The mayor ably conducted his own defence, in the absence of the city solicitor, who was engaged on the crossings cases in the High Court. Mr. W. H. Curle, represented the C. P. R., the prosecutors in the case. At the weekly sitting of the High Court Judge Lount granted an extension until April of the injunction retension until April of the injunction re-straining the city from interfering with the Wellington street crossing of the C.

The ground being covered with snow in the higher suburbs, where trees and tropical plants were beautiful with a white mantle, greatly aroused the curiosity of the people and created much excitement. snow had not fallen in this city before for nearly half a century. In this city, however, it melted as fast as it fell.

ALL EUROPE SHIVERS. London, Feb. 17.—All Europe is experiencing a return of winter weather. Severe cold and snow storms are reported from all parts of England, Germany, Italy, Austria and Russia. The blizzard continues in the Odessa district. In Switzerland many villages are cut off. Numerous deaths are reported.

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
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
