President Debs, of the A. R. U., and Other Leaders Arrested.

Battle Creek Strikers Secure Control of the C. and G. T. R.

A Cabinet Council Called and U. S Troops Ordered to Chicago-Bloodshed at Uniontown. Pa.

COSTING A PILE OF MONEY. CHICAGO, July 3.—If the strike is of long duration it will make a big hole in Uncle Sam's exchequer. Up to 10 o'clock last night nearly 15,000 deputy marshals had been sworn in at the Government bureau. They receive \$2 50 per day and board, in addition each man upon receiving his badge of office is furnished with a \$4 revolver and \$1 worth of ammunition. There are also expenses for vehicles, telegrams and other items.

STRIKERS ENCOURAGED. President Debs of the American Railway Union says of the Pullman boycott, that advices from all parts are very encouraging, and points that showed weak ness at first are now out to a man.

THE NICKEL PLATE TIED UP. CHICAGO, Ill., July 3 .- All the engineers firemen, brakemen and trackmen on the Chicago end of the Nickel Plate Railroad stopped work simultaneously and without warning to-day, leaving things in a desper-

ate state of confusion. FORT WAYNE, Ind., July 3 .- The Nickle Plate's freight business is at a standstill, and an east-bound passenger train was stopped at Stoney Island. West-bound passengers are moving, but the company does not expect to get equipment east after reaching Chicago. The road does not handle Pullman coaches, but the general boycott order will be respected by em-

The Wabash is doing no business here whatever.

CHICAGO. WASHINGTON, D. C., July 3.—Attorney-General Olney, Secretary Lamont and Gen. Schofield are in conference with the President at the White House on the railway

strike situation. Col. Lamont went to the War Department after the Cabinet meeting and made public this statement: "The United States marshals, the United States districtattorney and the United States judges having certified to the President that in their judgment it is impracticable to otherwise execute the orders of the court, the troops under command of Col. Crofton at Fort Sheridan, consisting of eight companies of infantry, two troops of cavalry and a battery of light artillery have been ordered to Chicago to enforce the observance of the laws of the United States."

These orders were telegraphed at 3:30 p.m. to Col. Martin, the adjutant-general, at Gen. Miles' headquarters in Chicago. TEN TRAINS STALLED AT BATTLE CREEK. BATTLE CREEK, Mich., July 3.—No attempt has been made to get out any more of the Grand Trunk trains since the morning. Everything is as quiet as Sunday here. Most of the strikers are at home. Ten trains are now here and another is expected from Chicago in a short time. An official of the C. and G. T. declares that enough men will be on the grounds in a day or two to take care of all the business, THE SITUATION AT PORT HURON.

PORT HURON, Mich., July 3 .- From 300 to 500 employes of the Chicago and Grand Trunk went out at midnight. Men are joining the A. R. U. every hour. J. C. Spence, A. R. U. organizer, addressed a public meeting at Fort Gratiot for two hours, urging everyone to join the A. R. U. A rising vote was taken and the resolution not to move a wheel on the C. and G. T. was adopted, while the entire audience arose and cheered. The A. R. U. leaders are taking in everybody that is in any way connected with rail-way work. The firemen have gone out to a man. The situation is about the same as in Battle Creek. The engineers won't go out without the union firemen. The conductors will refuse to take the trains with B. of L. men at the engines. 'The members of the Conductors' Union will never consent to go out to help along this strike unless ordered to do so by their own officers," said a con-ductor. "We do not like the class of men that are allowed to join the American Railway Union. Many of them are not in any way connected with the railroads. The conductors have been treated squarely by the Chicago and Grand Trunk. It is this taking everybody on regardless of whether they are union men or not that weakens this cause."

The Detroit division of the Grand Trunk is not affected. Several passengers for the west are delayed at this point.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 3.—The action of the Government in determining to authorize the employment of United States troops for the purpose of enforcing the enjoining order issued yesterday by Judges Wood and Grosscup, and a well defined indication that both sides are not only willing but anxious to arrive at a pacific understand-

ing, were the principal features of the strike situation to day.

The predictions made last night that the eve of the country's natal day would witness the beginning of the end were not destined to be fulfilled. There were no signs of weakening on the part of the striking

element. The general managers, on the other hand, maintained the same attitude of firm determination that has characterized every move of the association from the beginning

of the trouble.
