

## Deutsch and Now Ready For Dash To German Shores

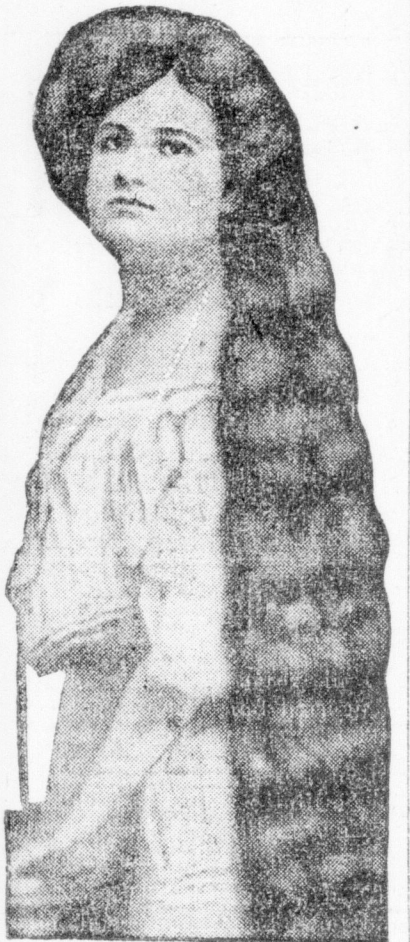
Loaded and Provisioned Sub  
Is To Leave in 48  
Hours.

NEW LONDON, Nov. 10.—The Deutschland, the German merchant submarine, which arrived here on November 1, is loaded and ready to make her dash homeward. The exact time of her departure was a matter of conjecture tonight, but it was generally believed she would sail within the next 48 hours. The value of her cargo is said to be in the neighborhood of \$1,500,000, consisting largely of crude rubber, nickel, zinc and silver bars. The value of the latter is declared to be \$250,000.

## WOULD MOVE AHEAD STATE PROHIBITION BY 12 FULL MONTHS

Michigan Workers Considering  
Such Demands.

SAY 18 MONTHS TOO LONG  
Means Earlier Peace

Statutory Legislation Sug-  
gested, to Become Law  
May 1 Next.

LANSING, Mich., Nov. 10.—That Michigan "drys" who carried the state for state-wide prohibition so overwhelmingly last Tuesday, are seriously considering the advisability of asking the next legislature to apply prohibition by statutory enactment during the year from the 1st of May until the prohibition amendment becomes effective on May 1, 1918, was intimated by Superintendent Grant Hudson of the Michigan Anti-Saloon League today, although at the same time Mr. Hudson insisted no definite plans had been made.

"The headquarters of the Anti-Saloon League has been flooded with letters, telegrams and telephone calls urging that the Legislature be asked to make statutory prohibition effective May 1, 1917, to continue until the constitutional amendment becomes effective May 1, 1918," said Mr. Hudson.

"The burden of these letters has been that the people have declared saloons a nuisance and a menace, and that eighteen months of their continuance means an unnecessary economic tax on communities where they exist. They say eighteen months more of saloon regime means many ruined homes and a loss of many boys and girls."

"If we decide to take any action it will be pushed as energetically as have all our fights," declared Mr. Hudson, "and if we start we will surely finish."

Missouri Still  
Has To Be Shown

It Rejects Prohibition by a Majority of  
124,000.

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 10.—State-wide prohibition was defeated in Missouri last Tuesday by an overwhelming vote. Returns from more than half the voting precincts of the state gave a majority of more than 124,000 against the amendment.

## GAIN MORE GROUND IN THEIR MARCH ON TRIEST, SAYS ROME

Italians Straighten Out Line  
on Corso Plateau.

WEATHER HINDERS FIGHT  
Austrians Claim Losses of the  
Allies Have Been Tremendous  
and Attacks Futile.

ROME, Nov. 10, via London.—Some new ground has been gained by the Italians on the Carso Plateau against the Austrian lines defending the region north of Trieste, the war office announced today. Advances by the Italians in the northern sector where the line has been straightened where several places and thirty prisoners captured, is reported. The statement reads:

"Persistent bad weather has hampered artillery activity. In the northern sector of the Carso front, we have advanced, straightening our line at places and taking thirty prisoners."

HERE IS AUSTRIAN VERSION.  
VIENNA, Thursday, Nov. 9, via London, Nov. 10.—(Delayed)—Reports received here from the Isonzo front show that the latest Italian offensive against the road to Trieste was the shortest, most costly and most resultless operation yet undertaken by Gen. Cadorna.

The reports add that the Italians met with unusual terrain difficulties, because the present Austrian positions are favorably located as a rule. Austrian officers returning from the Isonzo front describe the moving down of the Italians' as having been a most gruesome sight. So far there are no indications here that the Italians intend to resume the offensive there soon.

## POLE SELECTED AS NEW AMBASSADOR TO STATES

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Secretary Lansing announced today that the Austrian Government has named Count de Tarnow-Tarnowski as ambassador to the United States, and that he had been accepted by this Government.

Count Tarnow-Tarnowski was secretary of the embassy here for two years. He has been in the diplomatic service since 1897, and has been attached to embassies and legations at Constantinople, Athens, Paris, Dresden, Brussels, London and Sofia.

The new ambassador is a Pole, his home being in Galicia.

## DISCOVERS GOLD ORE IN WILDS OF QUEBEC

Prospector Finds "Pay Dirt" Near St.  
Anne de Beaurpre.

[Canadian Press.]  
Quebec, Nov. 10.—Adelard Rock, a mine prospector who worked in Klondike regions, in Alaska, California, and other mining centres, has just taken claim papers at the provincial mines department to work a claim in the parish of St. Joachim, near St. Anne de Beaurpre, where he says he discovered a gold mine some days ago. Samples of the gold ore he has had tested at the Laval University, Quebec, and also in Montreal, and reports, he says, show that the ore from his mine will pay between \$200 and \$300 a ton.

Five years ago, a local farmer had been reported finding gold on the present Rock claim but he had kept the thing to himself, having no money to operate and fearing robbery of his discovery.

Rock's claim papers are in due form and he intends prospecting deeper into the ground for richer ore. The claim also yielded fat oil deposits, according to the prospector.

## WILSON'S ELECTION CALLED FAVORABLE BY BRITISH PRESS

Some Papers Express Gratification  
at American Results.

MEANS EARLIER PEACE  
So Says One Editor in Laud-  
ing Prowess of U. S.  
Executive.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—The re-election of President Wilson is welcomed by the Weekly Nation as an event favorable both to peace and to the cause of state liberty, and the paper thinks that his election offers hope of an earlier end to the war than any nation enduring it can yet foresee. William Henry Massingham, the editor, in a special note referring to President Wilson, says:

"The resources of the European statesmanship are not so rich nor are its personalities so inspiring that it can readily dispense with an acute, powerful and in some degree prophetic intellect at the head of the greatest power that the war has left standing, and the most sympathetic to ourselves. I think that most men and women here, who take more than casual interest in American politics, read the news of Mr. Hughes' earlier success with sinking hearts."

The New Statesman considers it better for the Allies to have to do with a president whose mind they know, and who is unlikely to raise serious difficulties concerning the British blockade.

"Moreover," it adds, "Wilson is the more likely to be interested personally in the promotion of an Anglo-American entente, on the creation of which after the war so many important things will depend."

## MAELSTROM OF WAR PURGES HIM FROM FORMER DISGRACE

Heroic Deeds Win Recognition  
for Ex-Court Chaplain.

DECORATED FOR VALOR  
Dismissed Clergyman Sought  
Solace and Won Honors  
in Foreign Legion.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—The Evening World today says:

"Another man has emerged from the European war purged of disgrace, according to information received today. Frederick P. Farrar of the French foreign legion, has been decorated for valor in the field and acclaimed for conspicuous gallantry."

"He disappeared five years ago after his many friends here and in England learned that, as the Rev. Dr. Frederick Farrar, rector of Sandringham, domestic chaplain to King George and honorary chaplain to Queen Alexandra, queen dowager of Great Britain, he had been dismissed from his court post. He had not been heard of since in the United States or England, until a few days ago."

"For a year he has been fighting in the foreign legion, but it is not known under what name. His persistent courage finally drew attention to him. In addition to other honors, it is understood he was offered a commission in the British army by the King but declined, preferring to fight in the ranks with his present comrades."

The former rector's wife was Miss Nora Davis of Philadelphia, a sister of the late Richard Harding Davis. He met her when he was a Philadelphia newspaper reporter, and they have been married only five months when his disgrace came.

Farrar is a son of the late Canon Farrar, author of the famous "Life of Christ." He graduated from Cambridge in 1897, and in 1907 he succeeded to the rectory of Sandringham. Many celebrities were at his marriage at St. Andrew's, Westminster, to Miss Davis.

Suddenly, it was reported he was suspected of an offence that made the retention of his high office impossible. He is said to have refused to resign when asked. The next day he disappeared. It was reported later he was in British Columbia.

## SAYS NORWAY MUST KOWTOW OR GERMANY WILL SEVER RELATIONS

Berlin Paper Which First An-  
nounced War So Declares.

BERLIN, Nov. 10.—Via London, Nov. 11.—The Lokal Anzeiger in a letter regarding the hourly-expected Norwegian answer to Germany's protest against Norway's attitude toward submarines, declares that should Norway refuse to alter its position, Germany would be forced to ignore Norway's order to submarines to avoid Norwegian waters. The newspaper adds:

"The Norwegian Government will see itself faced with a serious fact. If Norway should abide by its illegal measures, it is clear what the results would be. The continuation of diplomatic and other relations between Germany and Norway could not be thought of."

## War Costs Canada \$24,000,000 Each Month Just Now

OTTAWA, Nov. 10.—Canadian revenue in October showed a further large increase. The total was \$18,158,125 as against a total of \$14,440,358 a year ago. Seven months of the fiscal year produced \$121,747,900 compared with \$87,683,548 during the same period of 1915.

War expenditures in seven months aggregated \$127,487,147, and are now running at the rate of \$24,000,000 per month. The total net debt on Oct. 31 was \$895,778,516. A year ago it amounted to \$492,538,492.

## GRECIAN TANGLE MORE OF GORDIAN KNOT THAN EVER

Germans Give Tino Warning  
About Transferring Guns.

LONDON, Nov. 11.—Count von Mirbach, German minister to Greece, has notified the Greek Government, according to special dispatches from Athens, that the handing over of Greek guns and rifles to the Entente Allies, would be considered an unfriendly act by Germany.

The notification which was made Thursday apparently refers particularly to the ceasing of war material for the use of the national defence army. The dispatches say that at the same time great secrecy is being observed in Athens regarding the subject of the Entente note presented to Greece some days earlier.

The Morning Post's Athens correspondent expressed the belief that the Entente Allies in the note demand the departure of all the legations of the central powers. The premier has stated that the subject of the note is very grave and that there would be an unpleasant sequel if no compromise was reached by means of negotiations, according to the dispatches.
