The Jesuits Thoroughly Denounced. Chairman W. H. Howland did not attempt to make a long speach, but after saying that the injecting was one of Teronto's citizens, which he hoped would put on record their condemnation of the Jesuit Estates Act in general and the Jesuit Society in pur-ticular, he called upon Rev. G. M. ticular, he called upon Rev. G. M.
Milligan to lead in prayer, which he briefy did. When the Chairman celled upon Rev. Mr. Macdonnell to move the first resolution; which was as follows, the audience sent leavenward a perfect tornado of cheers and appleuse. This was the resolution:

This public meeting of citizens of Toronto expresses its emphatic condemnation of the Jesuits Estates Act palsed by the Guebec Legislature in violation, as we helieve, of the true principles of civil and religious liberty and equality. We would at the same time protest against the recent incorporation of the Jesuits, a measure which we are persuaded is unconstitutional in any British dependency. It is our conviction that the disqualifying of the Jesuit Society to hold property by the Imperial Parliament in 17% after the abolition of that society by the Pope in the previous year, and the taking possession of that property by the Crows, were not only justifiable but animperative duty in the interests of good government and public morality.

He Has Paid His Taxes.

He Has Paid His Taxes. In moving the resolution Rev. Mr. Mac-donnell said he thought we had now come to the parting of the waves as it were, to that the parting of the waves as it were, to that point at which it is for us to determine, along with our 'tellow-ottizens, whether we shall retain or lose, for some indefinite time, the rights and privileges of free British men. [Applause.] 'I am here, not as a Presbyterian minister, not even as a Protestant, but as a citizen, as an elector. I dare say some of you are curious to know whether! I live paid my taxes or not. I have. [Faughter.] I came to the conclusion for one thing: that I should always like to have the right to yote. That was one reason, but the main reason was that. Because on reflection I came to the conclusion that the injustice of the total exemption of all Roman Catholic Clergy from 'axation in this city was an injustice not simply borne by us but shared by our tax-paying fellow-citizens. [Applause.] And so I pay my share, as yon pay yours, af some dignitaries of the Church of Rome." [Laughter and applause.]

Mr. Macdonuell thought, although the stable door had been very imprudently left oped, fliat the horse of British freedom had not yet been stolen. "I would like to emphasize." said he, "that we are not contending with our Roman Catholic fellow-citzens, but with a band of ecclesiastics of no country, of no home; almost with a band who have no flag for which to fight: whose only traditions are the traditions of bostility, civil and religious, to freedom wherever they find it; whose only am is to bring their fellow-nean under their tyranny for the astistying of their insatiable ambition. [Applause.] Unless I am very much mistaken, I would take the very same stand if twere a Presbyterian minister instead of a Jesuit father. [Applause.] point at which it is for us to determine, along

If the time should ever come when there should be any curtailing of the freedom of my Roman Catholic brethren to preach whitever they please. The speaker differed with statements in some juntants that it had been made almost impossible to discuss this matter calmly and reasonably because of the intolerance and fanaticism flung at some writers and editors.
