

Removed From Hospital.—Allen Sharpe and Edwin Worth, the men who were injured in an automobile accident two miles south of the city Sunday afternoon, recovered sufficiently Monday to be removed from St. Joseph's Hospital to their homes. Both men were unconscious for some time after the accident, and it was thought they were internally injured, but their rapid recovery proved that such was not the case.

Knocked Down by Auto.—George Norton, contractor, 75 Cathcart street, was bruised considerably about the right leg and thigh Monday night, when he was struck and knocked down at the corner of Clarence and King streets by an automobile driven by Mr. W. Hueston. The fact that the automobile was travelling slowly at the time, and that the driver had perfect control of it, saved Mr. Norton from more serious injuries. BYRON FRUIT GROWERS ARE PROGRESSIVE LOT

Witness Practical Demonstration of Apple Packing By Experts.

Byron, Oct. 21.—The progressive spirit which has characterized all the business matters of the Byron Fruit Growers' Association is being fully maintained, and a practical demonstration of apple packing in boxes and barrels was given Saturday by Mr. E. Palmer, of Toronto, on the farm of Mr. N. E. Hines, before a large and enthusiastic gathering of local growers which should prove useful to them in their packing operations this fall.

Mr. Hines, who was instrumental in securing the services of Mr. Palmer, addressed the growers at the outset. He stated Mr. Palmer was assistant to Mr. H. W. Hodgett, and a young man who had been credited to the packing business. He sincerely hoped the growers would benefit from the demonstration, and bring it into practice this fall.

Demonstrated Packs.

Mr. Palmer at once got down to business. He invited all questions, and dwelt on the importance of packing apples in accordance with the government regulations. He immediately proved he was past master in the packing art, and manipulated the apples into their right places in the boxes with amazing alacrity. He demonstrated all the packs in usage, and clearly described the benefits to be obtained from each. The growers asked many questions which were promptly answered, and the enthusiasm was maintained to the end.

Mr. W. J. Bartlett, the secretary of the association, was favored with an interview with Mr. Palmer.

advantages for apple culture. I want to impress upon the growers, however, that they must spray and prune their trees thoroughly to obtain a large percentage of No. 1 fruit. Don't let the apples cluster on the trees, thin them out by summer pruning. It is not a question of how many apples on a tree, but how many consistent with quality can be obtained. I am pleased to learn the growers have co-operated and have sold their pack at favorable prices. My sympathies are always with the grower.

Good Prices.

Mr. W. J. Bartlett had also an important message.

"We have sold our apples," he said, "at good prices, even down to the cull fruit for cider, and every orchard here will be cleaned up thoroughly this fall.

"While our apples are fairly good this fall," he went on, "there is plenty of room for improvement. We are troubled with San Jose scale, and it will require all our vigilance to keep it in check. Unfortunately, the majority of men in the county would not know the scale if they saw it on their trees. At the office of the department of agriculture, King street, specimens of the scale can be seen, and anyone in doubt should call there and inspect same.

Our branch has appointed a committee to advise the council with the view of making it compulsory for every orchardist to spray his trees, and I hope their efforts will be successful. If this law is not enforced in a few years' time most of the orchards in Middlesex will be wiped off the map, so terrible is the pest."
