ORDERS SCHOOL SITE PURCHASE

Vic Commission Promises To Issue Debentures Later For New Building.

Will Pay \$14,400 For Land For Educational Purposes in Southeast Section.

After a vacation of several months the vic commission met Friday afternoon, and recommended that the council authorize debentures for \$14,400 for a new school site at Oliver Trafalgar streets, and for \$8,000 to equip the old Victoria Public School, which is to be used as a South End Collegiate Institute.

The commission laid over the report of the board of education for 1921-22, and recommended that the board of education should cover the cost of the proposed school at Oliver Trafalgar streets, pending the completion of specifications for this building, and a definite estimate of cost. With this temporary hold the board's request the commission will assure that when definite plans are forthcoming the commission will agree to a transfer of \$82,000 in debentures credited for public schools for the new building.

Pay Collegiate Balance.
Other business transacted included a recommendation that debentures of \$15,000 be issued to complete payment on the Central Collegiate Institute, as the board possesses a credit of \$275 only for this purpose.

When Chairman Edwin Smith of the board of education sponsored the purchase of the East London school site he lauded the location, and pointed out that a census has shown that in the centre of a densely populated area on a school children basis, asked that the site be purchased, and declared that provision will be made to add to the eight-roomed school until it is eventually a 17-roomed structure.

"You couldn't buy any more of the best school sites could you?" asked Philip Pocock with a smile.

Could Trim Price.
Trustee Silverwood declared that the \$100,000 estimate was a rough one, and predicted that this price could be trimmed.

"You ought to build that school for \$50,000," said Ben Noble, representing the library board on the commission. "I saw a beautiful 10-roomed school being erected at Springfield for \$42,000. It has no heating system, but that would cost \$5,000 more."

"Is labor cheaper there?" asked Trustee Bryden Campbell. "Well, the lowest bid was from a local contractor," replied Mr. Noble. "What's his name?" queried the other commissioners.

"Crak," said Mr. Noble. "Why is it not possible to do that?" queried Trustee Campbell. "That's a question which might be asked," added E. R. Seabrook, chairman of the board of health. "That school in East London would be built for \$65,000," asserted Mr. Noble. "In fact I would not do it myself for that."

"We will not spend one dollar more in this necessary," said Trustee Silverwood.

Moves Site Purchase.

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LOOK FOR HEAVY HOLIDAY TRAFFIC

Railroads to Run Extra Sections in London Division.

Ticket agents of both the Canadian Pacific and Grand Trunk Railways in this city, as well as officials of the city, are predicting that the holiday will be extra heavy, and steps are being taken by both roads to handle the holiday crowds.

On the London division of the Grand Trunk Saturday night, Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, extra coaches will be added to most of the trains and if necessary special trains will be put in the service.

An extra section of the International Limited will be run from Toronto Saturday night. This is a special train, and will arrive in the city at 8:45.

On the Canadian Pacific extra coaches will be added to the regular trains running from London and Toronto to handle the increase in traffic.

No cut rates will be in force, it was stated, to the larger cities, but to cities and towns within a radius of 60 miles of the city people will be able to take advantage of the ordinary week-end rates.

CITY NEGOTIATES FOR PART OF SOMERVILLE ESTATE

Will Commence Paving If Strip Of Land Is Acquired To Straighten Carrae Crescent.

Negotiations are being conducted by City Engineer H. A. Brazier on behalf of the city, with executors of the Somerville estate in South London, whereby the city will acquire a strip of land on the west side of Carrae Crescent, which is required to straighten that thoroughfare.

When this strip of property, which is 240 feet long and varies in width from one to forty feet, is purchased, the engineer will proceed with the construction of a pavement on Carrae Crescent, which has been authorized by the city council.

City Engineer Brazier stated Saturday morning that he hopes to complete the real estate deal with the Somerville estate as soon as possible, so that the street may be straightened and paved in the near future.

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Architect Notified To Proceed With Plans For Public School Building

A new public school by the first of next year or Easter at the least. So declares School Trustee Edwin Smith, chairman of the board of education, who expressed every satisfaction with the result of Friday's session of the civic commission. "I am well pleased with what the commission has done," he said Saturday. "I believe that the remainder of the school board will be equally satisfied."

The chairman explains that he has notified L. E. Carrothers, school architect, to proceed with plans and specifications for the new school, which, together with a close estimate of the probable cost, will be submitted at the next regular meeting of the school board and subsequently to the city council.

Pointing out that it will require at least a month for the preparation of the plans, Trustee Smith believes that it will not be necessary to call a special session of the board during August.

SAYS NEW SCHOOL IS UNNECESSARY

Ald. Cunningham Suggests Credit Be Used In Repairing Buildings.

Commending the action of the civic commission, which Friday decided to defer the request of the board of education for debentures to construct a new eight-roomed school at Trafalgar and Oliver streets, Ald. O. L. Cunningham declares that this building is not necessary at present.

He suggests that the \$82,000 at the credit of the board of education be utilized in building or repairing schools in London proper, leaving the annexed district until the assessment exemption agreement and fixed rate of assessment expires.

"Senior School Inspector Great told me that there were only 65 pupils in need of that school," said Alderman Cunningham. "It is ridiculous to build an eight-roomed school for this number. Why not fix up the cottage on the property for them?"

"Building Inspector Piper says it can be done for \$4,000. They could use the credit to the board of education for schools in London proper, and leave the annexed district until the assessment exemption agreement and fixed rate of assessment expires.

"Look at the money being lost on debentures lying idle," concluded Dr. Cunningham. "I am in favor of the site at \$14,000, although if the board of education had been aware that they could have purchased a bigger and better site across the road from the present one last year for \$5,000. That school should not be built for years, and I will maintain this stand as long as I am on the city council, which School Trustee Wright says is so rotten."

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POINTS OUT VALUE OF KIWANIS WORK

In an interview with Owen Dawson, secretary-treasurer of the Shawbridge Boys' Camp, Quebec, who is a visitor to the Kiwanis summer camp, a glimpse could be seen of the powerful, yet unobtrusive, machinery which has been set in motion throughout Canada by associations of public-spirited men for the benefit of the under-privileged boy.

Fourteen years ago it was boys' work that was the order of the day. Knowledge of the ways and means of putting boys on their feet and giving them the right sort of start in life. "And no method is more effective than that of the big brother," he declares, "for few things more productive of good results than the interest taken by London Kiwanis in their summer camp here."

Shawbridge Boys' Camp, the institution of which Mr. Dawson has been for many years a director and of which he is at present secretary-treasurer, is maintained by provincial grants and by such associations as the Kiwanis and Rotary clubs.

"Most of our boys," he said, "come to us from the juvenile courts, but there are almost
