LITTLE NAP COSTLY FOR RUM-RUNNERS

Pair Who Went To Sleep Near Exeter Were Each Fined \$1,000.

DRIVER JAILED FOR A WEEK

Corunna Youth Admits He Drove Car While Intoxicated.

GODERICH, July 22.—Charles C. Leeming of Goderich, Ont., and C. M. Intosh, Port Huron, the youthful drivers of a big car of liquor, who were caught near Exeter on Tuesday evening, appeared before Magistrate Reid this afternoon and were each fined \$1,000 and costs.

The young men were on their way from Kitchener to Windsor with sixteen cases of liquor and became intoxicated. After driving their big car into the ditch near Kirkton they lay down by the roadside with a couple of big guns very much in evidence and went to sleep.

A telephone message brought police from Exeter, who took the pair and their car in charge. Later they were removed to Goderich.

A second charge was laid against Leeming of driving a motor vehicle while he was intoxicated. He pleaded guilty. Magistrate Reid informed him that in this case he could not impose a fine and continued learning to seven days in the county jail.

No disposition has as yet been made of the liquor pending word from the attorney general's department in Toronto.

WHO OWNS THE CAR.

WINDSOR, July 22.—Was a large cargo of the forbidden beverage spilled across the St. Clair River a few miles south of Sarnia tonight? Local authorities are inclined to think they following the seizure of a large motor car bearing license number 17-466 by License Inspector W. J. Gaultier at a point about three miles south of this city where it had been left standing. It is believed that a load had been transferred to a boat and transported across before the officer arrived. A small boat was noticed pulling into the American shore about the time that the inspector reached the point where the machine was parked. There was no sign of any person who might be the driver near the car when it was seized. It will be held until the owner or driver appears to claim the machine.

OFFICIALS ARE NEUTRAL.

SARNIA, July 22.—Although undeclared liquor shipments have been seized in many cities since Monday at midnight, there has been no interference in this city with consignments which arrived before Monday, and were not delivered on that day. For a time there seemed to be some possibility of Inspector Coulter stepping in and taking the joy out of the eleven-hour consignees by confiscating their liquor. Chief Lammie of the Sarnia police department has adopted an attitude of neutrality of the question, also Crown Attorney Willson. The Canadian Express Company has delivered liquor since Monday and still have a few cases left which they delivered today.

LOSS OF \$30,000 IN ROCKLAND, QUEBEC, FIRE

OTTAWA, July 22.—Fire of unknown origin breaking out near midnight on Thursday, destroyed thirteen residences and dwellings and caused a \$30,000 loss at Rockland, Que. Only a small part of the loss is covered by insurance. The fire started in Poultie street and spread quickly to a restaurant. From there it spread up both Poultie and Gareau streets until it had wiped out upwards of a dozen homes and also damaged several sheds and outbuildings. The fire was brought under control about six o'clock this morning.

HEAT WAVE HAS HIT THE WEST

Rain Is Needed in Some Sections of Alberta.

WINNIPEG, July 22.—No break is apparent in the heat wave which is quite general over the western provinces, and high temperatures were reached today at many points. The present week is described as a trying one in Southern Alberta and rain is needed with which it is hoped a crop can be harvested which will be two-thirds as large as that of 1920. Prince Albert reported cheerfully today that prospects in that crop area were of the brightest.

Manitoba needs cooler weather and rain, but more heat is predicted for tomorrow.

RAIN IS NEEDED.

LETHBRIDGE, July 22.—Crops in Southern Alberta have withstood a trying week of intense heat and warm winds and a general rain is needed to bring conditions back to approaching normal. Wednesday was the hottest day since 1910. It is estimated that about two-thirds of last year's crop will be the best crop that can be expected over the whole of Southern Alberta. This would be only one-third the 1910 crop. In some districts, particularly along the international boundary, crops are still standing up very well, but everywhere rain is needed to keep the fields that are left from going back.

CROP PROSPECTS GOOD.

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., July 22.—Crop prospects in this area are of the brightest. Although there are isolated cases of severe damage from hail, the percentage on the whole is negligible. No rust or smut has appeared, and little damage has been done by grasshoppers or cutworms. Wheat is all headed out, and 75 per cent of the oats have followed suit to date. Bright, sunny weather is now required, and this has been enjoyed during the week. With a continuance of the same favorable conditions the grain harvest should commence about the middle of August and without cessation. As the coarser grains are so well advanced, it is estimated the yield will closely rival the output of the bumper crop of 1915.

Garden produce of every kind is prolific, the abundant rains in June having assured successful growth. Hay is very plentiful on the uplands and in the sloughs, but none of the latter can be cut without difficulty, owing to the presence of water.

No Signs of Struggle.

The end of the police showed that there were no signs of a struggle in the bedroom in which Mrs. Stepien was found. Her husband, Bert Stepien, who lives across the street, stated on the stand that he saw Stepien phoning for the police, at the request of Mrs. Stepien's mother.

The post-mortem report of Dr. Hagmeier showed that in a cut of his throat Stepien failed to sever the important arteries, and really died from drowning. The verdict of the jury was that Stepien came to his death as a result of drowning after he had cut his own throat while in a temporary fit of insanity.

GOVT. INSURANCE IS NOT POPULAR

Only Two Widows and Seven Nurses Have Policies.

OTTAWA, July 22.—Only two widows have taken advantage of the privilege of insuring their families under the returned soldiers' insurance act. Up to the present time nine families of the act. Seven of the nine policies were taken out by nursing sisters who were during the war. When the act was passed originally provision was made to enable the widows of members of the forces who died after discharge from the army to obtain insurance, for the reason that in many cases returned soldiers died after discharge from some causes not attributable to military service, and consequently their widows were not eligible for pension. It was felt that they should be given an opportunity of insuring for the benefit of their children, and this was done by inserting a section in the returned soldiers' insurance act, enabling them to make application for twelve months from the date upon which the act came into force. This period expires on September 1 of this year, after which date no applications will be received from the widows.

SHIPPING COY LOWERS CATTLE OCEAN RATES

MONTREAL, July 22.—(By Canadian Press).—Although shipping companies in this port all have a large number of cattle contracted to be shipped at \$40 a head to British ports, one of them, the White Star Dominion Line, being booked at this rate up to the end of August, this concern and the others are now accepting shipments of cattle at \$30 a head. Shipping men here, however, were unable tonight to state whether or not the existing contracts at the \$40 rate would be trimmed to the lower level.

HON. F. C. BIGGS WILL NOT SPEAK AT CRAIG

TORONTO, July 22.—Force of circumstances over which he had no control compelled Hon. F. C. Biggs, minister of public works and highways, to break his Alisa Craig appointment on Thursday, according to an explanation secured from the minister tonight. Mr. Biggs stated that the unemployment conference was called at the Parliament Buildings after he had made his appointment to appear in Alisa Craig, and he was expressly asked by the premier to be present at that meeting.

CANNOT BE EXTRADITED.

OTTAWA, July 22.—Grover Bergdoll, American draft evader, will not likely be brought to Canada from Germany because he is a German citizen and as such cannot be extradited to Canada through the provisions of an old treaty between the two countries. This it is understood is the decision of officers of the department of justice, who have been investigating the case.
