has
received a commission from Cœquelin for a
comedy based upon an original subject.
Mons. Marck, the director of the Odéon
Theatre, Paris, after hearing "The Queen
of Sheba" read, wished to negotiate for a
Parisian production of the play, but Mlle.
Rhea's engagements in America precluded
her entertaining any offer, however tempt-
ing, before next season, when she may pos-
sibly be induced to make arrangements
with Mons. Marck. Meanwhile her Ameri-
can tour with "The Queen of Sheba" prom-
ises to be the most successful she has ever
had.

"THE CRUST OF SOCIETY."

Managed by Stetson's version of Dumas'
famous novel, which was adapted and
arranged in Boston and first produced at
the Globe Theatre there a few months ago,
will be the attraction at the Grand on
Tuesday next. The tours of the several
"Crust of Society" companies, which Mr.
Stetson has sent around through the
country have been most successful.
The play presents a certain phase
of life not exactly the upper
crust and not exactly the lower crust; yet,
perhaps the strangest mixture of the two.
Everyone is familiar with the exist-
ence of such a life as is depicted in this
adaptation of Dumas' book, and everyone,
strangely enough, seems to be in sympathy
with the attempt of a handsome adventu-
ress to gain a position in the upper crust
at any sacrifice. The cast is a most excel-
lent one, having been carefully selected by Mr.
Stetson.

Seduction Suit Dismissed.

STRAITFORD, Oct. 5.—At the Assizes to-
day Hannah Estner vs. Ernest Bennet,
an action for damages for seduction, was
the first case taken up. The defense took
the ground that as the child was born dur-
ing the life time of the father of the girl
seduced he was the person who should have
brought the action, and that the mother
had no legal claim for damages. His
Lordship held that the objection was good
and discharged the jury and dismissed the
case. The defendant also denies the
technical grounds so opportunely was
