LONDON GIRLS GET BEHIND SCHEME FOR NEW Y.W.C.A.

Will Present Brilliant Play—Direct Rummage Sale and Hold Bazaar.

OFFICERS RETURNED

The girls of London are behind the project for a new Y. W. C. A. administration building. This was made evident at yesterday's meeting of the Y. W. C. A. board, when reports were made of several schemes under way, by which the girls can raise money toward the erection of a new building.

The most ambitious undertaking will be the presentation of a play, "Fifi," by the Y. W. C. A. Campers' Association under the direction of the Rogers Producing Company. It is expected that 200 girls will take part in this play, which will be given in the spring.

The senior girls clubs of the association are arranging for a great rummage sale this spring and are now making a general appeal to all friends of the Y. W. C. A. for discarded clothing. They believe this is a way in which they can enlist the help of many who would otherwise be unable to give active service in connection with the raising of funds.

The junior girls club of the Y. W. C. A. are planning a magnificent bazaar and for weeks past have been busily engaged making pretty things to sell. The bazaar will be held about Easter time.

The money is beginning to come in too, headed by a magnificent gift of \$5,000.

Reports From Toronto.
An interesting report of the annual meeting of the dominion council held recently in Toronto was given by Mrs. Donald McLean, and of the organization of the provincial council by Miss Marjorie Morton, general secretary.

Monthly reports of the different departments showed the work to be in a flourishing condition. Mrs. Thomas Rowe of the travellers' aid department referred to the regular tabulated monthly statements of this department, which are now an established thing. During the past month 38 persons were assisted by this branch of the work. Of these, fourteen were foreigners, six children between sixteen and eight were met by request, nine were hospital cases and two police cases. Nine follow-up calls were made and 943 trains met.

PLAN PUBLIC MEMORIAL TO PETER M'ARTHUR

Western Ontario Authors' Association May Form Board to Encourage Writers.

The Western Ontario branch of the Canadian authors' association have plans under consideration for the holding of a public memorial meeting to the late Peter McArthur, poet, humorist and journalist.

This tribute to the distinguished Canadian man of letters, whose death occurred recently, will be made in London, probably on his birthday, March 10. The suggestion is also made that William Arthur Deacon, writer and critic of Toronto, who was a close personal friend of Mr. McArthur, be asked to speak on this occasion.

The association is considering the formation of an editorial board, the membership of which would be drawn from the experienced writers of Western Ontario. Its objective would be the encouragement of young and obscure writers of this part of the province by assisting in the placing of their work before the public. This would include the work of illustrators as well as the work of writers.

The branch has also plans under way for the definite promotion of literary interest in the schools, these plans to be worked out in co-operation with the local educational authorities.

Prof. A. G. Dorland Gives an Inspiring Address Before the Women's Faculty Club.

"Education for World Citizenship," was the title of an intensely interesting address given yesterday before the Women's Faculty club by Prof. A. G. Dorland of the University of Western Ontario. The meeting was held in the science building and was largely attended.

The speaker declared, during the course of his address, that force must not be considered a remedy for the wrongs; that world citizens must realize that co-operation, organization and love, rather than competition and hate, were the greatest factors in evolution; that nations must be freed from narrow, aggressive patriotism, and finally that world citizens must appreciate the contributions of nations to the inheritance of the world.
