

GREY BATTALION LUSTILY CHEERED ON HEADING EAST

Most Impressive Farewell Yet Tendered by Camp Borden
Brigades—Popular Unit—Lambtons Expected
to Soon Go Overseas.

CAMP BORDEN, Oct. 6.—Cheered to the echo by the three thousand odd soldiers still remaining in camp over the week-end, the 14th Grey Battalion, enroute for a point east this afternoon. They had only 24 hours' notice, as they only arrived back in camp from their last leave last night at 10 o'clock, and were immediately given their final warning. At Owen Sound last night the battalion bade farewell to the majority of their friends, where a tremendous demonstration was given them on their departure for camp, but a few Owen Sound people came to the camp this afternoon to watch the official farewell.

Col. S. C. Mewburn, A. A. G., acting for Major-General W. A. Lorie, who is in Ottawa, said goodbye to Lieut.-Col. F. G. McFarlane, in which a large number of the staff officers who were also present, joined.

Cheered by Other Corps.
Headed by a brass band the Greys paraded through the camp, and were greeted at every step by lusty cheers and good wishes of the units who lined the road at the station. Most of the soldiers in camp gathered to see them off, and the scene was not only one of the most orderly but one of the most impressive seen in departure of units from the camp. The cheering, which followed them as the train pulled out, proved only too well the feeling of the other units towards them, as the Greys have been favorites in the camp ever since they arrived, and have the bayonet fighting championship team, which title they won in a hard battle from the 13th Kitchener Battalion in the finals. Their lacrosse team was also a contestant in the finals.

Lieut.-Col. McFarlane was at one time musketry instructor in Military Division No. 2, and on appointment to the command of the Greys organized and recruited the battalion in Grey County. He was considered a

capable officer, and his battalion was always to the fore in every branch of training.

Approximately 20,000 troops are away on pass. The 14th Lambton Battalion went on leave yesterday, and it may be their last leave. Under the ruling of Major-General W. A. Lorie a week in any unit going on the monthly four-day leave and later warned for overseas, would not be allowed on leave again. Following the inspection of the 14th by Lieut.-Col. J. S. Campbell the other day, who was favorably impressed, it is rumored that on the return of the camp commandant tomorrow from Ottawa, where he has been conferring with the parliamentary under-secretary, the Lambtons will be warned for overseas. If this happens the 8th Brigade will all leave for overseas, and possibly the brigade staff.

Rumor of Lawsuit.
Reports have reached camp that Pte. Leeson, a delinquent, who was one of the principals in the "spanking" case in the 142nd London's Own Battalion, is threatening to sue Lieut.-Col. C. M. R. Graham, officer commanding the unit, for ordering him to be given corporal punishment. Officers in camp do not take the matter seriously. Cases are cited in chapter 411 of the manual of military law, where damages for excessive or illegal punishment were secured by privates and others, but none of the cases took place recently. It is thought that even if proceedings are started they would hardly be brought into court now, as Col. Graham will be leaving shortly for overseas, and headquarters would hardly listen to a request that he be detained to stand trial.

The following N. C. O.'s are struck off the strength of the brigades and battalions opposite their names, where they have been employed as instructors: C. S. M. Crane, 8th Brigade; C. S. M. Flynn, 13th Battalion, and C. S. M. Hughes, 14th Battalion.

COLOR PRESENTATION TO WELLINGTON UNIT BRILLIANT FUNCTION

Largest Crowd of Spectators in History of Guelph Witness
Ceremony—Headquarters Staff Present—Men
Home for Thanksgiving.

GUELPH, Oct. 6.—Probably never in the history of this city has there been such a crowd of city and county people as assembled here this afternoon at Exhibition Park to witness the presentation of the colors to the Wellington Battalion (133rd). The scene at the park was a brilliant one. The weather was ideal, and the solid khaki dress, with the bright costumes of the ladies, made a spectacle not soon to be forgotten. The gathering together of the city and county people has also done much to work for the future welfare of the regiment, and it is certain there will be now a united response to the appeal to fill it up to overseas strength.

Come on Special.
The battalion arrived from London

on the special train about 11:30 a.m., and proceeded to the armories, lunch being served to them by the ladies of the city in the Winter Fair building. Shortly at 2:30 p.m. the presentation of the colors to the Wellington Battalion, cadets, Boy Scouts, and civic bodies lined up and proceeded to the park. The crowd there was variably estimated at from 5,000 to 6,000. The battalion was in extended formation, and shortly after the headquarters party arrived, and inspected the men, the inspection party consisting of Lieut.-Col. W. J. Brown, D. A. Smith, Lieut.-Col. W. J. Taylor, Accompanying them were Col. Mutrie, Col. MacDonald, Hugh Guthrie, M. P., Major (Judge) Hughes, and Aid. Westoby. Following the inspection the battalion formed in hollow square style,

the drummers advancing and stacking their drums before the saluting base. Lieuts. Thompson and Nickle then advanced.

Women Give Colors.
Miss Holliday, president of the Women's County League, and Mrs. Perry, of Mount Forest, vice-president, presented the colors to Col. Shannon on behalf of the organizations that had provided the funds for their purchase. The ceremony, blessing the colors, was conducted by Ven. Archdeacon Davidson, assisted by Rev. (Capt.) Hindson, the chaplain of the regiment. The colors were then turned over to the regiment, and accepted in a short speech by Col. Pritchard. Short addresses were then made by Messrs. Hugh Guthrie and W. A. Clark, the members for South and North Wellington in the Federal House.

March-Past.
Immediately following this, the battalion formed in parade order, and the march-past took place, with Col. Shannon receiving the salute. The rest of the afternoon was filled up with physical training exercises, and various military manoeuvres. The battalion made a distinctly favorable impression on its visit to the county seat.

The men were later dismissed, and the majority of them left for points north in the county, where they will spend their Thanksgiving. Excursions were run from nearly all the towns in the district, a holiday having been declared at nearly all these points. Among the out-of-town people present was Lieut.-Col. James L. Hughes of Toronto.

Kiltie Soldier Makes Great Stop of Runaway Team

Leaps Into Rear of Wagon and
Checks Horses' Mad Career
Down Dundas Street.

Last night at about 7 o'clock hundreds of citizens witnessed one of the quickest bits of thinking, followed by quick acting that has been seen in London in many a day. A team of heavy horses, attached to a large express wagon, were standing on Dundas street when they were suddenly frightened. The driver was in a store, and uncontrolled, the horses dashed madly off, going east on Dundas street.

Pte. Ball of the 241st Kiltie Battalion was standing on the corner of Dundas and Richmond streets. The team gained the corner traveling in mad leaps, the wagon swaying from side to side, a trace loose and a terrible dash to destruction. Pte. Ball saw, realized instantly what was needed, and as instantly acted. With a rush he gained the rear of the wagon, and although pitched violently about, he managed to hang on and pulled himself into the body. Grasping the lines he pulled the team up by the time it gained Clarence street.

Crowds who saw the event were enthusiastic over the action of Pte. Ball. A man who can think as quickly and act as he did, is a credit to any battalion.

BURIED TWICE BY GERMAN SHELLS IN ATTACK ON TRENCH

London Sergeant Now in Base
Hospital From Injuries.

CALLS FIRE "HELLISH"

Canadians Were Advancing
Over Captured Ground
When Bowled Over.

Twice buried by shells, Sergt. Percy Aldridge, son of Percy St. Clair Aldridge of Chelsea Green and a former city employee, is now in a base hospital in France suffering from shell shock and concussion. Sergt. Aldridge went over with the 33rd Battalion, but was transferred to another Canadian regiment at the front. An official card stating that he was admitted to the hospital was received by his father today, and on the same mail came a letter from the injured soldier. He was, he writes, taking part in an advance on the Germans on the Somme under a most hellish fire when he was first bowled over. His platoon had charged up a hill and into a trench taken from the Germans. He was standing in this trench when he was buried by a shell explosion. Commanded to get up and carried him down the trench to a more protected position. As he lay there another German shell struck the top of the trench and once more Sergt. Aldridge was buried.

After his second burial he was taken back to the base where he is lying swathed in bandages from his ankles to his hips. He is feeling better, however, he writes, and does not anticipate that his injuries will be as serious as was at first believed.

MAJOR WRIGHT'S WOUNDS PROVING MORE SERIOUS

Letter From His Wife Reveals This
Fact.

A letter just received from England by Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Wright, from their daughter-in-law, Mrs. Ward Wright, states that the condition of Major Ward Wright, who was wounded in action the middle of September is even more serious than was understood from the cablegrams. Mrs. Ward Wright is with her husband in Chatham, England, where he is being cared for in the Port Pitt General Hospital.

He is suffering from two bullet wounds, one in the right hand and the other in the abdomen. The nerves in the right side have been severed and his right arm and leg are paralyzed at the present time. The physicians, however, are holding out hope that it may be possible to unite the nerves and that the use of the right leg may again be restored.

As soon as he was able to do so after being wounded, Major Wright wrote a brief note to his wife with great effort. This note, in his own writing, conveyed the information to her before he reached England, "I am happy. Have served the Empire."

WHAT WILL BECOME OF THEIR UNIFORMS?

London, Oct. 6.—The Canadian Army Council announces an order forbidding honorary colonels to wear uniform in this country. This will be generally welcomed among the Canadian community here. English papers have had caustic comments upon "honorary Canadian colonels who stalk along Whitehall receiving salutes galore from the genuine article of every rank."

ST. THOMAS TO GET KILTIES FOR WINTER, SAYS HEADQUARTERS

241st Battalion Not Coming
to London.

ACCOMMODATION GOOD

Away From Border, Which
Will Discourage Men
From Deserting.

The statement of O. J. Wilcox M.P., of Windsor, that the 241st Battalion would be moved to London for the winter, a statement which caused heart burning, special council meeting and so on in the border city on Friday was contradicted at district headquarters here today.

Lieut.-Col. Brown A.A.G. states that the 241st will go to St. Thomas unless some urgent reason forces a change of present plans. Major R. W. Bishop, C.R.C.E., states that he has completed all arrangements for the location of the kilties in the Railroad city. The accommodation there is said to be excellent and the men will be away from the border, over which it is comparatively easy for an intending deserter to escape.

The experience of the 90th Battalion with deserters is said to be responsible for the decision to move the kilties from the border.

WINDSOR, Oct. 6.—Much indignation is expressed by citizens here generally at the announcement made by Oliver J. Wilcox, M. P., today, that the 241st Battalion, Canadian Scottish Borderers, which is being recruited in Essex County, will be removed to London for the winter. The reasons given for the move are that the barracks are more suitable quarters are available for the soldiers at London, and also that the fear of desertion is greatly lessened if the men are stationed at the inner city.

At special meetings of the Windsor city council and board of trade, hastily called tonight, strong resolutions of protest were adopted, and will be forwarded to Ottawa, against the battalion's removal.

To make the case still stronger, delegations from the two bodies will go to Ottawa Monday morning and present Windsor's claims to Sir Sam Hughes in person. Much money has already been contributed here for this cause, and to have it removed at this time, will it be further receding.

160TH GETTING READY FOR ITS TRIP EAST

No Date Fixed But Preparation Continued.

No further word has been received of the probable date of departure of the 160th Battalion. "D" company is at the camp and "C" company at the camp house while number of N. C. O.'s and officers are taking various special courses. The balance of the unit is in Bruce County visiting friends on their last leave. These are expected home the week of coming recess, visiting the men their last medical examination and completing the musketry course is under way and progress is being made in spite of extra duties which the 160th has been called upon to perform.

It is thought that the battalion will not be able to get away much before Saturday next.

BROTHER OF C. A. D. C. NON-COM. KILLED

Had Been in France But a Short
Time.

Q.-M.-S. Robertson of the C. A. D. C. received a telegram from Ottawa last evening notifying him of the death of his brother, Pte. John Robertson, in France.

Pte. Robertson was a member of the 45th Battalion in Winnipeg and left for England on the same boat that carried the 160th Battalion. He was transferred to another unit in England, and had been only a short time in France when he was killed.

FRIENDS IN CITY RESENT STORIES ON LIEUT. BEESON

Have Had Letters From Officer at Front.

SAID HE WAS LEFT BEHIND

St. Thomas Report Declared
Officer Had Not Been With
18th in Action.

London friends of Lieut. J. Beeson, late cadet instructor of the St. Thomas Collegiate Institute, resent stories sent out from St. Thomas that he had never served at the front. A dispatch from the Railway City on Friday referred to the strange disappearance of Lieut. Beeson, who crossed with the 18th Battalion, and said that he had not been heard from in some time.

This story announced that Lieut. Beeson had been left in England when the 18th crossed the frontier, and that he had been sent back to Canada, but had failed to report at militia headquarters in London, England, on September 12. Jerry McDonald of the St. Thomas Standard, a dispatch from Lieut. Beeson in France, and in these the officer refers to actions on the front.

"This is some country," he wrote in the last letter from Belgium. "Up to your knees in mud, rats as big as cats, and no wonder as in the open are plenty of dead bodies on which they feed. We are in the support trenches, and move tomorrow into the firing line for four days, and then to the rest camp for bath and change, then to support trenches, reserve and firing line. Last time we only had two killed in our company."

The fact that he wrote from Belgium is said by Mr. McDonald, proof positive that the St. Thomas stories about him being left in London are incorrect. Mr. McDonald also believes that if this part be wrong the remainder of the story is also wrong.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 6.—Hon. Capt. C. E. Keenleyside, old-time Winnipegger, formerly of London, Ont., and now paymaster of the 155th Regina Battalion, has been appointed commanding officer of the 24th Battalion in the war office orders today. The headquarters of the new battalion are not specified.

153RD PROMOTION.
Capt. E. J. Bennett of the 133rd Battalion has been promoted to be major. Capt. J. L. Potter of the 30th Regiment has been appointed to the 153rd with the rank of captain.

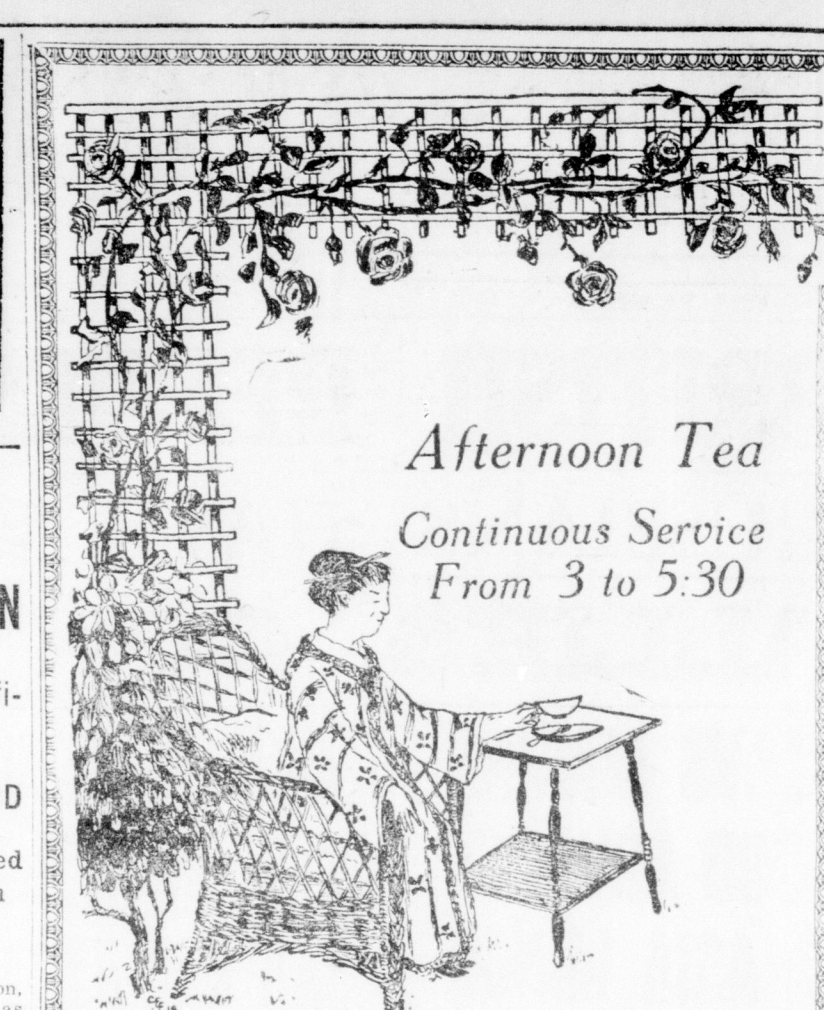
The Queen's Hotel on Carling street was closed on Monday, and all the furnishings disposed of on Wednesday.
