THE BABY FARMING CASE.

THE INQUEST CONDUCTED BY CORNER DUNCAN.

Additional Evidence Given by Medical Officers at the Inquest held at St. Michael's Hospital.

The adjourned inquest on the body of the child who was supposed to have been starved to death by Christina Leslie was held last night at the morgue before Coroner Duncan.

The first witness called was Leslie Mary Jones, mother of the child.

On June 19 Mrs. Leslie came to the lying-in hospital.

The 86 was to pay for keep of the child. I visited the child at Mrs. Leslie's house on Montrose street five weeks ago.

I did not know the child it was wasted so. I only knew it was my child because Mrs. Leslie gave it to me as mine.

I went again a week and a half after it was born. Five days after the child was born Mrs. Leslie was very dirty.

Mrs. Leslie was sick and said: "Do not expect to see after it." I went again on Friday last. It was dead. I went to take it away to give to another nurse.

I thought Mrs. Leslie was not taking proper care of it. The nurse (Mrs. Woods) took the dead child to an under-laker.

Dr. Carroll sworn, said: I was called to attend a case at Mrs. Leslie's. I found several children sucking at bottles, and reasonably clean. One child was in the mother's arms. It was covered with lice. I said it was not likely to live. I could not see after it, but I considered they were too much for one woman. I held a post-mortem examination on a child in the morgue on the morning of July 28.

There was slight abrasion on the skull. There was no mark on the brain corresponding with the mark. This was not the cause of death. The state of the body showed a lack of nourishment. The body was so decomposed that the post-mortem was unsatisfactory.

The stomach contained a pint of watery fluid, and the bowels were shrunken up to half size. The stomach only contained two teaspoonfuls of food. In my opinion the child came to its death from chronic wasting caused by insufficient nourishment.

It is possible a neglect of cleanliness hastened death.

To the coroner—I did not attend the child on the morning of July 28. I was on my knowledge. There were six children in the house when I called at Mrs. Leslie's.

Dr. McKean, who assisted in the post-mortem, made the above evidence his own. I said Mrs. Leslie came to his office on July 18 with a child for a child that had died at Mrs. Leslie's.
