LATE RICHARD KETTLEWELL

Death Removes One of the Oldest Settlers of Middlesex County.

The death of Mr. Richard Kettlewell, of Stratford, on the 6th inst., removes one of the earliest settlers in Middlesex County, and recalls a period of pioneer days, filled with hardships and privations. Mr. Kettlewell was born in York, Eng., on June 12, 83 years ago. In 1834 he came with his family to Canada, and settled two miles from the village of St. Thomas. Five years later he moved to the still more sparsely-settled township of Elfrida, and subsequently located on a farm in the bush wilderness of Metcalfe. Here on Feb. 5, 82 years ago, he married Ann Tennant, formerly of England, and to them were born ten children, six boys and four girls.

Beginning life in a home rudely constructed of logs, hewn out from the clearance, Mr. Kettlewell became one of the most successful farmers of the township, took an active part in the progress of the country and in early municipal affairs, and saw Western Ontario develop from a wooded wilderness into its cities, its towns, and fine farming communities.

In the deceased pioneer's early life, London and St. Thomas were small villages, and Stratford had but four houses. These were the days when every man was as poor as his neighbor, and life, from a modern viewpoint, was for both husband and wife one great hardship. There were no railroads, and the finest timber was unobtainable. Even cordwood had no market, for every man grew his own fuel. Roads were not yet opened up, and for four years the nearest approach to them was a footpath through the bush, and a blazed road over which, even in summertime, the oxen drew the grain ten miles to mill on a home-made sleigh. Wheat frequently sold for 30 cents, and corn for 20 cents. St. Thomas and Delaware for "three shillings" (37½ cents), and oats for 10 cents a bushel. Threshing was, of course, done with the flail. The nearest store was six miles distant, and to walk to it and carry the butter and eggs was a work that the wife as well as the husband shared. The nearest town was in Delaware, 20 miles away. In those days, were more or less plentiful, and Mr. Kettlewell could call the time when he drove from Metcalfe to London to get the seven dollars bounty offered for the head of one.

After a life of hard work on the farm, Mr. Kettlewell moved to Stratford, where he lived in retirement. In his family life the deceased was singularly blessed. Twelve years ago, he and his aged wife celebrated their golden wedding, and at that time his ten children were all living. Since then a son and a daughter had been taken from him, but in his declining years he knew less of the sting of death than falls to the lot of the average man.

WATCH FOR MR. COMET. San Jose, Cal., March 18.—Halley's comet will be visible to the naked eye just before dawn on April 8, or shortly after that date, states S. W. W. Campbell, director of Lick Observatory.

"On May 18 the earth may pass through the tail of the comet," said Director Campbell, "but there is no danger for terrestrial life, as the tail will be extremely attenuated."

POLITICAL LEADERS TAKE HAND IN STRIKE

Strong Pressure Being Brought To End the Industrial Strife at Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, March 17.—With the arrival here today of State Senator James S. McNichol, and William S. Vare, recorder of deeds of the county, the most potential leaders of the dominant political party in Philadelphia, it is said, added force was given to the movement to bring about peace between the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company and its striking employees. Senator Penrose, it is expected, may also take a hand in peace negotiations. Leading members of the Republican organization are closely allied with certain powerful interests in the Rapid Transit Company, and the attitude Senator McNichol will assume in the trouble is awaited with interest. Senator McNichol is credited with having brought about the end of the carmen's strike last June.

Both branches of city councils will meet in regular session late this afternoon, and more resolutions urging arbitration and other peace methods are expected to be presented. It is believed that if Mayor Reyburn had shown a desire to enter arbitration proceedings, he would have been strongly backed up by the councils. The mayor has not changed his attitude, however, and reiterates he is only interested in maintaining the law. Edward Louber Stokes, the broker, who procured the first meeting between the strike leaders and the car officials, is continuing his efforts to secure some settlement of the difficulty. It is said that he represents powerful financial interests.

EUCCHARISTIC CONGRESS

Some Opposition Shown To Montreal Paying for Entertainment of Guests.

Montreal, March 18.—Not for a great many years has there been such opposition to a plan that the city council of Montreal proposed to make as that implied in the suggestion that it would very likely make a grant of \$50,000 towards the expenses of the Eucharistic conference to be held in Montreal next September, which is said to be one-half of the total.

The Montreal Presbytery recently passed a strong resolution opposing the proposal, and now the Protestant Ministerial Association has endorsed the resolution, passed by the Presbytery of Montreal, with the result that a large number of the French-Canadian clergymen seem greatly exercised over the opposition, claiming that there have been a number of precedents for the action proposed.

Feeling has been running to a very high pitch and today the civic reception committee came out with a statement that, while it had discussed the question of voting funds to the coming congress, there had never been any intention made of the sum to be given. The announcement regarding the amount must therefore have been obtained by local newspapers from some of the individual members of the committee.

A LINE TO LINK ANTIPODES AND CANADA

Ships Will Bring the Australian Produce to Canada and Carry Back Manufactured Goods.

Ottawa, March 18.—It has just been announced by the Canadian Government that a new direct service between Canadian Atlantic ports and Australia and New Zealand will be put on this summer. This service is to be put on by the New Zealand Shipping Company, which is one of the big steamship companies of the world. It is expected that this new line will result in a large accretion of trade between Eastern Canada and the Antipodes, the boats bringing frozen meat, wool, tallow, hides and other Australian products to Canada, and taking back manufactured products, such as agricultural implements, flour, carriages, buggies, boots and shoes, sewing machines, and other Canadian manufactured articles, which have for long past been in strong demand in Australia.

The new service will be inaugurated with the sailing of the steamship Rakaka from Montreal on May 15, and monthly sailings thereafter. The New Zealand Shipping Company, which is inaugurating this new venture, is one of the strong shipping companies of the world. It was inaugurated in New Zealand in 1872, with several sailing vessels, but speedily grew, until, with the advent of steam vessels, it took on a new phase, and became a concern with wide affiliations. At present its headquarters are at London, England, and at Christchurch, New Zealand, and the company owns 17 first-class modern steamships, operating all over the world.

In its origin the company was formed by a number of New Zealand farmers, who felt the necessity for foreign outlet for their trade, but its success speedily caused it to outgrow this limited start.

The service will be operated by five steamships, Montreal being the summer port and West St. John the winter port. The names of the vessels are as follows: Rakaka, Whakatane, Waimate, Papanui and Wakatani. Speedy and Large.

The vessels to be engaged in the service will be comparatively speedy and of large carrying capacity. This service is of more than ordinary importance to the manufacturers in Canada, particularly those in Ontario, Quebec, and the Maritime Provinces, for the reason that it will enable them to lay their commodities down in the Australasian markets with regularity and permit them to compete on an equal footing with their friends south of the boundary. It is the intention of the New Zealand Shipping Company to give the Canadian manufacturer every facility and concession which the American manufacturer now enjoys and which Canadians have felt for some time past they were not obtaining through the port of New York owing to certain discrimination. A matter worthy of note is that although New Zealand granted to the Canadians a preferential tariff some years ago the same has been of little benefit, as it is claimed by Canadian manufacturers that the steamship lines operating out of New York immediately advanced for the carriage of frozen meats from the Antipodes.

This service will undoubtedly promote a more friendly feeling between Australia, New Zealand and Canada, and also increase the interchange of commodities between these great links of the Empire.

AMBITIOUS ANNIE.

Watertown, N. Y., March 17.—Annie L. Peck, the mountain climber, in a letter to the Standard today, states that she would prefer to break the world's record in the Himalayas of 24,600 feet now held by the Duke of the Abruzzi, than to attempt the ascent of Mount McKinley. "It would be impossible to guarantee the ascent of Mount McKinley, as it is not likely that it can be done by anyone," she said, "but I think there is no question of my ability to surpass Prince Luigi's record in the Himalayas, as there are many mountains in India of the necessary height."
