The object of the subsidy is to make the line between Montreal and Quebec, which traverses the country on the north side of the St. Lawrence, an integral part of our great transcontinental line, with Quebec as a summer seaport terminus. 
The grain harvest is in full blast in the district. Crops are fair and will be close to the average. The first new grain was brought down river yesterday.


