LIMA, Peru, April 9.—Warlike excitement continues here. Among those who have offered their services to the government are 2,300 Japanese and 500 Italian residents. Wrights Make Concession NEW YORK, April 9-The Wright Brothers reached an agreement today wth the Aero Club of America which with the Aero Club of America which assures the future of aviation contests in this country. The Wrights agree to issue licenses to those aviators who do not use Wright machines and the Aero Club agree to countenance no contests unless the aviators competing shall obtain licenses from the Wrights. Victoria Lumber and Manufacturing Company Sells Part of its Large Timber Area to Fraser River Lumber Co.

FROM COMOX TO CAMPBELL RIVER

Chemainus Plant Not Affected by Sale-Fraser River Concern Operates Extensively On Vancouver Island

VANCOUVER, April 8.—The timber limits of the Victoria Lumber and Manufacturing company, in the Comox valley, Vancouver Island, comprising seventy-five thousand acres and extending from Comox to the Campbell river, a distance of thirty-two miles, have just been purchased by the Fraser River Lumber Co. The deal is easily the largest single transaction ever closed in British Columbia, the price being about \$4,000,000.

The tract in question is regarded by experts as the finest area of Douglas firm in existence, containing, it is estimated, between four and five billion feet. The Fraser River Lumber Company had previously acquired about twenty-five

Davidson, vice-president; Edward Swift, the Chicago meet packer, and the Mackensie and all the timber limits of the Victoria Lumber Co., whose directing spirit is Frederick Weyerhauser, of Minneapolis, described as the owner of more standing timber than any other individual on this

described as the owner of more standing timber than any other individual on this continent. The vending company does not intend to go out of business. Its-large plant at Chemainus will be operat-ed on its present large scale.
