HARMONY PARTY DRAWS POLICE

Hill Street Warblers Fined \$10, Some Taking the "Or."

Men Plead Not Guilty, But Stories Not Believed.

Apparently Constables Last and Berryman had no ear for the harmony dispensed by Ed. McCullough, James Wench, Albert Wright, Robert McCoy and Herbert Morrison at the home of Wm. Smith, 299 Hill street, on Sunday night, for they proceeded to pinch the warblers and allowed them to finish out the night in the Carling street cells.

On the other hand the officers may have been so enraptured with the melodies that they decided to give the night-dusk sergeant at the police station a musical treat. At any rate they gave the men a ride in the patrol, and those not being able to pay a \$10 fine imposed by Magistrate Graydon Monday morning were given a further ride to the county jail, where they will reside for the next ten days.

Wright was the only exception, being discharged by the court.

Plead Not Guilty.

When arraigned in police court the men all pleaded not guilty, but none of them cared to dispute the tale unfolded by the constables that when he was passing the house at 9:30 o'clock that sounds of revelry proceeded from within the domicile. There was much singing and heavy objects could be heard falling on the floor.

On closer investigation the constable declared that there was much bad language being indulged in and a dispute in progress as to who was the "better man."

After 40 minutes of watchful waiting more men came to the house.

"One of them accused McCoy or Wench of stealing money from a man named 'Punch,'" said Constable Last.

"Wench struck a Constable Elson, who said he would be here this morning, but I don't see him."

"We went into the house and found Mr. Smith and his son upstairs on a bed partially undressed. They seemed to be drunk or under the influence of drugs. The other men were under the influence of liquor with the exception of Wright."

Corroborated Evidence.

Constable Berryman corroborated the evidence of Constable Last, and stated that Smith had said to "take them all out."

Albert Wright, called to the witness box by Magistrate Graydon, stated that he had arrived at Smith's half an hour before the officers came in. He had gone to see Smith's son. He had not seen any liquor on the premises. Wright declared he had gone to the house with Elson and a man named Laidlaw.

"Where did they go?" questioned the court.

"They went out," replied Wright.

"That's what you should have done," said Mr. Graydon. "There seems to have been a pretty noisy concert there. I am going to fine you \$10 and cost each of 10 days in jail. There has been a great deal of trouble about that place down there and it has got to be stopped."

"I am going to dismiss Albert Wright. He says it is the first time he has been here, and I hope it is the last time."

REMOVE SEIZED BEER TO STORAGE

One hundred and forty cases of beer seized in transit from the Kuntz Brewery at Waterloo to the Essex Exporters Company, Ltd., of Little Cote, two months ago by the local police, were removed from the police station Monday to the premises of the licensed vendor for storage.

"It has not yet been decided what will be done with the beer," said License Inspector J. E. Keenleyside.

"When the two chauffeurs who had charge of the truck captured by the police were brought to trial, the case was dismissed against them under section 41 of the O. T. A."

"We immediately laid a charge against the Kuntz Brewery, under section 70 of the O. T. A., which has to do with liquor in transit. The case has not come up yet for trial, and I cannot tell you when it will be called."

MEREDITH & MEREDITH have issued a supreme court writ on behalf of the First National Exchange Bank at Port Huron, Mich., against M. White & Son of London, as the maker of a promissory note and exchange totalling \$3,106.97.

Kidd of St. Marys against Don Morrison, also of St. Marys, for an accounting of partnership dealings between the parties in respect to a tin and smelting business, carried on under the name of the Queen Anne Sheet Metal Works, and to have the affairs wound up.

WILL PICK 'FRISCO PARLEY DELEGATE

London Real Estate Board To Send Representatives to National Convention.

WILL MEET ALL TRAINS

California Realtors To Extend Greetings To Visitors With Flowers and Fruits.

The London delegate to the convention of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, which will be held in San Francisco from May 21 to June 3, will be chosen at the next meeting of the London Real Estate Board, Bert Weir, local real estate man stated this morning.

A half dozen or more special trains from the east, the north and the south, bearing delegates to the annual gathering of the National Association of Real Estate Boards in San Francisco, will precipitate the tide of westward convention and tourist travel this spring.

This is the message of Tom Ingersoll, executive secretary of the national association, who has arrived in San Francisco for the purpose of setting up the necessary machinery for handling one of the most important gatherings of realtors ever held in the United States and Canada.

To Join Caravan.

Ingersoll comes from the national headquarters in Chicago. The Chicago board alone is organizing a special train of at least two sections. This special will be routed by way of the south for the purpose of enabling the Chicago realtors to join the end of the trail caravan in a motor tour de luxe from Los Angeles to San Francisco.

Philadelphia and Pittsburg, Ingersoll says, have also joined in a big special train. This, too, will take the southern route.

Washington, D. C. has practically completed the preparations for another special. Ohio is signing up the delegates needed to make the proposed "President's Special" an accomplished fact. Indiana is forming two Hoosier specials, one of which will bring the Indianapolis realtors and the other representative boards throughout the state. Canadian realtors are also sending a large representation from the various provinces.

Will Offer Flowers.

In preparation for the reception and entertainment of this host of realtors from all parts of the United States and Canada, California realtors are organizing to assist San Francisco in these visitors. Every special train will be met when it crosses the border, and greetings in the form of fruits and flowers extended.

In view of the long journey which most of the delegates will make to the convention, California realtors are planning to make this a vacation gathering. Following the convention sessions, many trips in and around San Francisco will be made to California's major scenic attractions. This will include Big Trees, Yosemite, Lake Tahoe and many other places.

SUGGEST NAMES FOR CHAIRMAN

Although F. P. McGuigan, the London Street Railway's representative upon the proposed board of conciliation to arbitrate a wage dispute with its employees, will be unable to come to the city for a few days, he has opened negotiations with Frank McKay, the union's delegate, with the view toward a choice of a chairman to preside at the board.

The latter has forwarded a list of likely candidates, favorable to the men, and a choice is expected within the time limit, Wednesday night.

Should no chairman be selected by that date the choice will be made by the department of labor after which another period must elapse before the board actually convenes in this city. It is estimated that weeks will pass before any finding is made.

BRING OVERSEAS SPEAKER TO CITY

Western "U" Authorities Arrange for Workers' Educational Association Executive's Address.

VARIOUS METHODS USED TO PROMOTE FELLOWSHIP

Extension Classes Already Started Here For Education of Workers, Success Elsewhere.

Arrangements are being made for a public address in London, May 9, by Albert Mansbridge, vice-president of the Workers' Educational Association of Great Britain, who is touring America in the interests of that body.

A strong effort is being made in various parts of this country by representatives of the working classes co-operating with educational authorities to establish similar branches, whose objects are to stimulate and satisfy the demand of working men and women for education and to generally assist the development of a national system of education which shall insure to all children, adolescents and adults such education as is essential for their complete development as individuals and citizens.

In connection with this various methods are employed, one being the establishment, for instance, of workers' extension classes at schools and universities. This has already been attempted with considerable success in the city of London.

Richmond, Columbia. Negotiations in this city have been conducted for several months past, and definite success is anticipated this year.

Mr. Mansbridge has been prominently identified with this undertaking overseas for many years, and it is said is well qualified to speak upon the subject.

The Western University authorities are taking an interest in the movement and A. T. Little, chairman of the board of governors of that institution, will preside, it is reported, at the scheduled meeting which will likely be held at the Collegiate Institute.

WILL NOT CONDUCT QUIZZ OF TECHNICAL SCHOOL

Trustee Wright Says Principal Beal Is Voluntarily Submitting Report Concerning Administration.

There is to be no probe into the affairs of the London Technical and Art School, according to Trustee J. B. Wright, chairman of the advisory vocational committee.

The latter explained Monday that H. B. Beal, principal of that institution, is preparing a full report of the activities of the classes during the past few months. The same will not be in readiness for some considerable time, yet, however.

"No person has ordered this report or asked for an official probe that we are aware of," Trustee Wright states, "but the principal decided to gather all available information that can be submitted to any who desire to know concerning the school."

"There has been so many false rumors in the past. We have heard so many different charges that have proved groundless and unsupported by evidence when investigation was actually made. Trustee Mrs. Hunt, as an instance, stated that she had been told that pupils attending technical classes were being counted twice on the enrollment as a result. At our last meeting, the principal denied this."

The advisory vocational committee meets in regular session Monday night to pass accounts and conduct other routine business in readiness for the regular meeting of the board Tuesday afternoon.

MEDS ORGANIZE NEW FRATERNITY

Western University Students Institute Society To Be Known As Pi Sigma Chi.

PURPOSE IS TO STIMULATE UNIVERSITY ACTIVITIES AND STUDIES AMONG UNDERGRADUATES.

After seven weeks of preparations a new Western University Medical School fraternity, which will be known as the Pi Sigma Chi, and from present indications will do big things towards maintaining the character of the students was inaugurated on Saturday.

Require Standards.

The purpose of the new fraternity is to encourage good fellowship, stimulate interest in athletics, university activities and studies among undergraduates. Certain standards, among them character and scholarship, are required for admission.

It is the idea of the primary movers of the fraternity to make it a perpetual organization, new members being selected from the freshman classes after they have completed their first year. The active and honorary membership is limited.

After the initiation, which was of an impressive nature, the constitution was adopted, and the official charter of the fraternity signed.

Two members were appointed to represent the fraternity on the inter-fraternity council. The object of the inter-fraternity council being to promote harmony and good fellowship between the Pi Sigma Chi and the Phi Kappa Pi, a medical fraternity which was inaugurated three weeks ago.

The official pin of the fraternity is a diamond shape black enamel and gold. It bears in Greek the initial letters of the fraternity. The colors adopted were silver and blue.

Install Officers.

The officers installed were: Mr. C. Fletcher, archon; Mr. D. M. McClelland, march; Mr. D. McClelland, guardian of the scrolls; Mr. C. McClelland, guardian of the scepter; Mr. J. W. Rice, guardian of the volumes; Mr. A. Ferguson, steward; Mr. A. Lamont, house controller; and Mr. A. Sifton, sergeant-at-arms.

Mr. Joseph and W. C. Sproat, two "pledges" to the fraternity, will be initiated at a later date.

Steps will be taken to obtain a house where outside members may live, and city members use as a clubhouse.

Obituaries

SISTER M. HILDEGARDE.

The funeral was held Monday morning of Sister M. Hildegard of the Community of St. Joseph, who died Friday.

Solemn Requiem high mass was sung at 8 o'clock in the chapel at the Sacred Heart Convent by Vicar General O'Connor, Father Mahoney, deacon, and Father Pocock, sub-deacon.

Father Stanley of Woodstock preached the sermon. Monsignor McKee of London and Monsignor West of New York conducted the services at the grave.

A large number of priests from the London diocese were present at the services in the Sacred Heart Convent.

The pallbearers were six sisters. Interment was made at St. Peter's Cemetery.

Sister Hildegard died after a lingering illness. She was a well-known teacher in the city, having held the principalship of St. Peter's school for a period of six years, where she proved herself an exemplary teacher and endeared herself to her pupils by her amiability and her untiring zeal.

She also taught at separate schools in Woodstock and Seaford.

BIRD BULLETIN

Issued by the Macmillan Ornithological Club.

The Broad-Winged Hawk, due April 23, was not reported until the 29th, nearly a week behind. This is one of the smallest of the soaring birds, and although usually met with singly here during migrations, is also found in large flocks. Sometimes hundreds may be seen passing slowly northward in spring or southward in fall, now flapping steadily, and again circling and drifting slowly in the desired direction, from suspicion of injury to the farmer.

The morning of the 30th produced the Bartramian Sandpiper in its usual field near White Oak. There were at least four, and their mellow whistled notes were very pleasing to hear. They have no doubt been back for some time, but are some what of the "beaten path," and a special trip is necessary to look them up.

A pair of Migrant Sparrows in the same field had a nest with six eggs in a thorn bush. Year after year they return to the same place and build a nest usually in the very same bush.

Junco and Tree Sparrows are still with us. Myrtle Warblers are increasing in numbers.

TO TELL OF INSIDE LIFE IN RED RUSSIA

Sir Paul Dukes To Visit London Under Auspices of Chamber of Commerce.

TO SPEAK IN COLLEGIATE

Was Former Chief of British Secret Intelligence Service in Soviet Russia.

With the "Friends of Soviet Russia" arranging a series of public meetings in London in favor of communism as exemplified by Soviet Russia, it is opportune, the chamber of commerce explains, that conditions as they are in that unhappy country should be made known.

Sir Paul Dukes, formerly chief of the British secret intelligence service in Soviet Russia, will deliver an address on "Secret Service in Red Russia," in the collegiate auditorium on Thursday of this week.

Spent Years in Russia.

Sir Paul Dukes, who is a younger son of a distinguished English family, spent his early years in Russia and gained an intimate knowledge of the spoken and written language, and through his own social life.

In 1918, after the Russian social life of the Kerensky government, and the advent of Bolshevik regime under Lenin and Trotsky, Sir Paul Dukes, under various disguises, penetrated into the innermost heart of Red Russia. As a representative of the British secret service he became a Soviet official, and through his subsequent experience gained a clear knowledge of the whole Bolshevik movement, and the personalities of its leaders, achieving a thorough understanding of the effect of Bolshevism on the Russian people. His knowledge is first hand and accurate.

In appearance he is described as a more youth, "brilliant, modest and charming," whose utterances carry conviction, and whose word pictures are clear. In the British secret service he has had a series of amazing and thrilling adventures and narrow escapes. Quite often he was harassed by Bolshevik spies and faced death among the Reds as a soldier of the Red army. Finally he made a thrilling escape from Russia, and was knighted by the King and honored as a national hero in Great Britain.

All Its Horror.

His story of the inside life in Red Russia with all its horror, its humor, its tragedy and pathos, will be told at first-hand to the people of London on Thursday night.

The meeting in the collegiate auditorium is open to the public, and a small admission charge will be made. The first proceeds will go to the War Memorial Children's Hospital.

DEBENTURES FOR SCHOOL MUST PASS COMMISSION

Members of Wilson's New Body Don't Know Meeting Date, However.
