

# REFORMS PROPOSED

Aldermen Discuss Amendments to Municipal Act

As Suggested by the Council of Hamilton-A Number of Changes Indorsed by the Local City Fathers.

A special meeting of the aldermen was held last night to consider the amendments to the municipal act suggested by the city council of Hamilton. They were passed upon clause

The first recommended that, in cities having a population of more than 15,000, where the aldermen are elected by general vote, there may be two instead of three for each ward. No action was taken, as this does not affect this city.

The second was, that the council may provide that of the aldermen so elected for the first year, one-half the number-being those who receive the highest number of votes-shall hold office for two years, and that at each subsequent election one-half of the office for two years. Though this did not affect London, being based upon the first, the council approved of the principle that it contains.

The third was, that in case of an alderman dying or resigning, the unsuccessful candidate who received the next highest vote shall be entitled to the office, upon taking the requisite oath of qualification; also other suggestions regarding action in similar possibilities. Approved.

The fourth provides that the council shall elect an alderman to a vacant seat in the case of the whole council being elected by acclamation or no candidate takes a vacant office under the provisions of previous sections.

The fifth provides for the election of another alderman to fill a vacancy caused within one month of an election by the death or resignation of one whose term would have extended over the next year. Approved. The sixth gives power to the coun-

cil to elect a mayor from their own number in case the office of mayor should become vacant during the year. Approved. The seventh recommendation, that

the mayor shall hold office only until the date fixed for the organization of the council the next year. Carried. The eighth also was carried. It said that each elector shall vote for aldermen in the same manner that he votes for mayor, and shall be entitled to vote once for each one of the candi-

That a separate ballot be used for the election of mayor and aldermen was a recommendation heartily indorsed by the council. No action was taken regarding the

tenth, which suggests that the nomination for candidates for the office of alderman be held at 1 o'clock in the municipal hall.

Instead of the polls being opened at 8 rather than 9 o'clock, as recommended, the council favored, and passed motion to open at 9 and close at making the time one hour longer. The twelfth clause, that not than one agent for any candidate shall be present at the same time at the

polling or counting of the votes, was approved. The council were unanimously opposed to the recommendation that the qualification of a member of the council be \$5,000 freehold, and that the leasehold qualification be abolished. Instead, the motion to leave it as at

present passed. No action was taken regarding the fourteenth clause, providing for the appointment of a separate official ar-

The council approved of a measure to permit the managers of a child in an industrial school to order a parent to pay a weekly sum for its support. The clause giving power to councils to require that the capacity of all baskets and boxes in which fruit or vegetables are sold to be stamped con-

spicuously was passed. No action was taken in regard to the seventeenth clause, which says that the board of registrars shall define the polling sub-divisions for elections to the Legislative Assembly, and that all voters for these elections shall register under the manhood suffrage registration act. This would cause expense and inconvenience, it was argued, as the registration is now made from the municipal rolls. The council passed the clause
