Under the miscrescope we can get at the secret of the spinning very nicely. We see that there are either four or six teats on the spider near the lower part of the abdomen, al-most exactly similar to the teats of a cow. From these issue four or dis strands as the case may be, but these strands themselves are not simple, but are composed of at least a thou-sand fibers each, for it has been proven that in each teat there is a sieve of at least a thousand hole: through which the silky matter is strained. Thus we see that fibers a gider's web it is yet composed of from four to six thousand fibers. 
