trailer left the rails.

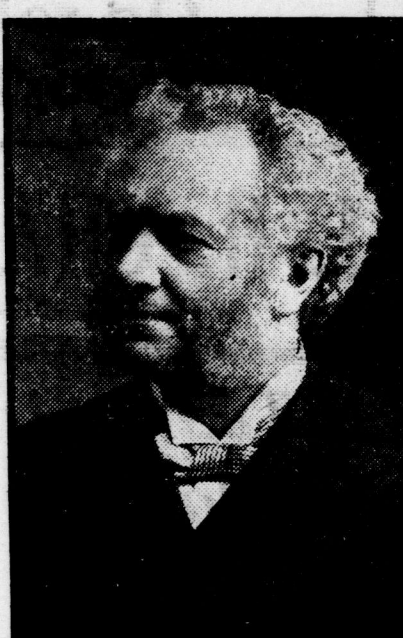
A Hamilton road car jumped the

BIG COMPANY IS
BEING ORGANIZED

London Capitalists Interested,
Others in Toronto and Hamil-
ton, in Creamery Concern.

The largest creamery concern yet
formed in Canada is being organized
under the name of the Canada Produce
Company, Limited, capitalized at \$250,000.
Certain London capitalists are in-
terested, together with others in Mon-
treal, Hamilton and Toronto. A Domi-
nion charter has been applied for.
The company will operate a creamery
in the vicinity of Montreal, having a
daily capacity of 20,000 pounds of but-
ter. It will export butter largely to
Great Britain, where the price has im-
proved of late, and will ship also eggs
and poultry. The company will intro-
duce the system of collecting cream at
a centralized creamery, which has been
instrumental in building up the dairy
business in the Western States. Cream
will be expressed by farmers within a
radius of a hundred miles. The head
office will be in Montreal.

Most of the capital stock has been
subscribed, and the company will prob-
ably commence operations soon after
receiving a charter. When the proposed
creamery is fully established, others
will be started on similar lines in dif-
ferent parts of Canada.

people who know the house and know
the man.

This journal, as an exponent of the
principles of the Conservatives and an
admirer of the policy enunciated by
Hon. Mr. Hanna, deeply de-
plores the action taken. How the com-
missioners, in view of the tremendous
public sentiment existing in the ranks
of Conservatism in our constituency,
could proceed as they have done is
beyond our ken. Surely so strong an
expression as was evidenced in the
position of the county and city council
and the stand of such potent Conserva-
tive exponents as Messrs. Mason
Campbell, William Ball, Dr. J. L. Bray,
Reeve, Cornelius Purser, of Dover,
County Commissioner J. Chinmick, of
Raleigh, and hundreds of others should
have had some consideration at the
hands of the board.

That the action was taken in the
name of the Conservative party is de-
plorable. The Conservatives of West
Kent repudiate it.
