These mementoes were once the possessions of that Col. Tomlinson who was the officer in charge of the King from the time of his imprisonment in the Tower until the end, and were presented to him at the last scene in Whitehall by Charles I. as all he had left to requite him for his civilities. When the relics were submitted an opening bid of \$50 was made, and by slow advances \$500 was reached. 
