Court of Revision.

Ald. James Fitzgerald presided at the
first meeting of the Court of Revision for
1893, held in the City Hall last night.
Present: Ald. J. W. Jones, J. W. Jones,
Welford, Stevely and City Clerk, Kingston.
Mr. Charles Lilley was allowed \$6 each of
his two vacant stores and tenements.
No. 2 committee will, on motion of Ald. J.
W. Jones, be recommended to take over
the Becher street private drain, the
owners to be allowed the use of same on
such allowance as the city engineer may
certify to, and the measurements were
confirmed. Ald. Shaw explained the
position of affairs in regard to the Wortley
road drain, and a motion by Ald. Welford
was carried providing that the drain
leading from Bruce to Alma streets be
extended from Alma street to Charles
Morton's property, and be then turned

over the bank into the river, and that the
cost thereof be assessed to the owners be-
tween Alma street and Charles Morton's
property, less the sum of \$200 to be con-
tributed by the owners along the line of the
drain already laid. The motion recom-
mended further that the measurements be
confirmed. The measurements for the
artificial stone walk on the south side of
Green street, from William to Maitland
street, were confirmed, and the meeting
adjourned.

A brilliant headlight in front of the City
Hall, beautiful decorations of various kinds
in the interior, good music by Dayton's
orchestra, nearly 800 dancers on the floor,
and galleries crowded with spectators,
marked the grand success of the first
annual assembly under the auspices of
London Lodge, Brotherhood of Railroad
Trainmen, held in the City Hall
last evening. Such a crowd has not been
seen at any previous ball held there this
season. The committee of management
labored zealously and must have been
highly pleased with the result of their
efforts. Several prominent C. P. R.
officials were present from a distance, and
Mayor Essery, Ald. Draney and Mr.
Joseph Marks, of the Free Library Board,
were among the civic dignitaries in at-
tendance. The programme included all
the popular dances. Supper was served at
the Walsh House.

at the door in entering was not what I
expected, but an intelligent janitor at the
door all the time, and to answer the
telephone would rectify this, the only fault
I see in the management."

Close Season for Fish in Ontario.

Salmon trout and whitefish shall not be
caught between the 1st and 30th of
November.

Fresh water herring shall not be caught
between 5th of October and 1st of De-
cember.

Speckled trout, brook trout, river trout
shall not be caught between 15th of Sep-
tember and 1st of May.

Rain and Mackinac shall not be caught
between 15th of April and 15th June.

Pickeral shall not be caught between
April 15 and May 15.

No one shall buy, sell or possess any of
the above-named fish which have been
caught or killed during the close seasons,
nor shall they have in possession fish that
have been caught by unlawful means at
any time.

It is not unlawful to catch or kill any of
the above-named fish by means of spears,
grapnel hook, negog or nishigans at any
time.

Fishing by means of nets or other ap-
paratus is prohibited.

Concert—Opera—Brilliant.

It was a critical and enthusiastic audi-
ence that greeted the Grand Opera Com-
pany last evening, and there was music to
sustain the enthusiasm throughout the
entire programme. The entertainment was
set in two parts, concert and opera. Of
course, the chief attraction was Mme.
Schirmer-Mapleson. In her selection "Les
Hirondelles" ("The Minstrels"), her voice
heard to good advantage, being a richly
cultivated tone of almost peerless sweet-
ness. After repeated demands for an en-
core, the lady responded with "Comin'
Thro' the Rye," which was executed in a
captivating manner. "The Minstrels"
quartet, from "The Marriage of Figaro,"
was substituted for the last number on the
concert programme, in which Mme. Mapleson's
voice was heard as a flute accompani-
ment, pure, rich, yet mellow. Spontane-
ous and continued applause was ac-
knowledgeed by repetition. In the
rendition of the third act of the opera
"Faust," Mme. Schirmer-Mapleson cer-
tainly proved herself an artist with her
beautiful voice, which is of unusual regis-
tration, under perfect control, the higher
tones of a peculiar brilliancy, and her deli-
cately to perfect that softest notes
vibrated through the building as clearly
as the tinkling of a silver bell. As the
play progresses, the voice acts as a
photograph of the feelings as produced
by the various changes in the situation.
These many qualities were combined with
a naturally winning stage presence and a
beautiful face, and served to win many en-
thusiastic admirers. But it is seldom that
an artist of such high standing gathers
around her a support of individual artists
such as has Mme. Schirmer-Mapleson.
Signor Bernhard Barron, in a selection from
Verdi's "Lombardi," exhibited a clear,
smooth tenor voice of great compass, and
sang with ease and perfection. In response
to an encore he sang "O, Come to Me, My
Love," which was most welcome after the
Italian which the company had been sing-
ing all evening. Signor Sartori has a full,
resonant, bell-like bass tone, which was
best heard in Mozart's "In These Holy
Walls." Mile. Thea Dorri sang "My Lost
Son" (Meyerbeer) charmingly, and was
enthusiastically encored. She is a
mezzo-soprano of easy and brilliant
execution, and very pleasing pres-
ence. As an accompanist Mr. Luck-
stone is a thoroughly capable and
satisfactory artist, interpreting each
singer's accompaniment with feeling and
precision. His orchestration of the piano
in accompaniment to the operatic selection
was masterly. The third act from "Faust"
was produced in its entirety, and was a
gem of vocalization. The acting of the
prima donna was superb, particularly in
the love scene with Faust, and the bright
music kept the audience spell-bound
during the progress of the whole
performance. Siebel's song, "In the
Garden," was excellently rendered by
Mile. Thea Dorri. Signor Barron won
favor by his rendering of the "Salve
Dimora" air, while Mme. Schirmer-
Mapleson was very pleasing in her inter-
pretation of the "Jewel Song." Altogether
a better concerted entertainment has
never been heard in the city, and a
return visit should crowd the Opera House.
There is a probability of the Mapleson
Company returning next season in English
opera which will be highly appreciated by
the music-loving citizens, as the pro-
cession would form a grand nucleus for
high-class operatic performances, with full
chorus and orchestra.

The Death of R. S. Murray.

Mr. R. S. Murray passed away at his
late residence, on the corner of Talbot and
Kent streets, yesterday afternoon. De-
ceased, who was about 73 years old, had
been ailing for several weeks with pneu-
monia, and its complications. He was a
native of the parish of Rogart, county of
Sutherland, Scotland, and emigrated to
this country with his parents while very
young. With his father he settled on a
100-acre farm near Embro, Oxford county,

and there remained until he reached the
age of 17 or 18, when he came to this
city and engaged as clerk in the drygoods
store of Messrs. J. G. and Alexander Mc-
Intosh. This was in 1844, and Mr. Murray
remained with them several years, going
into business on his own account in 1848 or
1849. The business portion of the city at
that time was considerably westward from
where it is now, and Mr. Murray opened a
store next door to his employers, and
about where Massey's wholesale house now
stands. He carried on a successful busi-
ness in those days, and eventually removed
to the stand which he occupied at the time
of his death. He married in the year 1850,
to Miss Coombs, who, though very infirm,
still survives him. Three daughters and
one son are living—Mrs. McGroey and Miss
Annie Murray, at home; Mrs. Robert Scott
of Milwaukee, and John Murray, of Ver-
non, N. Y. Another son, William, is
dead. Deceased was a Presbyterian, and
for a long time was con-
nected with St. Andrew's Church.
Several years ago, however, he became as-
sociated with the First Presbyterian
Church. Mr. Murray had been engaged
continuously in business for the last 48
years, and was probably the oldest active
merchant in the city of London. He was
much esteemed and respected, and by his
death an old landmark has been removed
from the mercantile circle of the city. The
funeral takes place Friday.

"Fontenelle" Friday Night.

James O'Neill appears at the Grand to-
morrow night in "Fontenelle," his new
play. The Boston Globe says: "A grand
ovation it was, and no mistake, that James
O'Neill received at the Bowdoin Square
Theater last evening. But it was a mild
greeting compared with the enthusiasm
that arose at the conclusion of the first act.
The outburst of applause lasted several
minutes. Even at this point it was evi-
dent that 'Fontenelle' was a success, and
through the admirable efforts of Mr.
O'Neill the romantic drama was given mag-
nificent impetus. 'Fontenelle' is a go. It
is a stimulator of the emotions. It is a
series of vivid pictures finely portrayed.
The historical features of 'Fontenelle' are
not sacrificed, although there must
have been a strong temptation on the
part of the authors to introduce much ex-
traneous matter. In confining themselves
to the facts in the celebrated episode in the
reign of Louis XV., they have showed good
judgment, with the result that every char-
acter has something worth doing—some-
thing that would weaken the entire piece
if omitted. There is little except praise to
be given the impersonation which Mr.
O'Neill gave of Henri de Fontenelle.
'Fontenelle' is elaborately staged. An
article on its scenic effects alone might be
written. The costumes, too, is on a
superb scale."
