Work of the Women's Clubs

LOCAL COUNCIL.

Interesting accounts of the executive meeting of the National Council of Women, held in Ottawa a few weeks ago, were given yesterday at a meeting of the local council by Mrs. R. M. Graham who represented the local organization at the executive. The annual meeting of the national council will convene in Toronto this year, from October 24 to 30, it being the 21st birthday of both the dominion and Toronto councils. At the executive meeting it was unanimously decided to invite Lady Aberdeen to be present on that occasion.

Mrs. Graham also reported that the national executive had decided to change the official organ from "The Canadian" to the "Woman's Century." This will doubtless take effect shortly. Another interesting report was that of the Social Service Congress, held in Ottawa at the same time as the National Council Executive, and to which Mrs. Graham was also the representative from the local council.

Night Police Matron.

Among various matters of business discussed at yesterday's meeting a recommendation was passed to the effect that a police matron be engaged to be at the police station at night. It was decided to postpone the annual meeting of the local council until June, when Mrs. Boomer would have returned to London. Mrs. T. G. Duncan was appointed to act as the council's representative on the social service committee. In the absence of Mrs. Boomer, Mrs. Barker occupied the chair, and among those present were Mesdames Tilley, Graham, Edwards, Duncan, Graham, Marshall, S. F. Lawrence, Callard, Miss MacKinnon and Miss M. A. Moore.

LADIES' SANATORIUM AID.

It is not much more than a year ago that the Women's Sanatorium Aid Society, realizing the prevalence of tubercular symptoms amongst school children, conceived the idea of a sanatorium at the Byron Sanatorium—an institution where children affected with the disease might receive education and treatment at the same time. They undertook to raise \$10,000 in one year towards the erection of the sanatorium, and marvelous success has crowned their efforts in every undertaking. Previous to the bazaar held in the Masonic Temple yesterday afternoon and night, some \$7,000 of the fund had been obtained, and it is proposed to open the sanatorium during this month. Free baths for the tubercular children of the poor will be maintained. The need for the sanatorium can quickly be realized when it is stated that there is already a waiting list of 28 children, and it is estimated that all the accommodation will be taken up when the sanatorium is ready for occupancy.

Ans.—I would suggest you start the first letter with "Dear Friend," and then as the correspondence progresses, change to "Dear Casey."

For Dry Shampoo.

Dear Miss Grey,—A lady who is an invalid has very long thick hair. It is dangerous for her to wash it in cold water as she might take cold. Would you please tell me what a "dry shampoo" is and how to use it? I think it would be a good way to keep her hair clean. Thanking you, MARIE.

Ans.—Many use talcum powder mixed with a very little powdered orris root for a dry shampoo. It cleans the hair and scalp but requires a deal of patience to brush entirely out. Part the hair and sprinkle the powder on the scalp; after half an hour or so commence to brush.

PREPARE FOR MOVING DAY

Do not begin to tear up a month before moving day, not yet leave it until the last day. Neither way is right nor comfortable.

Weed out and dispose of unnecessary possessions that someone else may be glad to make use of. Pack unused clothing into boxes and mark the contents on each box. Books, pictures and ornaments are best packed in rather small boxes that are easy to handle. Have carpets, rugs or matting cleaned, rolled and tied.

For packing kitchen utensils, jars of fruit, etc., tubs are good, for they have handles. Be careful not to have any-

Reads Column First.

Dear Miss Grey,—The first thing I do when picking up the paper is to go to what you have to say. I often think of the patience you must have and also the "laughs" in between. Now this is my first letter to you and I hope sometime to see it in print. Could you please tell me how to clean a rice straw hat? I have a Chinese scarf? And Miss Grey do you know of a cement that will serve the purpose of putting together a marble image, or better still, maybe you could say where I could purchase same. Thanking you in advance. Sincerely yours, MINTO.

Ans.—Most of the drug stores sell preparations for cleaning straw hats of any kind. If you desire a home treatment, however, first free the hat from dust, then put a small quantity of oxalic acid into a basin; dilute with hot water, and with a small hand brush go over the hat quickly. Dry before a brisk fire.

2. For the scarf, buy a seal of full of gasoline, put the scarf in and let it remain for two or three hours; remove and dry the scarf between towels.

3. I think this cement would prove of service to you: Mix plaster of paris into a strong solution of gum arabic until it is the right consistency; apply with a brush to the fractured edges and let dry for three days. This cement is very white and strong. The unbeaten white of egg mixed with plaster of paris is another good cement.

Barrels for China. Barrels are best for the fine china and glassware. When packing breakables remember that every article must be prepared so that none of its surface is left exposed to pressure without support, so stuff all hollow articles as full as possible, surround all handles, stems, etc., by padding so thick that the article becomes, as nearly as one can make it, a solid ball.

Cups and glasses should not be slipped inside each other unless well covered with padding. Plates and saucers may be made in a pile with stuffing between them and the whole made solid by bands of muslin wound round them. Excelsior and newspapers are good packing material, but often kitchen towels, holders, underwear, etc., may be used to steady things and get themselves transported at the same time.

Two days before moving day will suffice for the general breaking up in an ordinary household and will give ample time to plan how it should be done with a view to condensing and safe packing. The kitchen and dining room necessities should be so packed that one can lay hands on them on arrival at the new place; also sheets, pillows, blankets, etc., for the first night's rest. It is in the final packing that the housewife realizes the benefit of the plan of packing leisurely the articles not in general use.

CAROLINE COE'S TESTED RECIPES

Escalloped Fish
One pound of halibut.
One pint of stale bread crumbs.
One cupful of white sauce.

Cook the halibut in hot water for a few seconds; drain and pick into small pieces. Place a layer of crumbs in a buttered baking dish; then a layer of fish over which sprinkle a little parsley if at hand. Then add a layer of white sauce and more crumbs and fish until all ingredients are used. Have the top layer of crumbs. Bake in a moderate oven until puffy, and a rich brown on top. Serve immediately.

For the white sauce place a tablespoonful of butter in a fryer and when melted stir in one level tablespoonful of butter, warm smooth and add one generous cupful hot milk, stirring until smooth and creamy. Season with salt and pepper.

Potato Rusk
One cupful hot mashed potato.
One cupful milk.
Four tablespoonfuls flour.
Quarter cupful sugar.

One compressed yeast cake.
Half cupful lukewarm water.
One tablespoonful salt.
One large tablespoonful shortening.
Two eggs.
Half cupful currants.

Soften yeast in the warm water and pour into deep bowl; add sugar, potato, salt, milk and flour, then beat into a smooth batter; cover and let rise until foamy; add the beaten eggs, salt, melted shortening after it has become cool; then the currants and enough more flour to make a soft dough easily molded until velvety; replace in the buttered bowl, cover and let stand in warm place to rise. Tear off bits and mold into long biscuits, place side by side in greased pan; let rise again and bake about twenty minutes in hot oven.

If your kitchen is small and crowded take out the kitchen table and have a hinged shelf made. A shelf answers every purpose of a table and can be put down out of the way when not in use.

To flower pansies in the house sow the seed in shallow boxes of sandy soil. When they are rooted, transplant them in window boxes or separate pots. Keep them quite warm, give them abundance of water and a great deal of sun. To test silk, fray out the threads and break them. If they snap easily, it is not good. The warp thread running lengthwise should be of equal strength with the wool thread running crosswise.
