



boys' group, an inspection will be made of all the city backyards. The city will be divided into 12 or 16 sections. The senior boys, armed with permits issued by the city health authorities, issued by the city health authorities, will conduct the biggest clean-up campaign in the history of the Forest City.

The junior boys will attend to their own yards, and see that they are put into a presentable shape.

Those who will be responsible for the survey are the boys of the Tuxis and

rvey are the boys of the Tuxis and Trail Ranger groups, the Boy Scouts, the Roman Catholic League, the Young Judean Club, and the junior members of the Y. M. C. A. Back of the whole effort is the boys' work board, consisting of prominent businessmen who have the interest of the campaign at heart.

Create Community Spirit. The object is to create a community spirit among the London boys—a spirit citizenship, cleanliness and civic re-

sponsibility.

The aim of the campaign is to develop a love for a beautiful London, a spirit of service in home helpfulness, and to prevent fires and disease.
